There have been some substantial changes in the Society Aims for 2014 which align them with the results of the 2011 Chapter Visitation Surveys. The focus is on addressing the issues most often cited by our Chapters in that survey.

As of this writing, we also just completed the International Midwinter Convention in Long Beach, CA. What an amazing event! Major kudos to the South Bay Chapter and their volunteers for doing a huge job hosting this convention. The Youth Chorus Festival showcased a ton of talent (including eight youth choruses from the Far Western District). From the opening party on the Queen Mary, to the Friday and Saturday shows featuring our Top 5 International Medalists as well as the **Masters of Harmony** and **Westminster**, to the Senior Quartet Contest (and our great new Senior Champions **Faces For Radio**), it was a weekend not to be forgotten. We even had a couple of reunion performances by our 1998 International Champions **Revival**.

The District Presidents Council and Society Board held both separate and joint meetings at Midwinter, along with CEO Marty Monson, Harmony Foundation CEO Clarke Caldwell and HF Director of Development Ryan Killeen. A number of good ideas and future direction came from those discussions, some of which are short term and some longer term, but rest assured that Marty is a dynamic leader with a lot of vision for what the Society can be and concrete plans on how to get us there. The District board will

be discussing how the Far Western District Association of Chapters can help advance the Society AIMs, and Marty's vision, at our board meeting in March, and hope to have some recommendations for the HOD at that time

Publication of this issue of the Westunes is March 1, only a few weeks prior to the combined District Spring-Southeast-Southwest convention in Riverside, hosted by the Brea Chapter. That's shaping up to be a great event, too, so if you haven't gotten your registration yet, now is the time! Details are on the FWD Website:

- International Contest. **Masterpiece** from the SE Division won it all. The 2013 Quartet Champions!
- Chapter Administration: We had 11 chapters attend Leadership Academy last year. A good showing but we can do better. There is always something we can improve for the chapter, e.g. some chapters have not updated their leaders in ebiz. This is an easy one for the Secretary.
- Grow: As of January 31, 2014 we are up 14 members over prior year-to-date. Most Chapters are holding steady. Kudos to the Brea Chapter for recognition as a "Harold Hill Diamond Plateau Winner". They were one of just seven awarded by the Society for growth and achievement during the Harold Hill campaign.
- Have Fun: I had a great time in 2013. How about you? Fun is a personal thing and our chapters seem to have a handle on it. Our 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary gave us an opportunity to share the joy with the community and fellow Barbershoppers. There are many definitions of fun so please find yours and enjoy the harmony.

  - We have great Directors and amazing coaches in the Far Western District. Take advantage of our coaching programs and consider competing this year. Sing for score or evaluation only. It is a valuable performance goal and way to measure your achievement. It is also a lot of fun.

  - Education: Online and at Harmony University and Harmony College. There is great stuff out there.
- Chapter Administration: Take advantage of the educational offerings given by the District and Society. Online and at events. Please send you team to the District Leadership Academy this year and use the District Leadership Team throughout the year.
- Grow: Our numbers are up but . . .

Please reach out and renew these members. Encourage the auto-renewal option so your members have the convenience of singing without the hassle of remembering to renew.

- Have Fun: This is the year to enhance your experiences with amazing "local" events.
  - Brea is hosting our 2014 Spring Convention at the historic Fox Theater in Riverside California. It will be an event to remember and include the International Quartet Prelims. Mark your calendars for March 20-23 for the best Spring District Convention in the Society as evidenced by Lodi 2013.
  - Both International Conventions are in our neighborhood this year. Midwinter was in Long Beach, January 28 February 2, and International in **Las Vegas**, June 29 July 6. Don't miss this opportunity to *drive* to International.
  - Be sure to visit the Westunes Chapter Reports and see all the fun things they have been doing this fall and consider joining a quartet if you haven't already. There is a special bond in Quartet you seldom experience elsewhere.

My wife Lynn and I are at the BHS Midwinter convention as I wrap up this article. What a terrific event! From the Queen Mary Party on

Thursday, to the **Westminster** performance at the end of the Show of Champions on Saturday night, it was fantastic. The Youth Chorus Festival gets better and better. I am so proud of all of our FWD youth choruses. Congratulations also to senior quartets

**Velvet Frogs** (3) and **Joint Venture** (28) for representing the FWD so well.

We were in the midst of planning the 2013 NorCal Leadership Academy when I wrote my last Westunes article. The facilities at McGeorge Law School in Sacramento were perfect for our needs and the interactive emphasis in all the classes matched well with the excellent faculty. FWD Dean Craig Hughes and associate dean for NorCal, Richard Lund, put together a program that was a real step up in chapter leadership training. Every new chapter officer should attend in fall 2014. If you are an experienced chapter leader, plan on attending at least every couple of years to share your experience and get energized. We will all get better.

One of our FWD goals this year is to revitalize our chapter coaching program including musical coaching. Did you know that the district will pay half the travel expenses of your coach up to \$150? A chapter can do this twice a year or until the funds run out - which hasn't happened. You can find the chorus coaching reimbursement form in the documents section of the FWD website. The procedure is on the form. We are also in the process of updating and posting a list of available coaches. We want to create a Web-based tool that will help your chapter music team find and schedule the right coach for the right time to meet your needs. We are also seriously considering other significant music coaching options and opportunities for chapters – stay tuned.

Another goal is to increase the number of high school quartets participating in the HS Contest. The contest is held at the FWD Spring convention. It would be great if every chapter could sponsor a quartet. In fact it is a good time for chapters to start working with your local high schools to find a way to help bring music back to school – no strings attached.

The FWD Spring Convention is Mar 20-23 in Riverside. The **Gas Light Chorus** is hosting and they have all the pieces in place for an outstanding convention. The House of Delegates meeting is on Friday Mar 21 at 1:30 PM – I hope your chapter will

be represented. I know at least one High School Quartet from our division will compete in the HS contest on Saturday afternoon. The Int'l quartet qualifying finals are Saturday night and I'm already excited to find out which quartets will represent FWD in Las Vegas this summer.

I hope your chapter and quartet is planning to compete in the 2014 NE/NW Division Contests at the Hutchins Street Square in Lodi on May 17, 2014. The Stockton Chapter is hosting this year. We were at the Hutchins Street venue last year for Int'l Prelims and the combined NorCal division contests and it worked out very well. With a year to absorb all the lessons learned, I expect this convention to be outstanding.

# The Care and Feeding of your Director

All our Directors are a treasure and critical to the success of a chapter.

One of the benefits of moving around as much as I have the last couple of years has been to sing for four of the top directors on the west coast: Jim Halvorson of Las Vegas, Gabe Caretto of California Delta, Ron Black formerly of Sacramento, and Donny Rose of Bellevue, WA. And their styles are completely different.

I compare Jim to the Dodger's Tommy Lasorda. He will talk to anyone (a lot), relates well to youth, and is a very funny man. At a recent rehearsal, he said, "Some of you are keeping your head in the same position regardless of where the note is. Others, if you tied a marker to your nose and sang in front of a white board, you could create a Picasso."

Gabe reminds me of the Seattle Seahawk's Pete Carroll and his over-the-top enthusiasm and ambition. His International-caliber chorus also puts on the best and most creative chapter shows I have ever been associated with. Gabe is football tough, too. His favorite words of encouragement are, "Don't suck!"

Like Socrates, who was the student of Plato and the teacher of Aristotle, Ron is a great teacher who never stops learning. His message is fresh, timeless, and limitless. Both the least and the most enlightened students benefit. While the answer to most of his questions is, simply enough, "More air," his teaching on "leading tones" gives me brain pain reminiscent of Metaphysics class in college.

Donny is gentle and inspirational in the fashion of Ghandi (or Yoda?). He sets high standards and it is the members who challenge themselves to meet them or take themselves off the risers, or out of a show or contest. I love this post prior to the last night of their recent membership drive:

The balance I am striving for myself and expect from all of NWS in this type of night is:

- -upbeat, but demanding
- -kind, but fussy
- -overtly friendly and accepting
- -quick pace to meet the needs of the intelligent men
- -care about those who are lost, but don't teach to only the low
- -I am in charge of only me, and that's plenty
- -I will make connections with my music, with my body, with my brothers, and with my director. I need all four to make art.

So what can we do to nurture and nourish our Directors?

**Board:** Provide funds for purchase or creation of learning tracks for all chapter repertoire.

**Program VP:** Maximize rehearsal time by minimizing chapter business announcements. Encourage the Board and Chairmen to maximize use of Email, website, Doodle polls, and weekly handouts. **Section Leaders:** Be pro-active. Consider sectionals before rehearsal or on off-nights – reinforcing the Director's vision and instructions.

**Members:** Spend time outside rehearsal learning your music as soon as you get it. Attend all rehearsals possible. Approach each song in rehearsal as a performance.

## CDD Greg Lyne

Dear Directors and Chorus Singers of FWD.

I recently visited with a good friend who also happens to be a director of a FWD chorus. I mentioned the need to prepare a column for an upcoming Westunes publication and asked him what

he might recommend I share with directors/ singers of our District. He was quick to respond:

"Tell them that the directors and singers need be always involved in what might be called "basic training" - that is, developing and honing our skills both as directors or as singers." He then also stated that "singers need to know that the director is there to help the singer succeed."

Taking his nudge, the question, then, might be "are we working as closely (director and singers) with one another as we might?" Let's hope that we are. An essential part of rehearsal is drill. That means going over, replicating, repeating and establishing. Rehearsing does mean work and expenditure of effort. It needn't be drudgery but the effort must be jointly shared to help the music/singing get better.

There is a recreational aspect to singing in a barbershop chorus. It should be enjoyable and rewarding. Equally as important is the "re-creational" aspect where we "re-create" what lies on the music page - that is, everyone works together to solidify concepts and find ways to allow the music and singing principles to develop. It's a matter of discovering the essence of those musical symbols, the notes, rhythms, text, tempo, musical structure and finding ways to make the music come to life.

We have a wonderful and noble challenge before us! Let us continue to work closely together - directors and singers. When this happens, a better musical product and enhanced vocal ensemble can be the result. Let's go have some fun together!

### M&PR Jerry McElfresh

I had an interesting and timely request last month from a member of one of our District chapters who had been asked by his chapter Board of Directors to take on the position of Vice President of Marketing and PR.

He said he had not done it before but he told the Board that he would consider the offer. He told me that he didn't want do anything if it's not done well (which is a great attitude), then asked for my advice and counsel

There is so much that we can do in the marketing and public relations job to promote our chapter; help to advertise and sell tickets to its performances, promote increased and continuing membership and to spread the word about the joy of singing and listening to Barbershop music, and it can be seen as a daunting task by someone who has never done it before.

I responded to the potential M&PR VP that I would try to give him some useful advice, but I'd tell him right away that my first suggestion would be to build a committee of 2, 3, 4 or more fellow members to help with the job and to not try to do it by himself.

That's not always easy to do but he could ask if anyone has had the job before, if anyone has worked in broadcast or online or print publications, done any work in advertising or public relations or been a successful salesman. The job takes all of those talents along with organizational and coordinative skills and it will be an easier one if there are people who can help. (In addition to being FWD's M&PR Chairman, I am the M&PR VP for my own chapter, and I've found that getting people to help with that job has really been helpful.)

Because the prospective M&PR VP probably missed the fall Leadership Academies held at three sites in the District he missed out on a lot of good ideas on how to be more effective in the job. Gordon Bergthold, current District EVP and former CSLT, and I facilitated discussion on Marketing at the Arizona Leadership Academy and did so by suggesting a few topics and then going around the table, getting suggestions from those in the job about what had worked for them and what had not as they tried to build public awareness of their chapter and Barbershopping.

I'll have more on that in the next issue of Westunes, but for now remember that getting help with the job is Rule Number 1, and Rule Number 2 is to never forget Rule Number 1.

Grow That Chapter!

The more, the merrier -- that's what they say -- and it has never been more true than at a barbershop chapter!

You can have a lot of fun with 20 singers, but when there are 30 singers, the energy is five times greater. And with 40 singers, it's practically electric, there are so many different relationships, and the sound really fills the room!

By the time you have 50 singers, you'll start really believing in yourself -- not just that you can make great music, but that you can even make a big difference in your community.

In this column we're going to talk about how to take your chapter up that ladder by adding 10 singers this year. It's not rocket science, but we're going to change the focus from what you have often been told. We're going to take a bigger approach, that is faster, more effective, and more fun.

If you stop to think about it, it just doesn't make any sense. Our Society's music program is stronger than it has ever been. The quality of our champion quartets and choruses has never been better. Our youth program is phenomenal.

And in the world around us, conditions for recruiting singers are outstanding. The mass media is popularizing a cappella singing, with national television shows like *The Sing Off*. Disneyland's Dapper Dans continue to charm millions. Meanwhile budget cuts that gut the arts in schools make our community singing programs more valuable than ever.

So why is the BHS half the size it was 30 years ago, instead of 10 times bigger?

The answer is painful to confront, but confront it we must: We have been doing something wrong, and we must start doing it differently.

So Membership VPs and Membership Teams in particular -- but all barbershoppers, too -- follow me and we will begin our journey toward growth.

We are going to actually do what I am told daily is impossible -- to grow the Barbershop Harmony Society up to 100,000+ members, where it belongs -- and more important, we are going to grow your chapter by 10 members right away, so you can start having way more fun than you have been having.

Along the way, we are going to explode some myths, and introduce some new organizing principles. We'll talk about different kinds of chapters, and which kind you should be. We are going to talk about what parts of the Harold Hill and SuperCharging programs actually work, and we will identify a few missing "secret ingredients" that will cause singers to almost magically appear at your chapter meeting.

You don't believe it? The Santa Rosa Redwood Chordsmen grew from 30 members to 60 members in less than three years. You can, too. Let's get started.

**Step 1:** We're going to publish full details here in the Westunes, and we'll be sending out PowerPoint shows, and monthly emails, and more. If you are a Membership VP, you will get this automatically. If

you are not a Membership VP and want to get it directly, contact me at <a href="mailto:albaum@gmail.com">albaum@gmail.com</a>, and I'll make sure you are on the list.

**Step 2:** Let's talk about it. Find me at contests and conventions, and Harmony University, and Leadership Academy. Every chapter faces slightly different versions of the same challenges, and good frequent conversations will keep us on track. My job is to help you, and it's the best job I've ever had.

**Step 3:** There is no Step 3. Let's get started.

First we set our goals. I challenged you to get 10 new members this year, but I don't mean the kind of members that show up on the BHS roster. I mean the kind of members that show up at your weekly chorus rehearsal and sing.

So start by taking attendance each week and keep track of it in a notebook, or ideally in a spreadsheet. This is going to be your measure of success. In other words, 10 new members doesn't help if they only replace 10 members who moved, or got sick or quit. We want net gain.

Set the goal wherever you want, but a net gain of 10 makes a very tangible difference for all but the largest chapters, and that tangible difference is going to give you the energy to keep going. You'll need that energy, because what we're going to do is simple, but it isn't easy. It takes work. But it's worth it!

Next, we are going to destroy the myth that the primary job of the Membership Team is outreach. If you have been disappointed by the dozen different kinds of outreach proposed by the Harold Hill program -- Craigslist ads, Church Letters, I Sing Buttons, Letters to Former Members, Event Booths, etc. -- then you are ready to hear the truth.

I'm not criticizing the Harold Hill program -- I like it. We used it very successfully in Santa Rosa. But outreach is not your biggest problem. Outreach is not the first problem you need to tackle. And by itself, outreach accomplishes almost nothing.

Instead, we are going to start with the weekly chapter meeting itself. Is it an irresistibly fun experience for all members? Is it engaging for both advanced singers and beginners? Is it simultaneously welcoming and challenging? Does every member, every week, learn something, accomplish something, and experience a sense of fellowship?

If your meetings are like that, the rest of the program of attracting and retaining members is going to be very easy. If your meetings are not like that, then we have to change it, or else the rest is going to be unnecessarily difficult.

So go audit your next weekly chorus rehearsal. Watch to see who gets welcomed and who gets ignored. Count all the ways that guests are made to feel special and welcome. Check to see whether the newer singers are supported, or are they ignored by cliques?

Are there plenty of easy opportunities for good quartet singing, where you get that satisfying experience of ringing a really good chord -- so satisfying that you're guaranteed to come back next week? Or is that good quartet singing available only for the younger singers, or only for the more experienced singers? Is everyone wearing a name badge? Is there a weekly afterglow?

Look at the structure of your meetings: Are they fast-paced? Are the announcements tedious? Does your program feature a good mix of new tunes and familiar tunes? Does your repertoire include both barbershop standards as well as contemporary/popular numbers?

Does the chorus sound good enough for you to feel proud? Do you spend more time rehearsing stage moves than singing? Are you pounding the same two songs every week for contest? Does the director inspire the singers to be better, or mostly catch them on their errors? Does your program include singing games, like tag quartets or pickup quartet contests? Do you experience the larger barbershop world, either through video, or chapter visits, or by convincing members to attend other barbershop events, likes shows and contests?

Does your chapter have a weekly (or at the very least, monthly) newsletter that documents what happens in the day-to-day of chapter life, and a photographer taking pictures of all the people and fun moments? Are those photos shared in your newsletter, on Facebook, on your website, and via email?

Take a hard look -- write down your impressions -- and then we'll talk again.

# **2013 FWD Chorus Champions Masters of Harmony**

The **Masters of Harmony** love taking barbershop harmony to new audiences. In November, the Masters traveled to Port Hueneme for a Sunday afternoon performance at the Oceanview Pavilion. As the stage manager listened to the chorus warm up, the glow on her face was priceless. Her obvious enthusiasm helped set the tone for a performance that went on to garner thunderous applause and standing ovations from the audience. The show featured a unique mix of regular chorus repertoire, as well as holiday music befitting a theater already lit up by holiday decorations. Given the strong military presence in the area, the Armed Forces Medley was a huge hit. Anyone who serves or has served in our armed forces had a chance to stand and be honored during the song. **Masterpiece** (2013 International Quartet Champion) and **American Pastime** (2013 Southwest Division Quartet Champion) took turns captivating the enthusiastic audience with beautiful quartet harmonies. Special kudos goes to Harmony Sweethearts **Dee Thiesmeyer, Nancy Kraus, Gay Place** and **Courtney Crowe** for overseeing a highly successful sale of our CDs at the show. All in all, the performance was a great way to usher in one of the busiest holiday seasons in Masters of Harmony history!

Two weeks later, the Masters returned to the familiar ambiance of the Carpenter Performing Arts Center in Long Beach for a Christmas show titled "My Favorite Things." As the show patrons filed in, they were greeted by holiday music provided by a light jazz trio, a new and well-received addition to MOH Christmas shows. The show featured a blend of chorus favorites and new songs, **Les Weiser**'s stirring solos, as well as sets by Masterpiece and American Pastime. The enthusiastic audiences rewarded the well-paced performances with sustained applause and standing ovations. Eight days later, the Masters got a similar response when they reprised this show to a near-capacity audience at Riverside's historic Fox Theater.

Wherever the Masters perform, the chorus is known as the barbershop chorus from Santa Fe Springs, California. This mutually beneficial partnership is an important reason for the success of the Masters over the years. The city provides an excellent centrally located rehearsal site at its Town Center Hall free of charge, saving the Masters thousands of dollars in rental fees. In return, the Masters sing at the city's annual Christmas Tree Lighting on the first Saturday in December. Because of recent rainy weather, the ceremony was moved indoors for the first time in at least 10 years, giving the overflow audience an up-close-and-personal view of the Masters in the room where they rehearse. Another way the chorus repays the city for its generosity is to provide quartet singers on a float that precedes Santa and Mrs. Claus to greet children and their parents at selected locations. For 32 years, Santa Fe Springs has been bringing this unique program to its residents over a two-

week period in early December. Masters singers have been singing well-known holiday songs on that lead float for the last 22 years. At various stops along the route, quartets invite willing youngsters to come up on the float stage to sing songs like "Feliz Navidad" and "Santa Claus Is Coming To Town" with them. While this is happening, proud parents take pictures and videos of their kids singing with the quartet. When the Santa float arrives, the kids can have their pictures taken with the Clauses. This year, eight different quartets gave 32 Masters men the chance to bring joyful holiday music throughout the city.

In 1989, the Masters of Harmony performed at the Ramona Bowl, site of *Ramona*, America's longest-running historical drama. Somehow the performance planets didn't align for a return appearance until recently when the Ramona Bowl management decided to add to its performance calendar by bringing in different kinds of performers. Although outdoor performances at the Bowl in December are at the mercy of chilly, sometimes inclement weather, the Masters gladly accepted the holiday season performance opportunity.

Just as they had at the Long Beach and Riverside shows, a jazz trio made up of college students played for audience members as they filed in, entertained again at intermission, backed up several chorus songs, and sent audience members home with upbeat holiday chords ringing off the hills surrounding the Ramona Bowl. The players included Cal State Fullerton students Jessica Ragsdale, Mark Herrera and Michael Selfridge at the Long Beach shows with Cal State Long Beach student Nick Ornelas replacing Michael Selfridge at the Fox Theater and the Ramona Bowl.

While the rain clouds stayed away this time, the performance took place under clear, moonlit, very chilly skies that had some chorus members wearing newly acquired thermal undergarments. The Masters mantra of "Master the Stage" was really put to the test and, at first, the applause sounded strangely muffled. As it turned out, audience members were applauding enthusiastically while wearing gloves – a truly unique sound! As the show progressed, the applause got louder because many decided to applaud bare handed then put their gloves back on. And judging by the audience response, muffled and unmuffled, the Masters lived up to that that mantra.

In early January, the Masters opened the most challenging year in its history with its Annual Awards and Installation Banquet at Khoury's Restaurant in Long Beach. Master of Ceremonies Dr. Chris Peterson welcomed the filled-to-capacity audience of Masters family and friends. Continuing a tradition started in 2013, certificates of appreciation were presented to five Masters members making the transition to emeritus status after years of significant contributions to the chorus - Dave Briner, Marlin Niesley, Joe Palmquist, Ron Perry, and Ron Van Winkle. A silent auction, another new tradition from last year's banquet, raised a sizable amount for chapter coffers. Awards Chairman and Emeritus Ron Perry proceeded to announce the award winners. The Barbershopper of the Year Award went to Chapter President Ron Andreas. Ron's visionary leadership has helped create a palpable electric energy in chorus rehearsals, something that can propel the chorus to success in Las Vegas this summer and beyond. The Alice Blue Gown Award (Sweetheart of the Year) went to Dee Thiesmeyer who has brought an outlook similar to Ron's to Harmony Sweetheart activities. Masterpiece and The Newfangled Four, current Far Western District Quartet Champion, shared top chapter quartet honors. Keynote speaker and installing officer was Marty Lovick, past category specialist from the Evergreen District. Emeritus Ron Van Winkle captured the essence of Marty's speech with this quote: "He challenged us to have the courage to test the limits of our abilities and explore those untapped musical levels that still remain "

Ron Andreas's innovative new way to welcome members is designed to make the new member feel he is joining not just a special organization but also a unique family. Accordingly, he is invited to bring family members and

friends to a rehearsal and, when he is given his new name badge, they are also honored. The first new member to be welcomed to membership with this badge ceremony was **Zachary Green**. In a separate ceremony that same night, Barbershop Harmony Society Associate **Carol Stephenson** received her first "Man of Note" pin, and will soon receive a second! Her mentoring of University of La Verne students **Ernie Reyes** and Zach Green led to their becoming new MOH members. Later in the month, Leonard Jensen and **Walter Tang** were welcomed to membership with their own badge ceremonies. Zack, Carol, Ernie, Leonard, Walter and those who shared these ceremonies with you, welcome to the Masters family!

#### 2104 Int'l Convention in Las Vegas, NV

**CONVENTION CHATTER:** Look! What's that at the end of the tunnel? It's not a light, it's not a train... that only leaves one thing – it's the 2014 BHS International Convention! The holidays are over and early registration is closed. Now it's time to get *big-time* serious (*like we haven't been right along?*).

Have you registered for the convention yet? If so, GREAT! If not, WHY NOT? They won't be able to keep putting these conventions on if people don't start attending and volunteering. This is the chance for the Society to showcase our great singing talent to the public and your chance to see the best of the best.

Seeing the big events on the satellite feed is OK, but it's NOT the same as being there. You miss out on the thrill of seeing it happen live. You miss out on the audience reactions. You miss out on discussing with 6,000 to 8,000 of your best friends how stupid the judges were when you attend the afterglow right after the contest. There are so many events between Sunday, June 29 and Sunday, July 6 that there's hardly time to breathe. Sometimes you wind up having to decide if you'd rather eat or sing. That's a tough decision for some of us. The 2014 Convention is being held in the Far Western District and for the first time ever in Las Vegas! That's YOUR District! The reigning International Quartet is from YOUR district. The current reigning International College Quartet Champion is from YOUR District and also happens to be YOUR current District Champion. YOUR District has a number of Choruses that will be in the mix for a Top Five finish this year if not winning it all. **They all NEED your support**. Get yourself registered; register your wife; register your significant other; register both if you think you would survive it.

Heck, why not register the kids too! If they are not already involved in barbershop, now would be a great time to introduce them to it. There is no reason to wait. The price isn't going to magically come down if you wait. Tax refunds should be starting to come in soon and what a great way this would be to put them to use. We need to build up the numbers. We are currently just short of 5,000, which isn't bad but we really need to try and DOUBLE that number. We need to show those who are not currently involved with barbershop just how great it is and how much we support it.

Many of you will be coming to Las Vegas to support your favorite Chorus or Quartet. Maybe you could find some time to help support the Convention too. This year's revenue for 2013 was pretty close to average. However, the Group contributions provided the extra "umph" that made the "contribution" category so successful. This also makes the point that contributions outside of Harmony Foundation are our major revenue source and determine our financial health each year. Harmony Foundation has provided 24% (ten year average) of our overall revenue.

As noted above, the funding from Harmony Foundation has changed for 2014. The old "formula" from the Harmony Foundation is gone; we now write a full-fledged grant for the amount that our camp requires to "make it work". Our grant application for 2014 requested \$6,550 in anticipation of a large (unknown) increase in cost from Sly Park. The Foundation awarded us \$4,000, likely because the Sly Park increase is currently unknown. The finances of our Camp are healthy, with a cumulative surplus buildup from over the years in excess of \$13,000. Therefore, if the anticipated increase in cost from Sly Park becomes a reality, this potential gap in funding can be met. Our surplus allows us to weather "impacts" like this. In the past we have had one or two.

Another very important point to make is that our real costs per boy range from about \$169 in 2005 to a high of \$214 in 2006 with an average of about \$191. This is calculated by simply dividing the total cost of each Camp by the number of boys attending.

It is therefore instructive to realize that the \$80 registration fee charged to each boy is intentionally held low for the benefit of the boys and their families.

In fact, the real work of getting boys to Camp is to get them to "see" the value of Camp through their payment of the \$80 fee.

A practice that has become all too common is for chapters to take on the role of sponsorship and pay all or part of the \$80 fee for boys coming to Camp. This defeats the purpose of holding the fee at a low level and it also decreases the overall chapter contributions. A fee of \$80 for a full weekend of Harmony Camp, including meals and lodging is very affordable (intentionally) and provides an incentive for the boys and their families to perceive "value" in the Camp experience. For chapters to pay this fee for the boys takes away the opportunity for the boys and their families to see the value of Camp on their own. It also decreases the overall pool of chapter contributions.

When I was at Harmony University last year, I had a sit down meeting with Marty Monson that lasted for easily an hour or more. An incredible man! One of the points that Marty made after hearing of the success of our FWD Camp was to suggest in somewhat forceful terms that we need to start thinking about building an Endowment for the Camp that will "live" past my tenure as Director. In effect, Marty challenged me to raise an Endowment Fund for Camp.

My ultimate goal is to have such an Endowment fund reside with the Harmony Foundation (HF) and be administered by HF. At this point it appears that the HF is willing to do this, and we are currently in the planning stages of how to carry out a fund raising campaign for this rather incredible goal.

My purpose for mentioning this idea at this early stage is not for you to jump in and start sending money, but to give me your feedback as to a) whether you think it's a good idea, b) offer any suggestions as to policies that could help govern such a fund and c) provide feedback as to whether you think such a fund should be specific to the Camp or District wide Youth In Harmony funding.

One last note: it is anticipated that a portion of our surplus will be used to "kick off" the campaign to raise funds for the Endowment Fund.
