FWD Harmony Camp

I am taking this opportunity to lay out some realities regarding Harmony Camp 2017.

Harmony Foundation and BHS have a grant process that we engage in every year to finance a significant portion of the funding for Camp. This funding from Harmony Foundation has been in place since 2006. Prior to 2006, we funded the entire cost through your generous contributions. So we have been applying for and receiving significant funding from Harmony Foundation for eleven years.

Last September, shortly after Harmony Camp 2016, we completed our Grant Application for Harmony Camp 2017. Writing these applications is a challenging, grueling, and time consuming process.

We recently learned that our 2017 application was denied.

Ok, so how do we deal with this kind of situation? First I need to share some of my own feelings about Harmony Camp. Nearly all of you know that my feelings toward Harmony Camp are on the passionate side of the scale. So when this kind of thing comes up, I always need to check my underlying core beliefs and make sure that I am being true to my beliefs. Let me share a revelation that we uncovered recently.

We always believed that Harmony Camp makes barbershoppers for life. It's a catchy phrase that allows us to talk easily about Camp. Although we always believed in the concept, I don't think we've ever actually seen the closing of the circle by seeing so many young men "come back" to barbershop after graduation from high school and college --- until recently.

Ben, Joe, Austin, Brandon, Jason, Chris, Chris, Kevin, Blake, Adam, Brandon, Chase, John, Adam, and let's not forget James Morgan and Cory Hunt, all Harmony Camp alumni from some years ago are now singing on the risers with various choruses as deeply committed barbershoppers or have made significant impacts in the barbershop world! Wow! They are taking on jobs in their choruses, helping with the risers, and doing lots of good, no great, singing with the chorus. There are even a couple of them who took on jobs as staff at Harmony Camp!

It's working! The whole idea of providing a weekend experience that changes a young man's life and instills a love of music, particularly in the barbershop style, is real and is happening! This "old" barbershopper has tears in his eyes as he writes this!

But now I've got to get back to the point of this message:

There is a second round of grant applications that we can and will participate in. We will likely tone down our dollar request in hopes that a portion of our request will be funded. We are only partially optimistic about our chances because we just learned that the large Harmony Camp that is run by the Singing Buckeyes out of Columbus Ohio was also denied funding in this first round of grant applications. They cancelled their 2017 camp.

This emerging pattern and our belief that this is not "accidental" requires a bit more background that I learned several years ago almost by accident.

About four years ago I was perusing some of the materials put out by BHS, and happened upon the "2013 HOD Bulletin" that is put out by BHS for the Society House of Delegates, and found a statement that essentially said that the goal of the Foundation /BHS is to fund start up camps and fast growing camps. I was alarmed that established, successful camps were missing from the statement.

Upon further investigation, I learned that that statement meant exactly what it said, i.e., successful camps will sometime soon be cut off from the Foundation and encouraged to provide their own funding!

No longer. That day is NOW.

Because we saw that Bulletin and that statement, we saw this day coming and two years ago set up and provided seed funding for the Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund for FWD Harmony Camps. That fund is established and is growing (approximately \$35,000 to date), but will not be able to provide any funding for our Camp until it reaches \$200,000. So our foresight is laudable, but not actionable – yet.

More facts for you: Over the years that we have been fund raising, we were very careful in our use of your funds to the extent that we built up a fairly significant reserve fund. That reserve fund will allow us to proceed with Harmony Camp 2017 completely.

It is Harmony Camp 2018 that is in some jeopardy – today.

Though we believe that this "decision" by the Foundation is misguided, and ignores the fact that camps like ours are currently producing lifelong barbershoppers each and every year, it is a fact that somewhat abruptly, the future of our FWD Harmony Camp is in jeopardy.

We need your help!

One more reason why we believe that the decision is misguided is illustrated by the following. Nearly all of you who participate in the Harmony Foundation giving programs believe, as was true for eleven years, that a significant portion of your money came back to the FWD in the form of support for the FWD Harmony Camp.

It did.

Now and for the foreseeable future it will not.

You and your chapter provided financial support directly to Harmony Camp for all these many years. When the Harmony Foundation became a real force in our barbershop lives back in about 2006 or so, some of that monetary support that you and your chapter were providing at that time was, quite literally, diverted to the Harmony Foundation. Our direct support from Northern California chapters gradually diminished as the effectiveness of the Foundation's message increased.

We all thought that the Harmony Foundation believed, as we do by our giving, that they had and would continue to have our best interests at heart by providing continued support for the FWD Harmony Camp. So much for that thought.

We need your support!

Far Western District Chorus Champions

Santa Fe Springs Chapter

In the second half of 2016, the **Masters of Harmony** took part in two memorable 75th anniversary events. The first was the 2016 Far Western District competition at the Fox Performing Arts Center in Riverside in mid-October. It was the Masters' first opportunity to put on display vocal techniques taught by coaches **Greg Clancy** and **Tony DeRosa**. The result was a noticeably improved sound and a first-place finish that propelled the Masters to an eagerly anticipated rematch with choruses that recently bested them – **The Vocal Majority** in 2015 and **Central Standard** in Nashville in 2016, as well as several other medalist-caliber choruses. In addition, convention planners chose **Bill Rosica** as the Convention Honoree. Bill, who has been president of the Santa Fe Springs and Bakersfield chapters and has received Barbershopper of the Year honors at both chapters, has served as a Far Western District officer and chaired conventions at Division, District and International levels. Thank you, Bill, for enriching the barbershop experience for so many of us!

The second memorable 75th anniversary celebration involving the Masters of Harmony took place in Hawaii with ceremonies commemorating the December 7, 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor. The chorus was invited to participate as the official representative of the USS California, one of the ships sunk that day but repaired and put back in service later in the war. After months of planning by **Skip Farrar** and **Ed Churchill**, the Masters met in Honolulu on Monday, December 5. On December 7, the chorus appeared at the Opening Ceremonies and marched in the parade down Kalakaua Avenue to enthusiastic applause from the massive crowd lining both sides of the street. We closed the ceremonies with a performance at the world-famous Waikiki Shell. The audience included a number of Pearl Harbor survivors who stood proudly when the Masters sang their service anthems. The following day, the Masters performed in light rain at the USS Missouri, not far from the place where the surrender ceremonies

ending World War II took place. It was such a great honor to represent the State of California and the Barbershop Harmony Society at this momentous event.

In December, the Masters performed several duties that repay the City of Santa Fe Springs for the generous support it has given us over the years. On December 3, the Masters took part in the city's annual tree-lighting ceremony and entertained the audience with a mini-Christmas concert. Then, with some of the more experienced Christmas Float singers in Hawaii, **Bill Niemand** skillfully organized other Masters members to sing on the float that precedes the float carrying Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus. Once again, children and parents of Santa Fe Springs got to hear wonderful holiday season songs before the kids got their pictures taken with Santa. The Christmas Floats program has been a highly praised part of the Santa Fe Springs Christmas season for over 25 years.

Once again, the Masters presented Christmas shows in two venues. The first was at a new site, Colony High School in Ontario, with Alan Gordon directing in the job-related absence of Justin Miller. The second was at the Carpenter Performing Arts Center in Long Beach. The theme of this show was "Christmas Cards." In addition to the chorus, the show featured the introduction of a smaller group of singers called the Masters Ensemble. The group of about 24 was created out of a desire to take the Masters experience to places not suitable for the entire chorus while adding needed revenue to chorus coffers. Quartets featured on the show included Masterpiece (Rob Menaker, Patrick Haedtler, Alan Gordon, Brett Littlefield) and The Newfangled Four (Joey Buss, Jackson Niebrugge, Ryan Wisniewski, Jake Tickner). Special kudos go to the Jessica Ragsdale Trio (Jessica Ragsdale, Mina Choi, John Urban) that entertained the audience before the curtain, at intermission, and accompanied several chorus songs. The well-paced show was rewarded with enthusiastic applause throughout.

The Masters started off their quest for Las Vegas Gold with the chapter's Annual Awards and Installation of Officers Banquet, held at the Yorba Linda Country Club on January 7. Joey Buss was the emcee and Brian Philbin was the keynote speaker. The following members were installed as the 2017 Board: President – Jackson Niebrugge; Secretary – Maurice Freleaux; Treasurer – Bernard Priceman; VP-Chapter Development – Cody Littlefield; VP-Marketing – Bob Czubiak; VP-Music & Performance – Patrick Haedtler; VP-Operations – Tom Christman; VP-Public Relations – Michael Van Schoonhoven; Board Members-at-Large – Charles Carothers, Bart Halberstadt, Ed Schackman, Brent Schultz, Walter Tang, and Dave Tautkus. Jim Ernsberger was named Barbershopper of the Year for the countless hours he has devoted to making the Masters organization run more smoothly. In one of the most unusual honors ever bestowed at a Masters of Harmony banquet, the Quartet of the Year Award was given to four men who have never competed together in a barbershop contest and are not even a registered quartet! The Marshfellows (Kirt Thiesmeyer, Jack Peters, Ron Larson, Ron Van Winkle) has participated in the Christmas Floats program for more than 10 consecutive years, sometimes singing on two different days of the nine-day program. They epitomize the Joe Barbershopper aspect of our unique hobby, men who just love to sing and do so regardless of any reward other than the enjoyment they bring to their audiences and themselves.

On January 15, the Masters made their fourth appearance at the Sun Lakes Country Club in Banning. The first Masters performance there was the result of a club resident touting the high quality of his chorus, one whose rehearsals were located 78 miles away. The club leadership decided to test his commitment by inviting the Masters to perform at one of their Sunday afternoon concerts. Each time, the audience has responded with sustained applause throughout the performance.

Since the last edition of Westunes, **Shaquille Dobson** and **David Vorobyov** were welcomed into membership.



District President

By the time you receive this report the International Midwinter Convention will have been completed in San Antonio, Texas. This would eliminate cost of travel and lodging and could replace the leadership academies in all of our divisions if that is determined to be the best alternative for the District's Chapters. However, this method of coaching and

teaching would eliminate the opportunity to learn from your peers in face to face discussions which has proven very fruitful in the past to those in attendance.

Our District VP's in the five divisions would like your input as to what you'd like to see in the way of leadership training. Please contact them and let them hear your requests and suggestions. We're here to communicate and communication is 95% listening. If you don't let us know what you're thinking we have no way of knowing how to plan for the future. Your FWD leadership is listed on the FWD website so that you can contact any of us very easily. Take advantage of the tools available to you as a member.

To those of you who have contacted me, thank you and know that I'm working hard to get back to the presidential post to which I have been elected. I'm tired of being *a Remote President* and I want to be in attendance at future meetings to meet face to face with each and every one of you.

Let's not hear, "we've always done it that way", but try doing something different in your Chapter and don't be afraid to fail. In fact, be afraid not to try.

Plateau AA (Average age 17 < 20): **Sounds of the Mouth Women's Ensemble** (Mesa, Arizona)

Plateau AAA (Average age 20 < 25): **Boomtown Chorus** (Sponsored by the Santa Fe Springs & Westminster Chapters) & **Carol and the Belles** (University of La Verne, CA)

All five were wonderful. This was the first year to include men's, women's and mixed ensembles. The performances were paired with a Seniors Chorus Contest. The Treblemakers won the Plateau A award and were the audience favorites. The Boomtown Chorus won the Plateau AAA award. Our fall 2012 House of Delegates approved a motion to sponsor (\$10,000) Youth Chorus Festival through donations by the Chapters or by the District through an amended budget should Chapter donations fall short. This year's commitment was filled by generous donations from 24 Chapters, 1 Quartet, and 3 individuals with the support of our own John and Sharon Miller. The generosity of the men and women of the District was recognized by the young singers. There were more than a few tears as the almost 600 young performers joined in song to "make the music that makes a difference".

The next Midwinter is in Costa Mesa, CA and promises to be even better than this year. Please start "passing the hat" at your Chapter meetings so we can meet and exceed our commitment. Let's shoot for a larger number of participating Chapters. Note: It is very important that the individual and family donations

continue. Dropping your spare change in a bucket every week adds up as well.

President Bergthold discusses the status of our Leadership Academies this year. We are aware of our mission to help train your Chapter leaders and will continue to find the best way to work with you. Don't hesitate reaching out to your Division Vice-President or any of the other District Officers. We are here to help.

Charismatic Musical Directors Wanted:

In general, most of the Chapters in the division are doing well, having finished a fun holiday season peppered with performances and many smiles, optimistically celebrating new leadership and participating in Singing Valentines. Despite the Society's fantastic Youth Outreach efforts, it seems everyday life has many attractive options and all Chapters are struggling to attract new members. A couple of the Chapters have membership that is dropping below the minimum the Society allows and I've been in contact with those Chapters asking what I and the FWD can do to help, and most have responded they need help with a charismatic chorus director.

A merger of neighboring Chapters may also be a solution. A great example of that is the recent merger of Conejo Valley Chapter and The Channel Islands Clippers Chorus of Ventura. The two Chapters have officially merged and I was privileged to be their installing officer in January. They are still a "mature" group in search of some younger singers but the combined 25-30 of them sang well and were enthusiastic about the merger and enjoying singing under the capable direction of Jim Browne. The larger group has more opportunities to perform in public and singing well in public is a good way to get exposure and gain new members...

Jim is assistant director of **Rincon Beach**, and a couple of the Conejo members are also auditioning with Rincon to be dual members. Several Rincon members are dual with Conejo/Ventura already. The increased vocal work is a help to both Chapters.

Longtime member of the Ventura Clippers Chorus, **Jim Sumstine**, passed away suddenly in December. A memorial in his honor was held in January and a fine chorus of 25-30 combined members from several Chapters sang at the service.

As mentioned above, one key to reviving a Chapter is to have a charismatic musical director. So, if you are a charismatic chorus director, or would like to become one, we have some excellent training available and we have a couple of Chapters that would welcome your assistance. Contact me, or contact **Royce Ferguson**, our FWD Chorus Director guru, and let us help you gain the experience necessary to fulfill your chorus directing dreams.

We are entering the competition season and there is a plan for the two Chapters of San Luis Obispo and Santa Maria to combine and compete in May. They are not considering a merger but just a combination of voices to provide a better singing experience at contest. This is a great idea...each member will benefit and learn from the experience of singing with a larger chorus, and the feedback from the judges will be valuable. And, the friendly association with their brothers from a neighboring Chapter will enhance the camaraderie that is a benefit of membership. All it takes for dual membership is \$10 and a little paperwork. Maybe some of you other Chapters out there might consider this as a way to have more fun!

Rincon Beach (Pacific Sound Chorus) continues to do well, led by Kelly Shepard. As reported in the last Westunes, their Chapter show last September featured 2012 BHS quartet champion, Ringmasters, all the way from Sweden, and they were truly outstanding. Barbershoppers from all over the FWD attended the show, as well as other members of their extensive, worldwide Fan Club. One mother brought her daughter (a huge Ringmasters fan), from Utah to see the show as an 18th birthday present. Ringmasters were joined on the show by a Santa Barbara-based Sweet Adeline Chorus called Carpe Diem and I am proud to report they recently won the SAI Classic Division Chorus Championship of the world!

The show was a tremendous artistic success, but fell a little short in ticket sales and so was only marginally Luckily, Rincon finished a financially profitable. successful holiday season with seven paid performances. Rincon installed a new slate of officers in January and Jim Kline, legendary Bass of 139th Street Quartet and gold medal Bass of Gotcha! was the guest Installing Officer. Rincon has decided to introduce their Chapter members to Barbershop Heroes and Legends instead of Politicos, and three years ago, invited Dave Briner, last year was Alan Gordon, and this year Jim Kline. These Legends share their history and love of the hobby and the members and spouses all enjoy and benefit from the experience. Think about which heroes and legends are in your area and consider this idea for your next installation banquet.

Bakersfield is losing their chorus director (moving away) in February and the search is on for a new director. However, they had a musically and financially successful 2016, they have an enthusiastic new slate of officers and they are planning a combined show with

Visalia Chapter in late April, early May...one show there and one show in Bakersfield. Bakersfield was on "life support" just over a year ago, however their revival efforts are strong and I remain optimistic they will not only survive, but thrive. *Any charismatic chorus directors available for the Bakersfield area?*

Hawaii greatly enjoyed their visit to the mainland in October and they competed in Riverside, scored well, hosted a great Mai Tai party and returned home happy. Under the very capable direction of Mark Conching, they are doing well and all of us in the FWD appreciate the effort, coordination and expense of coming to contest, and always enjoy their enthusiastic, unique and entertaining performances.

South Bay Chapter continues to have fun and present outstandingly entertaining shows. They performed another full production show in February, called "Beau Jest" with a cast of zany characters, the **Rockin' Moroccans** band with **Ready Willing and Mabel**, and silliness abounding. You should make it a point to attend their unique, enjoyable shows...

Santa Monica is healthy and growing. Their membership is now 56 and the director, **Ben Lowe**, is taking a short leave for some education, so **Laura Pallus** is directing and everyone is having a good time. We will see them at contest in May.

San Fernando Valley Chapter, under the direction of Tom Raffety, is having fun and has attracted a few new members in the last half of the year. The incredible **Masters of Harmony**, with musical mastery by **Justin Miller**, with already eight gold medals, and with renewed enthusiasm and dedication are preparing for the International Chorus competition in Las Vegas this July. you have grown as a Chapter, then change it. Once you have a Mission Statement for 2017, please send it to me! (If your Chorus does not have a Mission Statement, contact me so that you and I can get the process started).





Our quartet was accompanied by a Davis California junior high symphony orchestra, an incredible group of talented young people.

In the four hours before the game and as we all were on the basketball court before the game, we all got to know each other a little bit, and it was awe inspiring to get to know this young man and his parents. We were able to get a glimpse of the life and challenges of this young man and how this music was impacting his life. I was overwhelmed and humbled at the opportunities we as Barbershop members have to impact the world.

This event was put on by Joey Travolta, brother of John Travolta. Joey runs Inclusion Films, an organization that teaches film making to adults with developmental disabilities.

I often forget about the ability of our music to impact others. I know we have young men with varying degrees of the autistic spectrum of disabilities at Harmony Camp each year, and their love of our music is awe inspiring. I am reminded that one of these campers from a few years ago is now composing his own music.


So what is my point in all of this? We have the ability to impact our world with our music but I wonder how many of us ever think about the responsibility that comes along with this ability to use our music to connect with others.

My guess is that 99.99% of the people in the Golden One Center that night didn't even know what we were all about, and that an autistic boy was singing our National Anthem with a Barbershop quartet and a junior high symphony orchestra.

But ... there just may have been one or two folks, perhaps young, perhaps parents of a child with "issues" who "understood" and heard the message. It is for those folks that we were there that night and perhaps "made a difference".

Never forget that there just might be that someone in your audience who is truly touched by your music; who may even have a life-changing experience because they heard and felt your music. We touch people all the time, and of course we never know it.

That's not the point. The point is to give it your all every time you get on that stage. Let your emotions roll out. Let yourself be transformed into the "messenger". You may change a life.

Hello, FWD!

2017 is already well underway with many exciting upcoming opportunities for singing, fellowship, and educational development.

Chorus Directors – Your Far Western District Leadership Team is eager to provide the educational services needed to perpetuate the best quality singing possible among our choruses and quartets. We'd like to hear from you in order to best strengthen these educational offerings and event attendance within the District. How might we best facilitate your Music Team's artistic development and build more compelling successes within your Chapter overall?

Director education is an important cornerstone of our Chapter's successes and we're here and ready to help. There are also scholarships and other assistance assets available for both District and International Educational Events.

Speaking of success, How might one best build a culture for success within our Chapter ensembles? Perhaps more importantly, what is the best measure of this success? Our contest system is simply one wonderful mechanism toward rewarding impactful performances – which are built upon myriad smaller successes.

Core Principles for Success:

Some questions to consider...

Are you and your music team currently crystal clear on what your Chapter's core principles should be?

Are these same principles expressed clearly to the Chapter membership on a weekly basis?

If not, what might be getting in the way? Building upon enthusiastic execution of core principles every week, is fundamental for improvement and Chapter growth.

Educate – yourself and spread the wealth. It is important that a Chapter's musical leadership be continually striving toward achievable goals which will best propel the enthusiasm, membership growth, and musicality forward. Both within the contest system and beyond.

Embrace – all elements of your rehearsals that continually innovate and inspire with strong principle-based singing and performance goals.

Eliminate – distractions. Remove aspects of rehearsal that don't fit the mold of what you and your chorus members hope to achieve each and every rehearsal.

Encourage – Let your singers know that they are capable. Compound successes.

Execute – Be creative. Don't settle. Get to the heart of what is real and deliver.

Remember, execution of core principles beats knowledge alone, every time. Knowledge only represents a potential for success. Do what it takes for your singers to demonstrate mastery of core principles. That is the true measure of achievement.

Synchronization, and Continuity of Vocal Tone:

When it comes to waving our arms, most of the time, a chorus director's role is to concisely demonstrate gestures that (hopefully) encourage the synchronization of vocal attacks – primarily as they relate to strong musical pulses and/or meter.

Unfortunately, one challenge with these gestures of meter alone is that they often don't really convey the true conversational approach that Barbershop harmony requires!


As a director, one may notice that aggressive vertical gestures of meter will often lead to all kinds of unmusical vocal issues: choppy/disconnected vocal lines, pressed tone qualities, and angular, unwanted accents – especially after a breath at the beginning of phrases.

It is helpful to communicate with your singers and for them to recognize that they are primarily responsible for the idling engine of vocal tone and continuity of vocal line.

As a vocal coach I've used many analogies for maintaining this continuity of resonation: from utilizing the sensation of gravity inherent in rollercoasters and fighter jets, to the connection involved with bowing string instruments. More recently, I've suggested an approach to the onset of tone that is much like the easy vibration of one's fingers on a crystal wine glass. It would never be appropriate to aggressively pounce on the glass like a percussion instrument, it simply wouldn't sing. Likewise, as singers, we must be constantly aware to avoid introducing any jarring turbulence into our vocal mechanism and rather simply breathe life into matched vocal resonances.

Exercise:

Direct with a focus upon synchronization and clarity of meter while your singers simultaneously vocalize on a continuous open vowel, Ng, or lip trill. They may also gesture as if they are resonating imaginary wine glasses. Then sing the same vocal line with the lyrics. Ask them if they notice a difference and encourage them to strive for this kind of resonation on every note they sing as they bring more interest into one or two highlighted words in each phrase. Remind them that this ease of resonation will promote a vastly improved musical communication to the listener. Enjoy!

His efforts have not only revitalized Marketing and Public Relations for the district, but have also laid a solid foundation, making it a smooth transition for me to take over this important job, and allowing me to move forward with all of the great things he has started, looking for ways to continually expand and improve.

Jerry and I are great friends, and have worked together for many years at both the District and Chapter levels, and I am happy to report that he has agreed to remain on the team, serving as Advisor.

I am also happy to report that Joe Samora will continue the wonderful job he has been doing to chronicle the history of this great District. Joe has taken on the arduous task of revitalizing the job of District Historian, which had fallen into relative dormancy since El Wirt retired close to 20 years ago, and we have already enjoyed the fruits of his labor with wonderful historical articles in all four issues of *Westunes* in 2016. Joe was also responsible for the certificate from the Society that officially recognizes our 70th Anniversary. Besides that, he completed interviews with past Hall of Fame inductees Joe Salz and Lynn Brittan and hopes to interview four or six more in 2017. These are all part of his plan to create an Oral History Program to record the thoughts of past HF recipients, and maintain these for future generations.

With regard to *Westunes*, I am pleased to report that Ray Rhymer will continue as Editor in Chief. Established in 1951, *Westunes* is the official publication of the Far Western District, and through the years has become our source of record, reporting on all of the events in the District and our Chapters each quarter. While the current issue is an important resource to keep our members informed of what is going on in the District in the present, the vast library of back issues continue to remain important as an invaluable record of our history.

Ours is a long and proud tradition here in The Far Western District, not only with an amazing roster of talented men, but also with an abundance of groups and individuals who have contributed to making this one of the leading Districts in the Society. It is extremely important that we chronicle all of the great individuals, groups, and events that make the FWD what it is so that future generations will be fully aware of what it takes, and are able to carry on the tradition. And for that reason I pledge to give both Ray Rhymer and Joe Samora my full support to carry on these important jobs.

Another member of the Marketing team includes Paul Girard, who manages the web content for our Youth In Harmony (YIH) programs, including information for students, educators, and Chapter members to get them on board with YIH, as well as Harmony Youth Camp, Youth Chorus Festival, Young Men's Harmony Festival, and the High School Quartet Contest. This is how our future gets started, and Paul's efforts help to make it possible.

We also have four dedicated men serving under Ray Rhymer as Division Editors for the *Westunes* team: Bob Shaffer (Arizona), Roger Perkins (Northeast), Greg Price (Southeast), and Justin McQueen (Southwest). Every quarter these men reach out to all of the Chapters in their respective division to gather information that then gets compiled into their Division Digest. Let's all help these men do a successful job by getting Chapter reports to them on a regular basis!

We are still looking for someone to take on the job of Division Editor for Northwest; if you are interested, or know someone who may be, please contact Ray Rhymer or me as soon as possible, as there are a lot of great things going in Northwest that need to be reported.

Also under Marketing & PR is the District website, www.farwesterndistrict.org. The website has undergone significant changes in the past year, many of them being technical, but also changes to make them more manageable and easier to navigate. Invisibly it has been moved to a state-of-the-art hosting platform. and upgraded to the latest and fully supported version of the back-end software. Outwardly there has also been significant change, most notably the migration to a new, "responsive" platform, which means that it now works well on phones and tablets as well as computers. This new technology also allowed the consolidation of what had once been 25 separate websites. The main FWD site now includes all five division sites, Westunes, and YIH as a public site; Events continue to be separate as a public, secured site for events registration; the other sites are all in the process of being consolidated into a new "members only" secured site that is still under construction and will be implemented sometime this year.

I will continue to serve as the District webmaster, with the full understanding that wearing two hats can be a huge undertaking. To that end, I am calling out to individuals who have an interest in honing their artistic and technical skills to serve as Assistant or Associate webmasters, authors, editors, or graphic designers. I know there are men in this District who would be a great benefit to the team, and I encourage you to contact me if you have an interest to serve or learn more.

In years past, nearly every convention had a distinctive logo that captured the essence of the event and the host city, often with pins, patches, and attire to celebrate the event. Bryan Forbes and I are trying to revive this, and started with the 2016 FWD Fall Convention in Riverside to celebrate the District's 70th Anniversary, carrying the theme forward to the Spring and Divisional events in 2017. It would be great to revive this tradition for all of our future District events, so I'm calling out to graphic artists from around the District to submit ideas for a logo for the 2017 FWD Fall Convention in Bakersfield.

Finally, my vision for the FWD Marketing & Public Relations team going forward really questions the validity of the title given to what we do.
