The Masters of Harmony Enter the World of Virtual Harmony

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 virus a pandemic, and singers around the world began to stop rehearsing and performing in public to protect their safety as well as that of their audiences. This loss of public group singing with all of its healing, joy-producing results have affected millions of music lovers around the world. According to a study from Chorus America (June 2019), more than 54 million adults and children in the United States participate in choral groups or one kind or another. More than one in six Americans over the age of 18 sing in a chorus. However, a relatively new form of group singing has risen to bridge the gap between now and the eventual resumption of public singing – the emergence of virtual choruses, choirs, and similar groups. A virtual choir is one where members do not meet physically but record themselves at home and have the individual performance stitched together electronically to produce recordings of remarkable power and beauty.

The concept is not new. American composer and conductor Eric Whitaker created an ongoing group called Virtual Choir in 2009. The health shutdowns of 2020 have given new life to Whitaker's pioneering work. The first time I ever heard such a virtual performance was when I heard a recording of a David Wise arrangement of "It Is Well with My Soul" by a group of 31 Nashville studio singers of the Ten Two Six Music Group using only their smartphones! The result was a stunning musical performance well beyond what I had expected to hear.

How the Masters of Harmony Keep Their Dreams of Musical Excellence Alive

Since March 2020, the Masters of Harmony have been meeting regularly on Zoom to rehearse both current and

new repertoire within its technical limits (Zoom can currently handle only 2-3 audio channels at a time), to receive education on the finer points of vocal production, and to keep the priceless bonds of fellowship alive. Members start the rehearsal by doing physical and vocal warm-ups just as they would during in-person rehearsals. They are currently working on two songs to be performed virtually. Each member is being asked to create a video/audio recording of each song using a smartphone and submit it for mixing into a finished performance worthy of MOH standards and publication online. Before each meeting, some members meet to work on singing Polecat songs under a project called Sing-At-Home Polecat Program under the direction of Adam Marangakis. Some 40+ members have expressed an interest in this program. MOH President Joe D'Amore believes that MOH Zoom meetings can maintain a choral ensemble of sufficient size to prepare for our virtual Christmas show in December, our 2021 Spring Show, and international competition next July.

The Masters of Harmony Financial Challenge

With all paid performances for 2020 eliminated, the Masters, like performing groups all over the world, now faces a revenue shortfall. For now, the chorus is in reasonably good shape because of better-than-expected revenue from the last shows performed before the onset of the pandemic. Current sources of revenue are membership dues rebates to the chapter, member donations to Donor's Choice giving through Harmony Foundation, and charitable giving from member and non-member donors in the Masters Circle. These revenue streams depend heavily on members willing to pay the price needed to maintain world-class performance standards that make patrons feel MOH is worthy of their support.



Harmony Camp

As I wrote in my recent email to music educators "I write this today sad that Harmony Camp 2020 will not be happening this coming weekend. This would be a time of excitement for our staff, welcoming the young men for a weekend at camp, picking up our teaching quartet members at the airport, and sending out the music links to the boys who register at the last minute".

Optimism is the word of the day when thinking of Harmony Camp 2021 next October. Although at this point in time it even seems like a long shot that we will be able to have a Harmony Camp Lite in the spring of 2021. However, if the opportunity does arise, we will eagerly move forward with the overall goal of having a Harmony Camp Lite both in the Sacramento Area and in the Bay Area.

In the meantime our activities center around communicating with music educators and former Harmony Camp attendees informing them of virtual Barbershop shows in the future. Shortly after Thanksgiving we will be sending information to the music educators and former campers regarding the Harmony Foundation Holiday Show, the Masters of Harmony Show and the Vocal Majority Show, all of which are virtual shows. As we learn of other shows we will add those to the information we send.

We did send information to music educators regarding the Coronet Show through Harmony Foundation and noted the date of the HFI virtual show in December and asked that they let their students knows of these We are aware of music educations who give their students homework assignments around watching such events.

In this time of uncertainty our goal is communicate with the music educators and former campers. I would urge each of you to not only maintain contact with your chapter but also to maintain contact with those young men and the music educators with whom you have become acquainted.

Fall Cruise RESCHEDULED for 2021

DEPOSIT REFUND DEADLINE EXTENDED TO MARCH 3, 2021



The Far Western District Fall Convention at Sea has been RESCHEDULED for October 15-18, 2021 (Friday-Monday) aboard a NEWER ship, the Carnival Radiance®, that is currently is undergoing a \$200 million renovation with enhancements including increased safety/sanitizing procedures.

This new schedule will be good news for those who had been concerned with having to take two days off work for a Thursday-Sunday event; the new ship sails at 5:00 PM on Friday and returns at 7:00 AM on Monday.

For those who are already booked on the ship:

Everyone continuing to sail next year in Oct 2021 will receive a \$300 on-board credit per cabin and an upgraded cabin at no extra cost. The new deposit refund deadline is March 3, 2021, and the final-payment deadline will be in July 2021.

We are encouraging everyone currently booked on the cruise to **hold off until March** to see what happens before taking any action. Those who cancel now and try to rebook next year will not get the \$300 on board credit or the upgraded cabin, the rates will be higher, and fewer people on board to allow for social distancing will cause the ship to sell out much earlier than normal.

Carnival is working to finish moving all the deposits and bookings from 2020 to 2021. When this is completed, Donna will be emailing your new confirmation.

When you receive the email from Donna with new booking information, please respond back to Donna VIA EMAIL to confirm you received it as well as providing her with your chapter affiliation.

Also, if you've already paid for your convention registrations, those tickets are being transferred to the 2021 event.

Remember, there is no risk waiting until March, when new safety and sanitation protocols will be evident. We will be sharing details when they are approved by the CDC.

For those who still need to book:

Donna has a few cabins she has retained from those who opted to cancel. They are at **2020 prices**, and are being offered on a **first come**, **first served basis**. So, if you haven't booked yet, now is an excellent time to take advantage of those 2020 prices. **But hurry - those cabins will only be available until the end of November!**

We encourage everyone who has not yet booked the cruise to do so NOW. With the increased safety/sanitization procedures there will be fewer passengers, so if you continue to "wait and see" it is very likely you will not get on the ship. Your cruise deposit is fully refundable until March 3, 2021 so there is nothing to lose if you book now.

Donations may be made through cash gifts, appreciated stock and IRA Charitable Rollovers.





Joseph A. Salz, age 90, known far and wide for his good humor and his pure singing voice, passed away Oct. 25, in Gilbert, Arizona. Joe was a loving husband to Jean for 62 years, until her death in 2014. Together they had eight children, who were raised to know that family is everything, to live with honesty and integrity, and that it is best not to sweat the small stuff.

Joe was born in 1930 in Dubuque, Iowa and moved to Arizona in 1950. He lived in the Phoenix area most of his life, with a few years in Southern California and later, Sacramento. His career successes included sales and managing credit unions. Joe was also a lifelong, card-carrying Diehard Cubs Fan.

Joe Salz first joined the Barbershop Harmony Society (BHS) with the Hollywood Chapter in 1948. He sang lead as a member of an organized quartet for most of the next 72 years. Dad won the Far Western District (FWD) Championship with the Desert Knights (1957) and Stage Four (1972); his quartets qualified to compete at the international competition many times, with his highest placement being 11th in 1964 with the Coastliners. He also was an International BHS chorus champion with the Phoenicians in 1972. Joe

was inducted into the FWD Hall of Fame in 2002, not just for his singing, but for many years of service to the FWD and his local chapters, such as Phoenix, South Bay, Sacramento, and Sun Cities.

In barbershop, Joe was most proud of performing with the Desert Knights. Joe, Chuck Rastatter(best friends since 1936), Sam Aramian (FWD and BHS HOF), and Lloyd Steinkamp (FWD and BHS HOF), were registered as a quartet just shy of 50 years when Lloyd died in January 2007. The Desert Knights were one of the most popular barbershop comedy acts ever, performing in shows all over the USA and Canada, up until receiving a standing ovation in their last show in 2005. In their last years, they were joined on stage with the Knight Nurses (their wives), who provided first aid during performances with comedic effect. Along with their (many) children, the Knights were one big family of love. Joe was never happier than when surrounded by family and friends, playing cards, enjoying a martini, and woodshedding with other barbershoppers. This past January, he was able to do just that as many turned out for his 90th birthday party. The only thing that would have made the day better was to have Jean at his side.

That was the Year that Wasn't!

After I was voted in as President in the Fall of last year, I had a whole fist-full of ideas that might bring our District more successes. By March those ideas were fairly done when Covid-19 struck. First and foremost, we cancelled our plans to have a Spring Preliminary Contest because the Society had cancelled the International which was to be held in Los Angeles. Next, we found that none of our Chapters could hold Spring Shows. With our 2020 Fall Contest at Sea now looking questionable, Donna Hisey and I began working on Plan B, which was to transfer everyone from Fall 2020 over to Fall 2021 and wait for Carnival to make their announcement that the Cruise would not be happening. Rather than cancel the cruise, we decided to postpone, which gave us more leverage to make the 2021 Contest even better. Of course, we're still waiting for the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and FDA to come up with an approved vaccine. That being said, Donna arranged for everyone who stayed signed up to receive a \$300.00 per cabin on-board credit. This amounts to \$110,000 in on-board credits.

During this same time frame, the Society announced that it was going to begin doing their own fundraising, as Harmony International Incorporated (HFI) could not bring in the monies expected by the Society. As members of the District President's Council (DPC), Nick Papageorge and I began sitting in on meetings of HFI, the Society and the DPC, trying to negotiate a fair settlement between the two factions. We are continuing to meet and discuss options which will benefit the members.

ZOOM Meetings seem to be the way of the future. We did manage to conduct our Spring and Summer and Fall Board Meetings as well as our Spring and Fall House of Delegates (HOD) Meeting using this new technology.

Most Chapters are also Meeting virtually each week via ZOOM. I have been fortunate enough to be invited to a few of these get-togethers and found it very, shall we say, informative. Some are full blown rehearsals using guest speakers and reviewing musicality, and words and notes. Others are more to keep the home fires burning and the guys connected by using the time as an "Open Mic" Session. I hope your Chapter is using this technology to keep in touch. If not let your Division VP know and he will assist you in getting this done.

In late August, the Society gave us all a chance to watch and participate in a Legacy Quartet Contest won by our own 139th Street Quartet. This contest pitted Quartets from the 50s, 60s, 70s and 80s, who competed but never won at International to be seen and heard again from the Archives at Harmony Hall. Your District participated with a donation to help defray the cost of digitizing 25 Quartets from the past. This was no easy task, as some of the Quartets didn't have videos of themselves on the Contest Stage and some of the songs from "back in the day" might have been taken as offensive by today's standards. But the team in Nashville worked through the issues and came up with a brilliant contest. Many thanks to Dustin Guyton and his tireless staff for allowing us to virtually judge a contest. I understand that each of the Quartets received at least one First Place vote on their particular set.

So, where do we go from here? A lot will depend on when and whether a vaccine or vaccines become(s) available. We are planning on conducting Divisional and Preliminary contests so that qualifiers can go to Cleveland in July and aboard ship in October. We just heard from Carnival that the CDC has approved the Shipping industry to begin sailing again with very strict protocol. Now we'll have to see when we all can begin to sing in person again. Once that happens, we'll have to campaign for our audience to come back again. It wouldn't surprise me to see most of our patrons in the audience wearing masks. Whatever we do, Safety will be our priority in all cases.

As your President, I want to thank all of the Chapters who are continuing to meet online and all those members who remained with us for the postponement of our Contest-at-Sea. Once we have settled down a bit, I believe we will have the best coming-out parties to be talked about for years. Please Stay Safe and Keep the Whole World Singing.

We are, to say the least, living in trying times, and it can become difficult to feel that you are accomplishing anything.



Had Enough?

It was early March when I was last able to sing with a Chorus. Seems like an eternity, doesn't it?

So instead of bemoaning what we can't do anything

about, namely, gather collectively for an evening of ringing chords and the camaraderie our hobby provides in abundance, let's focus on how we can still make ourselves better singers.

If you're like me (and many of you are, I'd be willing to bet), you've really let yourself go when it comes to personal time rehearsing, memorizing, and learning music from the current Chapter list. I've got a news flash for you: Those songs aren't going away! When that glorious day arrives when we can meet once again for a rehearsal, your Director will probably start you out singing our beloved Pole Cats. But then comes the repertoire from the show list that had to be postponed.

"But it's so hard to work on my craft when I have nothing to really prepare for," you have probably been telling yourself. But why not work on your music now, so that when you stand on the risers you will have a renewed confidence in singing because you prepared for this moment. And just think of what your Director will think! No sense in having to knock the rust off in rehearsal when you can take ten to fifteen minutes a day on warm-up exercises, music review, and note/ word memorization.

Here are a few suggestions for you in honing your skills. Many Chapters are meeting weekly on Zoom (or some other social Internet site). Usually the meeting is at the same time and day as your rehearsal had been. "But I don't do well on my computer." "I don't like meeting on a computer." "It's not the same when trying to sing while on the computer," and numerous other excuses. I confess that I do not warm to this means of meeting, rehearsing or singing. And I'm on a half-dozen such meetings a week with the various organizations and groups I'm associated with. If your Chapter is not meeting on Zoom, then connect with a Chapter that is. You'll be more than welcome.

Several of our Barbershop brothers and sisters have been meeting unofficially, that is to say, they are not meeting as a recognized official Chapter, standing around singing mostly Pole Cats. At least that's what we do in the group I sing with every other week. Ask around and you'll quickly discover where one of these groups is meeting. It is an eye-opening experience, trust me. Some wear masks, and we maintain a social distance (or try to).

Spend some time on the BHS website http:// Barbershop.org> to learn about all the opportunities that are available. Look under Education, specifically, Virtual Harmony University; BHS Online Education; Vocal Health Resources; and Free Classes and Tutorials. Or try Events: 2021 Virtual Midwinter Convention; 2021 International Convention (Cleveland); or Find Events Near You.

So, dive back into our wonderful hobby, and enjoy yourself again. Your participation will also uplift others who are in the same situation.

It does actually accomplish a number of good things. It allows each individual to hear where they need to work on things like blending with others or coloring their own interpretation to match the original track.

The other great thing about these weekly meetings is they allow the members to enjoy the camaraderie of others and the team of characters we all know and love. I was told a number of years ago that it is the MUSIC that draws us together, but I think it attracts people who share a lot in common and therefore we are very compatible. We all become good friends and enjoy one another's company. These media meetings allow that to happen for us and aid in our relaxation and enjoyment for an hour or two

I am looking forward to the Fall 2021 Convention aboard the ship as a coming-out party and a rip-roaring festival of Barbershop music in all the places aboard the ship. We will experience our music and enjoy ourselves performing in pick-up Quartets, and I look forward to all of the contests and party atmosphere that we will have because of the time we have been away from singing.

A short bio follows for you get acquainted with her backgound.


Music has always been a huge part of my life. My earliest memories have been of family or church hootenannies in our backyard with everyone grabbing some sort of instrument. I started with spoons and graduated to guitar at age six. I've never really chorded correctly since I learned to cheat because my hands were too small to reach around the neck of my dad's guitar. I remember playing bits of ukulele, mandolin, banjo, and tenor guitar at some point. Someone would teach me a few chords and that was my instrument for the evening. Playing gospel music is a bit like woodshedding. If you have a good ear you have it made. By the time I reached high school I had moved to flute, piccolo and oboe. Being a band nerd was one of the best things I passed down to my two children and eight grandchildren. Almost all play instruments of some kind.

As for my Barbershop history, it began with a boy. A boy whose mother, sister, aunt, and cousins were all involved in this "singing group" that was unknown to me. Necessity is the mother of invention

Many chapters have been meeting regularly on Zoom. If your chapter is not among those, please take a look at my articles in the summer and fall issues of Westunes for some ideas on how you can get on the bandwagon.

While Zoom is great for meeting, schmoozing, and learning music together, unfortunately there are numerous technical reasons why it simply does not allow singing together remotely. Those wonderful 'virtual' performances we've enjoyed by the AIC, Masters of Harmony and others are actually the product of individual recordings that are painstakingly stretched and twisted in the studio to get all of the voices in synchronization. There is currently no magical program that allows us to sing together over the internet satisfactorily.

That being said, here's a chapter that has taken an entirely different approach. While there was a modest investment involved, the men of the Regina, Saskatchewan Chapter have come up with an ingenious solution to the problem of singing together while physically separated, the details of which appear in an article recently published in the Land O' Lakes District's Pitch Piper, Nov-Dec 2020, page 4.

Carbershop Brings Regina Men Together for "Harmonic Euphoria" Through Radio Dial Submitted by Gord Moker

A Regina barbershop chorus is tuning their car radios along with their voices to sing safely during the COVID19 pandemic.

The Living Skies Chorus has been doing drive-in rehearsals in the parking lot of Thom Collegiate.

They sing in their cars through wireless mics that feed into a mixer and are aired through a FM transmitter to their vehicles. "For the first time in eight months, we're able to sing together," said Al Neufeld, the director of the chorus.

In March the barbershop chorus, an a cappella singing group, went silent when recreational activities were cancelled due to the pandemic. They tried rehearsing online through Zoom, but it didn't allow them to harmonize.

While the group could have moved back to singing at the Knox-Metropolitan United Church in August, Neufeld said the decided it wasn't worth the risk, given that some members are older than 50. But the ideas of singing over Zoom for a year or more wasn't appealing either.

Barbershop conception

Neufeld came across a group in New Jersey rehearsing in what they dubbed "carbershop." "I just stopped everything and I just asked them the question, "How badly do you want to sing together?" And most everyone said, "Yeah, badly." So I pitched the idea. They like it and we ran with it," said Neufeld.

After a few test runs, the men of Living Skies Chorus are singing in harmony once again. Each singer pulls up to the parking lot in their vehicle, turns on their wireless mic, tunes their radios to 106.5 FM, and watches Neufeld from a window of Thom Collegiate, where he directs and adjusts the levels of the 24 mics.

"It was phenomenal because the sound was immediate." There was no lag time," said Gord Moker, president of the Living Skies Chorus.

"Reminded me of the first time that I sang with the chorus back in 2007 and chills went up my back and my neck because the harmonies were just so wonderful. I call it harmonic euphoria. It's like nothing else when you sing in a choir or a choral group, when you're singing in harmony and everybody doing their part and staying on their pitch."

In between warmups and songs, the men catch up and joke over the FM station. "We're really a brotherhood. We get together once a week and we enjoy each other's company," said Moker.

"This whole carbershop is something that brings us together. We're able to sing together, we were able to do a little bit of fellowship among ourselves while we're in vehicles. We're safe."

The group is still figuring out how it might perform and do community outreach. In other years, the men would visit long-term care homes in the winter, perform for seniors, then stay to visit with them. "We love to perform. We love to entertain. We love to make sure that we can put smiles on people's faces," said Wayne Hellquist, a member of the chorus.

Neufeld said he would like to be able to make the "carbershop" portable and fine a way for them to pull to a parking lot and ask the audience to tune their radios to listen.

"The human soul, the human body is built for harmony," he said. "In this world of ours today, with everything going on, we all need a little bit of harmony."



Central Arizona Quartet Chapter Bv Bill Kane

While continuing to meet on Zoom sessions due to the virus, the Chapter is exploring ways we can meet and sing in-person, but safely. The new "Singer's Mask" seems to hold promise for more comfortable singing. They are still so new that we haven't found research yet on how much protection they provide from the virus.

Bass Jay Breen has obtained equipment for his Quartet Cut for Time, that the Chapter Quartets are testing for possible Chapter rehearsal use. Each singer is a safe distance apart and on a head mic. The individual singer's voice goes into an audio mixer and then the sound of the group (Quartet or Chorus) is broadcast back without any lag on an FM band to receivers and headsets on the singers. The experience for the singer is the same as being close, although the singers are a safe distance apart. This is a variation on the "Drive-In" rehearsals being done by Chapters back in New Jersey that BHS featured on a webinar.

We are sad to report the passing of Joe Salz. In his 72 years of BHS membership, Joe was named to the FWD Hall of Fame, singing in many fine Quartets including two District champs-Desert Knights in 1957 and Stage Four in 1972. Prior to his passing, several of our Quartets had the pleasure and honor of singing for Joe and provided some Barbershop entertainment for

him and the others in his home facility. The three Quartets included one that was a combination of Oasis, Saucebox, and Interchangeable Parts, Don Salz's Quartet Cut for Time, and International Senior Champs High Priority

Mesa Chapter By John Soper

The East Valley Barbershop Harmonizers from Mesa. Arizona. continue to move forward, readjusting our focus due to COVID-19. Since no live shows are possible, an increased focus has been placed on improving vocal quality and performance skills. The Chairman is the most recent recipient. b) At the call of the Chairman, members of the Far Western District Hall of Fame will attend the annual meeting held in conjunction with the Fall District Contest and Convention. c) Each member attending the annual meeting may nominate one or more candidates for election into the Hall of Fame. Nominees must receive a minimum of two seconds to the nomination to become a viable candidate. Once nominations have been accepted, the list will be submitted to the members present to vote for their choice by secret ballot. The two nominees receiving the most votes will be the FWD Hall Of Fame candidates. d) Prior to December 1, the Chairman will provide a written ballot to all current members of the FWD Hall of Fame. Each member may vote for one person only. The ballot must be returned on or before January 1 of the
