We were a men's club that sang.

We relished the idea we were preserving an American art form. We were proud to be part of something special.

We were a social, as well as a musical, phenomenon. A singing fraternity. Carry a tune, come on in. We smiled, we laughed, we exuded the joy of spreading harmony, up beat entertainment, service to our communities, and good will.

Every town deserved a barbershop chapter.

We inherited an institution. We nurtured it, shaped it, grew it, matured it. In the process we became an educational machine, and to a significant degree, a savior of active choral music in schools and the world around us.

Now we have passed it along to a new generation.

We have become a highly refined art form, with discipline and performance techniques in our elite groups that inspire awe, respect, and admiration in the highest echelons of the music world.

We're still a brotherhood. But between the pursuit of artistic perfection, and the costs of getting together—and above all, the modern trends in socializing and communications—we're no longer the social engine we once were. We look with fear and frustration at declining membership numbers and shrinking convention attendance. We see old chapters dying, fewer and smaller choruses on our stages.

We used to be unique. We had requirements to belong. We were exclusive—to the degree, we were men of good character, who could carry a tune. As Lloyd Steinkamp used to say, they come for the music, they stay for the friends.

The needs of the society around us changed. To have "friends" today, one need not leave their computer screen.

We can savor our deserved role as a leading educational force in the vocal music world. In a sense we took on the task of re-populating the world with singers, who might become our future members and supporters. In the process we have become swallowed by the youth outreach wave we created. The needs of the educational world, and the needs of our elite groups to push the envelope of perfection, now preempt the fraternal needs of men who like to sing. To maintain organizational relevance, and survive in the new world, with its emphasis and pressures of inclusion, our institution has swung the doors open to all comers. The exclusivity of the past is no longer politically correct. Or, apparently, sustainable.

But the physical appeal of a barbershop chord is eternal.

We treasured the institution while it was ours. Now we have turned it over to the next generation. May its leaders help it thrive, and become the world movement they envision, thanks to that eternal ringing chord, and the love of sharing it.

New Management for the "Young Men's Harmony Festival"

Nearly 20 years ago, Mark Freedkin helped create a youth festival aimed at introducing young men and their choral teachers to barbershop harmony. That program has now been taken over by the Southern California Vocal Association (SCVA), a professional organization of vocal music teachers at elementary to college levels. It recently put our long-running event under its professional umbrella. This year, it held its second "Close Harmony Festival" at West High School in Torrance, California, and over 170 singers took part in the event. Throughout the day, the attendees received excellent coaching by The Newfangled Four (Joey Buss, Jackson Niebrugge, Ryan Wisniewski and Jake Tickner). In the evening, the audience responded enthusiastically to the Festival Chorus, several high school quartets, The Newfangled Four, the Masters of Harmony and The Westminster Chorus. Congratulations to Mark and to his SCVA counterpart, Antone Rodich, former MOH member and current Westminster member, for keeping this excellent program alive!

Singing Valentines

Thanks to meticulous sales and logistics work done by the "Valentines Central" program of the **Orange Empire Chorus**, Larry Icenogle, Mark Travis, Bob Hartwig, and Alan Greenberg were able to take the love of Valentine's Day music to a number of surprised and delighted recipients throughout Orange County.

First Concerts of the Year-Sun City, Palm Desert, California

For over a year, Sun City resident and former MOH President Bernard Priceman had been driving the 240-mile round trip to MOH rehearsals in Santa Fe Springs. He won the approval needed to perform in Sun City, and Tim

Truesdell's excellent advance promotional work brought in two very enthusiastic audiences, most of whom had never heard a Masters performance. Among the numbers were: '50s Medley with Les Weiser on sax, the contest set for the 2020 International (which has subsequently been canceled due to the current health crisis), "Unclouded Day," and "This is the Moment." Audience response to these shows indicates that Bernard should have more opportunities for future trips to the auditorium parking lot in his golf cart!

The Masters of Harmony-City of Hope Partnership

In late 2019, the Masters of Harmony established a unique partnership with City of Hope, one of the world's leading centers for cancer and diabetes research and treatment. The chorus offered to donate a portion of the proceeds from the November 30 Christmas Show to City of Hope. Between shows at Sun City, Masters President Joe D'Amore presented a check for \$2,000 to Kevin Kate McQuhae, Senior Director of Development in City of Hope's Office of Philanthropy. Hopefully, this is the start of a long, mutually beneficial relationship to both MOH and COH.

The Masters of Harmony and Santa Fe Springs Part Ways

For over 30 years, the City of Santa Fe Springs has provided an excellent, centrally located rehearsal and storage facility at its Town Center Hall. The ability to use this facility has been a major reason for MOH success over that span. In return, the Masters sang at the city's annual Tree Lighting Ceremony for 28 years and provided quartets for the nine days of the city's truly unique early December Christmas Float Program. During that time, MOH also contributed many thousands of dollars to various Santa Fe Springs organizations. However, the two parties recently disagreed over long-standing terms for facility usage. The MOH could continue to use the facility but at rates the Board felt the chapter could not afford so, sadly, the established partnership came to an end. However, the Masters left this excellent facility with enormous gratitude for the benefits our long-term association made possible.

A New Rehearsal Site

Leaving Town Center Hall in Santa Fe Springs necessitated a thorough search for a new facility that would meet MOH rehearsal and equipment storage needs. Pending resumption of open rehearsals, a search team found a temporary rehearsal and storage site at a church in nearby La Mirada.

Rehearsals in the Era of Lockdowns

Since the era of stay-at-home orders has ruled out even section rehearsals, over 80 Masters of Harmony members have been video conferencing regularly using the Zoom app. President Joe D'Amore and Director Alan Gordon have kept the members updated on ways they can learn new music, polish current repertoire, and do exercises to maintain vocal quality and stamina until such time as we meet again. Common reactions to the lack of the ability to do what we love so much have been shared in a kind of healing group therapy. One thing we quickly learned when we tried to end a session with "Keep the Whole World Singing" – Zoom is a terrible platform for that!

Kudos to Mark Hale's Sound of the Rockies

One of the lasting effects of the enforced stoppage of group singing is the rise of virtual choruses and choirs. Mark Hale, who led the Masters to four gold medals before moving on to direct the Sound of the Rockies Chorus, has helped create a virtual version of "Go the Distance." To produce this song, individual members recorded their parts which were then mixed and balanced to turn out a high-quality sound that is very moving in a way few of us have never experienced before. 2020 Harmony Camp Lite

Fellow Barbershoppers,

As we shelter in place and continue to be bored out of our minds and looking for projects and things to do and things to think about, the subject of Harmony Camp came up and the realization that we should be out there raising funds to make Harmony Camp happen for our October date in 2020.

That fund-raising effort is Not happening and not going to happen for obvious reasons. No one is in any kind of place physically and mentally to contribute money to an event in October that might not even be viable.

Furthermore, the amount of money needed each year typically runs somewhere north of \$15,000, and recently even north of \$20,000. The Only way that happens is for Lots of chapters, companies, and individuals to join hands and each contribute as much as they can to the cause.

It is becoming a monumental task each year that Will in the near future be helped immeasurably by the Steinkamp Endowment Fund. But even that Fund will only provide about half of the needed funds cutting our efforts in the "field" by only half. Of course, at some time in the future, the LSEF will be able to provide most of the funding, but that day will likely be beyond my personal experience on this earth. But yes, we do have a "cushion" of Camp funds held in the FWD treasury, however planning to use these funds for an uncertain event, such as the "normal" Harmony Camp does not seem wise at this time.

An additional consideration is signing a contract with Sly Park. We are just not ready to do that at this point in time. Yes, we could wait and probably get the date of October 16 – 18, the staff at Sly Park loves the Harmony Camp weekend. But given the uncertainty of future approved activities this also just not seem wise at this point.

After a too long, but critical discussion about finances, let's talk about what we see for Harmony Camp 2020. Some time ago, we realized that the multi-day Camp at Sly Park, whose cost is clearly prohibitive for 2020, is simply not going to happen. We then started thinking about what alternative "shape" might be a viable model for Harmony Camp 2020. Our over-riding goal in these daily thinking activities was to maintain the FWD Harmony Camp model and momentum.

How about doing a one-day event? How about doing oneday events in Sacramento AND the Bay Area? Sounding Good! Let's keep going.

Wait a minute. One-day events are usually held at high schools and that means that we likely could not maintain an all-male model. High schools in California would almost certainly not allow such an event.

But the all-male model happens to be one of the cornerstone features of the FWD Harmony Camp and has been for its entire existence of almost twenty-five years. The leaders of Harmony Camp along with a large number of Camp supporters strongly believe that the current all-male model of Harmony Camp is truly valuable and maintaining.

If Harmony Camp 2020 will likely not be held on a high school campus, what is the alternative? We will need to come up with a location that is amenable to an all-male camp. We can do that.

Every year we have many inquiries from music educators from the Bay Area who are interested in camp. However, the drive on Friday evening then becomes virtually insurmountable. A Saturday morning event held locally in the Bay Area should have a great deal of appeal.

Thus, 2020 Harmony Camp Lite is born. Two one day Harmony Camp events – one in Sacramento and one in the Bay Area. WOW!! Let's do it!!

Think about the advantages: 1) the cost is way lower; oneday means no overnight facilities are required and very little in the way of meals; 2) being local, Sacramento and Bay Area boys are close; boys (and their parents) are not deterred by travel difficulties; 3) the cost for each boy can be significantly lowered; 4) fall school activities held on Friday (homecoming) would not interfere with a number of boys' ability to attend. These are truly significant advantages and, hopefully, will result in a significant turnout of local boys.

Of course, however, there are several significant challenges. Clearly, our usual focus on education when at Sly Park would be more difficult. All the craft and barbershop culture that is taught and experienced during the weekend at Sly Park would have to be condensed into a few short hours along with teaching the songs that the boys sing at the Saturday night show. All of which will be a major challenge.

We hold down costs even further by inviting a local quartet - I can think of three terrific candidates. We maintain the multi-clinician model but cut down to three - again to cut cost.

In short, Harmony Camp Lite for 2020 is a viable alternative to our regular multiday Camp at Sly Park and morphs it into two-day long events in the Sacramento area and the Bay Area. Thus, we take a Very Challenging situation that is global in scope and modify it to suit the needs of the times!! 2020 Harmony Camp Lite.

Comments and suggestions are welcome. This is all open to further thought and improvement. NOT cast in stone. Our two main goals are to maintain the model and momentum of twenty-five years and create a modified version that will accomplish much of what we normally do and pave the way to our weekend Camp in 2021.





The next day your House of Delegates met, again via ZOOM, to conduct our Spring meeting. With close to 60 members online, it was exciting to hear from some Chapters we rarely hear from. I felt that everyone became more comfortable as time went on. Not only did everyone get a chance to let their feelings known, but this meeting was better attended than our normal bill of fare.

I have tasked each of the Division Vice Presidents to set up ZOOM meetings with their assigned Division Presidents on a quarterly basis. Arizona with Adam Kaufman and Chuck Roots with the Northeast Division were first out of the box. Although I sat in on both meeting, I misread the Arizona invitation and only caught the last 15 minutes of the meeting. We entered the year with our most ambitious calendar to date: a tour of Europe planned after an invite was accepted to perform at the BABS (British Association of Barbershop Singers) convention in May; an International Contest invite; the beginning of the contest cycle; and our annual show. Most importantly to us, VoCal was invited to be part of two regional youth outreach events that would have introduced over 500 young men to our art form. All within the first seven months of the year!

VoCal spent the preceding 16 months fundraising, planning, and coordinating our efforts to tackle these milestones. It was truly inspiring to be part of this group and the work behind the scenes in order to make everything possible. VoCal also welcomed our first ever exterior board member with the goal of focusing our efforts to the area schools and to help guide us in our communications with educators. And, we had the pleasure of welcoming a new Mixed Chorus into the Society as well under the California Delta Charter. It was all systems go!

Then we were introduced to a new challenge, one that did not care about the months of work, nor the excitement for the events ahead. It was to be, and has become, one of the most challenging situations in my lifetime. In a matter of weeks, we found ourselves coalesced as a Barbershop family ready to meet the goals we had set only to be forced apart with no clear timeline of when we can be together again. Then we watched helplessly as the events started to cancel. First our annual show, then the start of the contest cycle, Europe, International, and then the loss of the youth events. It has been deflating to say the least.

The other great thing about these weekly meetings is they allow the members to enjoy the camaraderie of others and the team of characters we all know and love. I was told a number of years ago that it is the MUSIC that draws us together, but I think it attracts people who share a lot in common and therefore we are very compatible. We all become good friends and enjoy one another's company. These media meetings allow that to happen for us and aid in our relaxation and enjoyment for an hour or two

I am looking forward to the Fall Convention aboard the ship as a coming-out party and a rip-roaring festival of Barbershop music in all the places aboard the ship. We will experience our music and enjoy ourselves performing in pick-up Quartets, and I look forward to all of the contests and party atmosphere that we will have because of the time we have been away from singing.

"CHORD" ially,



I kinda took Mondays for granted...like the availability of toilet paper at the grocery store. I've been doing this Barbershop harmony thing for 45 years. Not to say I've done it all, but the experience has become sort of routine: Chapter Officer planning in January, Singing Valentines in February, a convention and contest in the Spring, maybe a sing-out or two, then the Fall show and Fall contest, and then it's the holidays and the many seasonal performances...and then we start again.

In the 82-year history of the BHS, there has never been anything like this. We've had several wars take our singers away, and we've seen the rise of various forms of distractions that compete for a singer's time. But a worldwide pandemic, with governmental orders to self-quarantine and avoid gatherings of people...! And with the recent meeting of choral minds combined with science, that seems to suggest we might not be able to sing together for one to two years!

Every day brings a new awareness of the seriousness of the situation. Like many of you, I was disappointed at the realization that we had to cancel the Spring Conventions and Contests and we probably should not meet that next Monday for Chorus rehearsal...in fact, no Monday meetings for the foreseeable future. We realized even the annual show, way out there in September, probably could not be staged with any probability of artistic or financial success. With sadness, that was cancelled.

So, while we cannot sing with each other in proximity, what can we do together? Most all our Chapters are embracing the latest in connective technology and having Zoom meet-



ings. (BTW, I found that webcams are the electronic equivalent of toilet paper. Took me two months to get one via Japan and eBay.).

Zoom meetings, usually held at regular meeting-night times, are great opportunities to check in with everyone, to be sure they are safe and healthy and dealing with the stresses of self-quarantine. At our Rincon Beach meetings, we always ask "Who has good news?" And in this way, we reaffirm that "life goes on" and look for glimmers of hope.

Some Chapters are singing. While the lag time in the available video meeting formats, does not allow us to all sing "together," some Chapters still have warmups, with the Director muting everyone and yet asking them to sing along.

Choruses are using their rehearsal time for weekly checkins, happy hour, open mic night, educational classes, judging panel Q & A, viewing YouTube Barbershop videos, and some are finding ways to sing and work choreo. Reading the Harmonizer, it is amazing to see the creativity that has blossomed in this crisis.

Kathleen Hansen, the very talented Director of the San Diego Chapter, and San Diego Women's Chorus has a series of YouTube videos that is excellent. Go to KHansenMusic on YouTube and you'll see videos on producing free and easy sound, smart vocal warm-ups and why, tuning, overtones, and what are "cents." She has created a wonderful educational resource.

What other resources has your Chapter found? What is working for you? I'd like to know, and I will share...

Our Chapters are more than a bunch of people getting together to sing songs. Much more. We are a community of like-minded singers, who enjoy the personal interaction of other human beings, of smiles and reactions to conversations, and inquiries into each of our lives and genuine concern for each other. In this world of self-directed activities, it's so nice to take a break and be in active interface with other humans. And the ability to sing, to make music and express harmony with each other in song, is so incredibly special.

Maybe "normal" never comes back, and that remains to be seen. In the meantime, Chapters are to be commended on taking care of what's most essential: Our community. That is what keeps us coming back every week.

I have a new appreciation for every person in my Chapter and I so look forward to the time when we'll again be able to be together; to shake hands and hug and experience the wonderful joy of singing that brought us together, but more importantly, to experience the love of each other that keeps us together... I will no longer take that for granted.

Stay safe and healthy, and I can't wait to see you all again.



Membership During a Global Lockdown

I am sure it will come as no surprise when I tell you that the FWD, BHS, and vocal music all over the world are experiencing possibly the biggest challenge we have ever faced. Being a group-singing-focused organization that cannot get together as a group and cannot sing for audiences. So, the big question, what do we do? Our options are limited, and yet unlimited at the same time. I have heard many people say things like "I joined for the harmony, but I stayed for the brotherhood." The importance of the spirit of this statement has never been more critical. So, let's talk about membership as it pertains to a sense of community.

How do we maintain our community when we cannot sing together safely? That depends on each Chapter. A great tool currently is virtual meeting spaces like Zoom, Skype, and Google Hangouts. These tools allow us to meet "face to face", have conversations, and generally hang out with each other. Things like mass email threads and Facebook groups can help us stay in touch and have ongoing conversations, and I highly encourage Choruses to use these tools. However, the virtual meetings, in my recent experience since this all started, have been the biggest impact. So, let us talk about what impact virtual meetings can have on your Chapter.

The first advantage I have noticed is "routine". Keeping your meeting time, having members show up consistently helps to keep people engaged and in the mindset that their rehearsal night did not just "free up". Part of membership, numbers-wise, is retention! We want to retain members and keep them coming back through the lockdown, and into the time when we can safely sing in person again. It is even possible to invite guests and potential members to the virtual meetings. Allowing them into our culture, and hopefully getting them interested in eventual membership.

The second big advantage, an obvious one, is keeping the leadership engaged with the Chorus. It is easier to speak to your members and convey information if you can "look them in the face" and have a conversation. Having weekly updates, talking about the world, giving members a chance to talk to each other, and see how everyone is doing, are all good ways to maintain the feeling of community. After the "agenda" is done, let your members hang out like a virtual afterglow. We want to have as much fun as possible during this time since that is the reason we all keep coming back.

Thirdl, there is a chance to continue the music learning in the Chapter, but this one can be a bit tricky. Working on music remotely relies heavily on the members. As a Chapter, they must be given the tools to succeed. Quality learning materials, communication with section leaders, and work ethic from the singers are all key. My far better half sings with the Harborlites, a Sweet Adelines Chorus, and at the time of writing this, they have an international competition to get ready for in the fall. They have adopted a process of breaking off into virtual sectionals and going over the learning track and music with their section leaders. While they can't actually sing "together", they sing along with the approved learning track, played by the section leader to the group, ask questions, and then record themselves so the section leaders can work with the members. This is just one example of ways to keep a "rehearsal" mindset during the lockdown.

One last opportunity with virtual meetings I can immediately identify is to better ourselves as musicians and as members of the BHS. The Masters of Harmony has been putting out vocal technique aides, music theory tools, and other forms of learning to help to make our members better vocalists and musicians. This is done via emails, and then the members all come together for a virtual Chapter meeting where we have a chance to talk about what we learned, our thoughts, and for the leadership to expand on the lessons. The Westminster Chorus has been going through a history of Barbershop music with Justin Miller, including video examples of Quartets and Choruses through the years that have shaped the sound of Barbershop since the beginning of the Society. This past week we were honored to have Jim Henry join us as a guest speaker for a Q and A, where he talked about his Quartet background, and the origins and culture of the Ambassadors of Harmony.

Overall, I cannot stress enough the importance of maintaining a sense of community. The more active we are through this downtime, the better off your Chapter, the District, and the Society will be on the other side of all this. If you need help getting started with virtual meetings or want to talk about what to do with your ongoing meetings, please reach out to me or the other District Officers so we can assist. Thanks for reading this far, and I look forward to hearing from you and your Chapter.



Summer is upon us and so a "new" way of doing business for all Chapters throughout our Barbershop Harmony Society. For many of us, we discovered that we can still "see" each other as often as we like or even conduct modified, weekly meetings using video conferencing programs such as "Zoom." Now is the time to take advantage of modern technology to keep your Chapter alive! What does this have to do with Youth in Harmony? Well...

Now is the time to involve the younger members of your Chapter. Most of them have a better skill set of the use of computers than older members...Take advantage of it!! If you are an "older" member of the Chapter, reach out to those younger persons in your Chorus! You don't have to be a Chapter Officer to reach out to other members of the Chapter. With most schools using online teaching methods, see if any of your younger members will help the Chapter with a similar online method. Right now, inclusion is everything. Contact someone on your Chapter Board of Directors and offer your skills to your Chapter. You'd be surprised at how much your Chapter can use your help.

A careful look into how we, as a Barbershop Chapter, can contribute to our local school's upcoming school year and music program will be an opportunity never experienced in our history. We need to think about how we can take part in the unique opportunity of helping our schools and youth move forward. I plan on meeting with some educators to discuss the idea and how we, as Chapters, can assist with the recovery process throughout the Far Western District. Do you have an idea or suggestion? 

Panning in on Zoom



I've had several people enquire about Zoom, so thought that would make for a nice, timely topic. If you are not familiar with Zoom and would like to enjoy time with your singing friends while still remaining safe at home, this article is for you. If you are already using Zoom, this article

is still for you, because I've discovered a few little-known features that might be quite beneficial to extend your online meeting possibilities.

Zoom is one of the leading video conferencing platforms, and it is the service that BHS, the FWD, and many chapters are using to hold online meetings and even rehearsals. The best part about Zoom is that in most cases it is totally free. You can host an infinite number of meetings with as many as 100 people; one caveat is that a meeting having greater than two people is limited to 45 minutes unless the person hosting the meeting has a paid subscription. So, what many chapters are doing is having one person with a paid subscription designated to set up and host the meetings, and all the other members can participate with free accounts.

In order to use Zoom you will need either a PC or Mac computer, a tablet, or a Smartphone. If you will be using Zoom with others nearby it is best to use either a headset or ear pods. While a webcam is not necessary it will certainly improve the experience for everyone attending the video conference – even if you haven't shaved in two months and desperately need a haircut. It should be noted that some features are not available on tablets or smartphones -- particularly Android – but none that would preclude their use.

Getting started

1. Follow this link: https://zoom.us/support/download On your computer (Mac/PC) it will automatically start downloading the program, or it will provide

- you with the correct link for your mobile device.
- 2. Follow the prompts and install the app.
- 3. Register with your email address or using Facebook or Google.

Setting up



Open the Zoom app by clicking its icon, a white video camera against a light blue background.

After signing in, go to the Settings/Preferences in the top right corner of your initial screen. It looks like a little cog wheel (which has become the universal standard for Settings) and only

appears on the Home screen. There are a number of options to set up prior to starting your first meeting.

General – these are settings to customize some of the basic application features.

Video – this allows you to set and adjust your camera.

Audio – use this to select your microphone and speakers and to test and adjust the volume levels.

Chat – various settings to customize the chat windows to your liking.

Virtual Background - this is entirely optional, but you can have some fun making it look like you are at the beach or anywhere but your home office; you can even use your own photos.

Recording – these are some of the options in case you want to record your meeting.

Profile - This is where you can set your name and a picture of yourself - preferably a headshot. As an added benefit, your profile picture will display in your box when your video (camera) is turned off.

Keyboard Shortcuts – while you can edit many of these settings, they are probably best left alone, so just treat this as documentation and learn how you can tap a few keys instead of using your mouse/trackpad to get some things done.

Accessibility – you'll find settings for Closed Captioning as well as text size here.


Home



the Home screen: New Meeting, Join, Schedule, and Share Screen. Note that New Meeting and Share Screen both have a little down arrow next to the caption; those arrows indicate additional options are available by using

There are four main functions in

right-click/two-finger-tap.



New Meeting - initiates an "instant" meeting. Options include starting with video on, and using your personal meeting ID rather than one that is randomly generated.

Join – allows you to join a meeting to which you have been invited.

Schedule – allows you to schedule meetings in advance and send the meeting information to those who should attend.

Share screen – this is one way to initiate the sharing of your computer screen which could be the entire screen or a specific program window. One important option that comes into play if you are sharing something that itself has audio, e.g., an audio or video clip, is the ability for Zoom to use the computer sound directly rather than having it come through your microphone.

Contacts



To manage your contacts, click on the fourth icon at the top of the Zoom app which says 'Contacts'.

Click on the plus sign and select 'Add a contact'. Once you have your contacts set up you can click on their name to start a chat or meeting.

Create a Channel - Channels can be used to place your contacts into one or more groups, and you can use groups to easily start a group chat or group

meeting. Channels can be public or private.

Join a Channel – use this to join channels that others in your organization have set up.

Add an App – there are hundreds of applications that can be integrated with Zoom to further enhance your meeting capabilities. One such application is Trello which can be very useful for running your chapter board and committee meetings like clockwork. The best thing to do is explore and see what's out there.

Chat



Zoom provides a chat feature that can be used during video meetings, but it also has chat capabilities that are independent of meetings. The latter can be initiated by clicking the second icon at the top of the Zoom window which says "Chat'. It can be used to send messages

and files to contacts or groups. You'll want to spend a little time building your contacts before using this feature.

Meetings



The third icon at the top of the Zoom window is 'Meetings'. This lists all of your upcoming and recorded meetings. If you are the host, you may edit the meeting options, copy the invitation to send to others, and start the meeting at the appointed time.

There is one additional

option called 'Join from a Room'. Most likely this is something you will not use unless you are in a physical conference room that is set up for Zoom Rooms, so for the most part you can just ignore it.

Security

There are several things you can do to ensure privacy and safety during your Zoom meeting. These are all controlled when you schedule your meeting.

Meeting ID and Password – be default Zoom will generate a unique message id and password to protect your privacy. If you prefer to use your own personal ID or not require a password you can disable these options as you set up the meeting.

The other security options are all hidden, and can be revealed by clicking the little down arrow under 'Advanced Options'.

Waiting Room - when enabled, your meeting participants will automatically be placed in a waiting room. This gives you, as host, the option to select which person

you want to admit. From a security standpoint I can see where this gives an added layer, but in practical use I find it annoying and so disable it regularly. By the way, if you forget to disable it when you set up the meeting you can disable while the meeting is in session by clicking 'Safety'.

Enable join before host – allows others to join the meeting before you do. Since a meeting can run up to 24 hours it's not like the meter is running, so unless that bothers you I suggest setting that option to enabled.

Only authenticated users can join - this requires all participants to have registered for and be logged into their Zoom account before they are allowed to join. The way I see it, a hacker can create a Zoom account just as easily as you can, so I'm not sure what this buys you, so I suggest it be disabled.

Alternative Hosts

When scheduling a meeting it is possible to designate by email address one or more people who can host the meeting on your behalf. While this sounds great, the reality is that those persons need to have paid Zoom subscriptions. Although that's a bit of a bummer, it does not mean that you, the designated host, need to be at every single meeting. The workaround is to have the alternate host join the meeting with you a couple minutes early, select them from participants, right-click and choose 'Make Host'. Once that completes you may leave the meeting and let the alternative host take over.

In a Zoom Meeting

When you are in a Zoom meeting a control board appears at the bottom of the screen. If you are the host you will have more options than do the regular participants. The buttons are (left to right):

Mute – disables/enables your audio (microphone).

Stop Video – disables/enables video (camera).

Security – disables/enables various options participants have during a meeting (host only).

Participants – lists participants (host can manage).

Chat – opens a message box to send private or public (everyone) messages

Share Screen – introduces various options to display information from your device to the other people in the meeting. A reminder that if you are presenting anything with sound playback, during the share screen dialog be sure to check the box for 'Share computer sound' in the lower left corner of the screen. Other sharing options include a Whiteboard and sharing your iPhone/iPad via Airplay or by cable connection.

Record – initiates recording of the meeting. While this is typically done by the host and shared later in the cloud, visitors may also record, but can only store the file on their own device.

Breakout rooms - this allows the host to divide participants into multiple mini-meetings while still having the main meeting in session. Hey music team: that sounds like sectionals to me!

Reactions – places a thumbs up or applause emoticon on the meeting window to display for a few seconds.

Conclusion

As usual, I've given you a lot to digest. But really the best way to develop expertise on using Zoom is to roll up your sleeves and dig in. Please keep in mind that Zoom, like most good software, is constantly evolving, so what I've described here may be a little different in the future.


Stockton Chapter by Sue Atkins

In recent years, we've done Casablanca, The Not So Great Gatsby, The Great Train Robbery with Black Bart


