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


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

New Year, New Organization

Greetings, Far Western District! This is my first column in Westunes written as your new District President. Thank you for the high honor and please wish us all good fortune as we begin 2004 together!

The most significant change for 2004 is the return to the Division management structure. Your board of directors now includes five District Vice Presidents (DVP), one for each of our five divisions. They are **Clark Abrahamson, Ivan Jensen, Bob Lally, Bernard Priceman** and **Dick Whitten.** The DVPs are there to provide active managerial liaison between the District Board and the chapters for district matters. Working with chapter presidents and chapter counselors the DVP will be a source of encouragement and help to our chapters as we work toward achieving our goals. One of his more important responsibilities will be to ensure that each chapter has ready access to advice and counsel from district specialists. We want to make sure that our chapters are receiving needed resources and that their voice is heard at the district level.

We have also revived the office of the Executive Vice President (EVP). Our EVP is **Bill Cale**, and Bill will also serve as chairman of the CSLT committee, and will serve as the coordinator of the new Operations Team. Also serving on the board will be **Dick Girvin** as Secretary, **Jim Sherman** as Treasurer and **John Krizek** as Immediate Past President and chairman of the YMIH committee.

Operations Team

Delivering the needed resources to our chapters is the newly formed Operations Team (OT) comprised of the functional committee chairmen. Each is an appointed position and is responsible for supporting all chapters in the district in such areas as Chorus Director Development, Marketing and PR, Membership Development, Music and Performance and Young Men in Harmony, etc. These committee chairmen are not members of the board unless they hold another position that is included on the board, such as in the cases of John Krizek and Bill Cale.

The Operations Team is the working group designed to deliver the resources to our chapters to help maximize the barbershop experience for all our members. You'll be learning more about the OT as well as the new board structure as time goes by.

Spring Convention

Our Spring Convention this year will be held in Reno/Sparks Nevada at John Ascuaga's Nugget. Believe it or not, it is just around the corner and will be here before you know it. Building on the success of last fall's district convention, our events team is again planning a convention chock full of singing and activities to please almost everyone. 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

I urge each of you to step up into a leadership roll.

DIRECTOR SCHOLARSHIPS FOR 2004

GREAT NEWS! There will be eleven scholarships available next year for Directors' College. (Ten of these are funded by the Society board and Harmony Foundation. The remaining scholarship is District funded). The criteria for those applying this year have been expanded considerably. Priority will still be given to front line directors who have never attended Directors' College. If there are any remaining scholarships available, the following will be considered in awarding them:

- 1. Barbershop Experience
- 2. Size of Chorus
- 3. Contest Score in the last contest with this director
- 4. Time since participation in the last competition
- 5. Time since the director last attended Directors' College

Also, if there are still some scholarships available, associate directors may eligible. The scholarship covers the tuition only (\$475). It is up to the director and his/her chapter to provide the transportation costs. Please know, that the College is scheduled for August 1-8, 2004 in St. Joseph, Missouri. Changes Are In Progress

Today I find my feet sliding about in the enormous pair of shoes I've been asked to fill. Dick Girvin, my predecessor as DVPC&J, performed as flawlessly in that role as he has in every other that he has undertaken during his long and illustrious career as a leader in the FWD. The task became even more challenging when we loaded five large boxes of recorded contest and judging history into the trunk of my car. On the one hand it was fascinating to go back and find score sheets from my first quartet competition in 1969. On the other hand it was sobering to realize that at least for the next two years it will be my responsibility to see that all contests in the FWD are organized and run in a manner that will provide the best possible experience for our competitors, judges, and audiences.

In that regard, we are about to make history in the FWD by combining a Division Contest with the International Preliminary Quartet Contest in Reno next March. This is an exciting prospect, but also one that is going to provide some real challenges. The FWD has eliminated the Small Chapter Chorus Contest from this annual happening, but it still means that we will be obliged to hold both a quartet and chorus contest to determine the division standings as well as a quartet contest with semi-finals and finals to establish the quartet competitors that will represent the FWD at next year's International Contest in Louisville.

We will not combine the division quartet contest with the International Prelims. Hence on Friday evening we will have the quartet semi-final round for the International Prelims, with the final round on Saturday evening. Where do we fit the Division

contests? As this is being written in November no decision has been made, but it is likely that the Division Quartet contest will be held Saturday morning, and the Chorus Contest in the afternoon.

In turn, this means that we are going to have to split the triple panel, so that we will have a double panel for the International Prelims, and a single panel judging the Division Contest. As you might imagine this will also entail a fairly complicated schedule for doing evaluations, but somehow it will all come out in the wash!

I hope to see a large turnout in Reno. If you're not able to make that convention please plan on being at your Division contest. Above and beyond the scores and placement this hobby is really about the fellowship we enjoy. Be sure you get your fair share!

Booking A Convention

"so you want to know how we book a convention site? There is a lot more to it than what you can imagine.

When we look for a convention site for a Spring or Fall convention there are many things we have to look for. Hotel, contest site, meeting rooms, available eating facilities are just a few of the things needed to run a successful convention.

During the Far Western District major conventions (Spring and Fall) rooms are needed for meetings, quartet and chorus warm up rooms, barbershop shop, AHSOW and the contest site itself.

Let me use as an example what we go through when we book a convention in Reno. Since we don't use a seperate facility for the contest the venue for the contest falls under the contract with the hotel. We estimate how many sleeping rooms will be needed for the duration of the convention. In this case (2004) we feel that 275 rooms are needed for Friday and Saturday or n550 room nights. At this point the hotel agrees to how many meeting rooms they will give us (without charge) if we fulfill our room commitment> The contest site (Rose Ballroom) normally rents for \$5,000. If we don't fill our room block we are then subject to a penalty which would add a big cost to the convention.

So we need you all. This is one of those times everyone can stay at the headquarters hotel. The room rate (\$88) is supter for a top rated hotel facility. 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Marketing in 2004

The International Marketing and PR Committee Chairman for 2004 is Clark Abrahamson. Clark recently chaired the Leadership Forum in Racine for all District VPs and Committee Chairmen responsible for the Marketing and PR programs for the coming year.

The primary Marketing and Public Relations goals for the chapters (society wide) for 2004 will be:

- Promote and participate in the 2004 United We Sing event on Veteran's Day Nov. 11th. This date was selected because it has important meaning to both the U.S. and Canada. successes of the 2003 9/11 presentations were a clear indicator of how a properly planned and marketed event can greatly enhance the image of Barbershoping in a community and also allow the chapters and quartets to play an important role in the social fabric and community celebrations. As the details of this North American event unfold, each chapter in the Far Western District will be kept informed and supplied with the tools necessary to a successful effort.
- The second priority from International is to insure that each chapter has an elected or appointed Public Relations and Marketing person on the board or reporting to the President. In the past most chapters limited their public relations and marketing to their shows but declining society membership and the desire to improve the image of Barbershop calls for each chapter to also have someone dedicated to image building and community relations.

With the new structure in our district, each chapter will have a significant support team in their Division Vice Presidents, Chapter Coaches and District Marketing and PR Chairman.

Chapter Boards can now call upon their elected or appointed Marketing and PR man to work with the District and International resources to greatly enhance the visibility and image of their chapter.

The FWD and Society are establishing communications tools that will be available to all chapter M&PR men. These important tools will make possible the sharing of ideas, materials and problem solving.

However, all of these PR and marketing efforts require that each chapter have someone dedicated to implementing the tools.

Chapter President, if your Board does not include a Marketing and PR member please send me and e-mail or call me so I can help you solve this problem.

Membership Matters

There's no U in Membership. Or, to say it another way, there's no YOU in membership. It seems to be one of those areas that we expect someone else to take care of. We can debate the reasons for declining membership until the cows come home but the simple fact of the matter is that the ultimate responsibility as well as the ultimate solution falls on us, all of us.

If someone is receiving a rewarding Barbershopping experience most every week, they generally remain members for many years. If they cease to have that rewarding experience, they leave us. I realize that there are some of us that wouldn't leave even if everything went to hell in a hand basket. We must be careful not judge others by ourselves. We all look at our hobby in a slightly different way.

The alternative opportunities and options available to us are great, as are the increasing demands on our time. Today's lifestyles are very demanding of our time. We find ourselves constantly having to make choices based upon the amount of discretionary time we have.

So, having said all that, what are some of the more obvious reasons that our membership continues to diminish? At the risk of offending some of my fellow Barbershoppers, let's consider who has the greatest week-in and week-out influence on the members of the Chapter or chorus. You have probably already picked the most logical answer - the music director.

Now ask yourself this question; "in my chapter, does our music director contribute greatly toward insuring that the members, new and old, are having a rewarding Barbershopping experience every week?" If you cannot say yes, then you have just identified one of the reasons for our declining membership. I caution you to understand that we have only identified ONE reason and I know my remarks will not offend the many outstanding musical leaders that work hard to insure that rewarding experience week-in and week-out.. There are many other reasons for declining membership and we will discuss them in future issues of Westunes.

If this column fails to appear again, it's probably because I have been directed to jump off the end of the San Clemente pier wearing concrete boots. I cannot imagine who might be responsible, but perhaps the culprit thought that my remarks were a little "off key".

My Whittier Chorus has one every year, and I can tell you they are VERY helpful. Just this year we had Lloyd Steinkamp and Terry Aramian review our Annual Show. We met after the Matinee, and they made several suggestions that we immediately incorporated into the evening Show which made it MUCH better. We will continue to have Reviews every year because of the many wonderful things they do to help make us aware of what we need to do to get that (Standing Ovation) we're all looking for. All it takes is 2 tickets in the 1st row of the balcony, plus mileage, plus overnight, if he has to stay over. There's no such thing as easy retirement for Far Western District presidents any more. So here I am back as chairman of youth outreach. Thanks to the leadership of **Ed Bejarana**, who's had this job the last couple years, the youth activities momentum in this District has grown exponentially. (That's a big word meaning a lot.) Ed's leaving us for the Evergreen District, but he's left a major stamp on this District. With so much going on, it's going to be fun to keep up. There is lots of news to share.

YOUTH CAMP VIDEO COMING SOON

A powerful new tool to help spread the barbershop message at the high school level will be available soon after the first of the year. Filmed at the NorCal Youth Harmony Camp in September, this 15-minute program, designed to be shared with students, school choirs, teachers and family members, is being edited as this column goes to press.

The project was conceived by **Ed Bejarana** and **Lawrence Stern** of Santa Cruz, and funded by the District Youth Education Fund. A professional film crew—led by the mother of a former teenage member of the **Placerville chapter, Sean York,** now singing Tenor with **OC Times**—got carried away and shot 13 hours of videotape, which has made for a difficult editing challenge. But the material was too good to pass up. There are lots of interviews of campers, tag-singing with **Metroloplis** and **Q**, and a performance by the 93-voice camper chorus which was "off the paper" on five songs between Friday night and the Sunday morning show for parents and friends. Altogether, an incredible experience.

Chapters will be asked to purchase multiple copies of the video for \$10 each, to help cover the cost of production and distribution, and share with schools. Watch this space and the District web site for news of its availability.

YOUTH FESTIVALS ABOUND

Chapter-hosted one-day youth harmony festivals have been popping up all over the District, from Honolulu to Mesa to Reno. On February 21st, a double-header will provide barbershop exposure to students throughout Southern California. At Orange Coast College in Costa Mesa, the 4th annual Young Men's Harmony Festival will be sponsored by the Masters of Harmony and the Southern California Vocal Association. Last year 130+ young men from over two dozen high schools from San Diego to Los Angeles participated in the all-day affair, and joined the MOH on stage in the grand finale of the show for parents and friends. Meanwhile, on the same date the Conejo Valley chapter's annual fundraiser for local high school choirs—which last year expanded to two shows with help from the Rincon Beach chapter, and featured Dick Van Dyke as MC—will be a festival for Ventura, Conejo, and Simi Valley high school singers. It will be

held at Newberry Park High School and include a barbershop component with guest clinician, Society staff music educator Jim **DeBusman**. Over 100 singers are expected. Jim will be visiting high schools in the Conejo/Ventura area in preparation for the event.

Mark Freedkin, SoCal YHIM coordinator, will again chair the MOH event; Larry Nixon is in charge at Conejo. If any other chapters are interested in hosting festivals, let us know—the District has a growing body of expertise ready to be shared.

HIGH SCHOOL QUARTET CONTEST

The 14th annual FWD high school quartet contest will be held in conjunction with the Spring convention and international prelims in Reno, on March 20th. (See announcement page 21.) Local competitions throughout the District before then are being encouraged, such as the Santa Clarita Valley chapter's annual quartet contest, and the Northern California high school quartet competition which is part of the NorCal novice contest. Last year the Aloha chapter staged a high school contest where first prize was a trip for the quartet to the District finals in Reno-where they won the trophy! Such events provide opportunities for more young men to participate, receive coaching, and gain experience. Cash awards are provided at the District finals to the competitors' school music programs.

Throughout the Far western District, we can proudly say that youth outreach is a way of life. I'm sure there are many chapter programs worthy of mention here, that I don't even know about. Bravo. Let us know. Write them up. Send Ray pictures for Westunes. Many of these projects are ideal candidates for funding through local charitable grants. Does your chapter have someone seeking such grants? Is your chapter YMIH chairman logged in with this office? Have you booked a school choir or high school quartet on your next show?

Join the parade. It's our life. It's fun. And it's our future.

OC Times: Barbershop Ambassadors

District third place finalist quartet OC Times, all members of the Westminster chapter, have been busy conducting clinics for college and high school singers.

In October the quartet (Sean York Sean Devine, Patrick Claypool and Drew Harrah) conducted a "Masters Class" for the choral department at Cal State University San Bernardino, with an overflow crowd of 60 students getting a dose of barbershop enthusiasm, and the quartet getting rave reviews. In November, they participated in a special choral music clinic for high school singers held at the University of California Irvine campus, sponsored by professor of choral music Dr. Joseph Huszti. The professor directs a men's ensemble called Men in Blaque. Over 60 singers from several Orange County high schools attended, and the men's choirs from two of them also performed.

After their performance, **OC Times** stepped outside and—as we barbershoppers might expect—kept singing for several of the young men at the end of the clinic. When Sean York-who is completing his degree in music education and student teaching at Irvine High School—returned to his class the next day, he was flooded with comments from the students about how cool barbershop quartets are.

The oldest member of **OC Times** is 27, and two of them are alumni of the FWD high school quartet competition.

"They'll be some changes made..."

Returning from the Leadership Forum in Racine and COTS in Los Angeles, many people asked about this new position and the Foundation. I hope these frequently asked questions help:

What is changing about Harmony Foundation?

Although the Foundation management structure remains, the Trustees are asking districts to create a new network of volunteer talent. Through a newly created district vice president of financial development, the rest of team consists of a grant resource person and a major gifts person. The intent is to provide a referral service to the districts, as well as maintaining the connection to the Founders Club Endowment and annual giving to the Foundation.

When did all this change occur?

The concept and framework was presented to the Society Board of Directors and District Presidents at the Montreal International Convention in July 2003 for implementation at the Leadership Forum in October 2003.

How do the new positions affect the Far Western District?

Our district is fortunate to have many of these changes in place. Michael Frazer (Santa Barbara chapter) continues the grant writing instructing, and HF Chairman Don Salz (Sacramento chapter) continues the successful convention raffle portion. Robb Ollett (Santa Rosa chapter, and professional fund raiser) was asked by the district board to become the vice president of financial development for Harmony Foundation. By the way, this is NOT a new district-elected office; it is new within the operational side of the district management.

What changes will we see in the district?

Most likely very little change will be obvious over the next few months. Robb is assembling the remaining members of the team, and working with Harmony Foundation President Clarke **Caldwell** in Kenosha on the details of the plan.

What about the grants that Harmony Foundation used to provide?

The Foundation was pleased to provide grants to music programs for the past many years. In the restructuring and eagerness to search for other sources of funding, the Foundation granting program has been suspended for now. The new focus is to find effective ways to support the Society's programs, and teach districts (and chapters) on how to get state and local community grants.

What if I want to contribute directly to one of the district's program?

All donations are appreciated and can be channeled through the district framework. It is possible that others will join for underwrite something specific. For the immediate, the district officers and Harmony Foundation will join forces to agree on needed programs, the best channeling of funds, and announce the opportunity.

What if I want to give locally and not through Harmony Foundation?

Harmony Foundation is grateful for all donations. They also encourage chapters to give locally - a school, a hospital, food shelter, whatever the chapter decides is the best use of funds for being good community ambassadors. All the Foundation asks is to be kept informed of your intentions in case there is a "larger cause" that all Society chapters could invest. It also allows the Foundation to share the good ideas that chapters use to raise funds in communities - arts council grants, park and recreation funds, symphony joint concerts, pizza sales, corporate gifts, etc.

During this undefined hiatus, you may see one or more of the guys from Freestyle (NOT Andy, mind you) in other quartets, trying to get their fix of harmony. We all love this hobby and have competitive streaks that are a mile wide. For the record, Bruce's is actually 2 miles wide, but its controlled through medication.

We are in the process of producing a Freestyle video for those that have asked, and we're hoping to have something available by Christmas....we're not sure which Christmas but it will definitely be available by Christmas.

And so, to all of our friends, family, fans, pets AND groupies, thank you so much for all the love and laughter you have shared with us these past six years. We plan on many more memories to come...we're just not quite sure when to expect them.

You Deserve a Standing Ovation

In 1985 the late, great Bob Johnson, then Musical Leader of the Society, asked Lloyd Steinkamp, Darryl Flinn and Harlan Wilson (Suntones) to put together a seminar for coaches to help them learn the skills and develop a more positive approach to their coaching sessions. The next year Lloyd Steinkamp rolled out this important program in his Keynote Address at Harmony College then followed that with two years of HC training sessions. Lloyds presentation was video taped and can be acquired from International just ask for "How to earn a Standing Ovation," (SO)

"Uncle" Lloyd is still very much involved with the program and in recent communications expressed his concern to this editor that quartets are not embracing this program with the same enthusiasm as choruses.

" Select material to showcase your best talents "

QC: Uncle Lloyd, why do so many quartets fail to see that the SO as something that can benefit them?

UL: If you talk to the members of some of the Society Champion and top Show Quartets and ask them how long it took them to get standing ovations at each performance, they'll all say :"YEARS!" I'm talking about the traditional show audience, not a contest or barbershop crowd.



It takes a long time to develop the "act"- the stuff that goes between the songs on stage. Unfortunately, too many quartets are satisfied with whatever audience reaction they get when, in reality, the audience may only be comparing them to the other acts that preceded them in the show.

QC: Can you identify the single biggest mistake quartets make in their shows and public performances?

UL: Lack of planning in song order, which is really another term for poor timing.

The history of theatre, Broadway, Movies and, television all tell the same story. The performer must select material to showcase his/her best talents.

Most of all the order in which that material is performed is crucial and designed to keep the listener on the edge of the seat. It's easier to jump to a standing position from the edge of one's seat than slouching deep down and waiting for the time to pass.

QC: Many Quartets like to add comedy to their show package but many also fail to get more than a titter from the audience. As someone who is known for your comedic timing and creativity, what advice can you give quartets on how to handle comedy?

UL: If you don't have a truly funny guy in the quartet, then don't try to invent one. Have your spokesman share information about the songs that you are singing. A small bit of research can solve this problem rapidly. You display your strengths, not your Achilles' Heel!

A performer must know who he is and project that personality, just a little larger than life. The secret is to get the audience to like you and then to love you. Keep the talking to a minimum and get off at the right time.

OC: Do you think quartets can benefit from SO evaluation of their contest packages too?

UL: To my knowledge, EVERY Quartet who has requested a review has benefited dramatically and have told us so. I'm talking about Champions and Medalists. It should be that the better you sing, the more professional the act will be. 'Tain't so."

QC: How does a quartet make arrangements for a SO evaluation?

UL: Just contact me or the 2004 Chairman of the FWD Music & Performance Committee, Stan Sharpe at vocalteacher@earth-

QC: Can you name a few FWD quartets that do a great job with their show packages?

UL: I think the best demonstration of my advice is my own quartet The Desert Knights, regardless of our age and vocal deterioration, we can still get an audience on their feet through pure entertainment. Add to the list VARIETY, NIGHTLIFE, FINALE and MICHIGAN JAKE and you have some good examples of quartets who pay attention to the fundamentals.

I am convinced that everyone who has had the desire and opportunity to perform in public wants to give their best and receive the audience's best in return. The best an audience can give is a standing ovation.





Harmony for **Lunch Bunch**

It's the third Thursday any third Thursday of any month. At the Plaza Haufbrau in suburban Sacramento, between thirty

to fifty of the faithful are gathered in the back room, munching on corned beef sandwiches, coleslaw and other German delicacies. Promptly at 12:00 noon, their leader arises, blows a Bb on his pitchpipe, and everyone begins singing The Old Songs, usually followed by Down our Way. Thus, another Harmony for Lunch Bunch is underway. This has been happening in the same place at the same time each month for thirteen years.

What happens at 12:00 noon is predictable, as is the singing of Keep the Whole World Singing at 1:00 pm. What goes on inbetween is neither predictable nor ever the same. For example, in November, the anniversary month, among the forty-one patrons present were seven organized quartets and six current or former chapter music directors. Every quartet got to sing two of their best songs to enthusiastic applause. In between, there was gang singing, tag-in quartets, pick-a-quartet-for-a-buck, lots of laughing, tag singing and announcements of Barbershop and Sweet Adeline chapter activities.

This group was founded by **Howard Donley**, who now lives in Cody, Wyoming with wife Joanne. When Donley moved from the San Francisco Bay Area to Sacramento, he saw there was no Harmony for Lunch Bunch similar to the one he had regularly attended. He talked to fellow barbershoppers, and the first meeting was held at the Haufbrau in November, 1990. The restaurant furnishes the room at no cost but expects everyone to have lunch. Patrons go through the cafeteria line or the salad bar and pay regular prices. Seniors get a 10% discount for the asking.

HFLB was originally co-chaired by Bill Donnell and Clark Abrahamson. Donnell is now deceased and Abrahamson is the incoming Division Vice President for Northern California East. The chair is now is ably handled by Jack McPhillips, who is well known throughout the Sacramento area. People who attend

2003-2004 FWD chi CORY HUNT I MIKE STEWART & come from as far as Chico, Stockton and the Bay Area. Ev Nau from the Society staff has attended on several occasions and we have been visited as well by Tom Gentry. Usually, four Barbershop and two Sweet Adeline chapters are represented.

To remind everyone of an upcoming meeting, a one-page publication is distributed ten days beforehand. Copies go out by snailmail and by e-mail. Jack McPhillips is the "scribe," Kent Borrowdale is the editor and publisher. Donations from the group support mailing expenses.

What keeps the patrons coming back month after month? It isn't because of great administrative organization . . . there's none, outside of McPhillips and Borrowdale. It's not that people expect to listen to great singing . . . no quartet performing there was ever on the International stage; and the men and women that attend and sing are Joe and Jill Barbershoppers. No, it's something else: the fun of participating, the comradeship and the joy of ringing chords with old friends with your mouth half-full of good German food. It's what Barbershop should be . . . the fun of singing. We know it will continue – on the third Thursday of each month – for a long time to come.


