It was sure neat to be representing the Far Western District at the International convention in Portland the District that not only brought home the chorus gold, but accounted for four of the 12 quartets performing at the finals on Saturday night.

We're proud of all our competitors—especially **Metropolis**, who moved into the medals with a fifth place finish; **GOTCHA!**, right behind in sixth; and **Finale**, who made the finals with a 10th place finish. Due to a glitch that caused the 11th place quartet to be announced as a finalist, the 12th place quartet in the semi-final round, **Freestyle**, got to be the mic-testers, and they didn't disappoint!

Of course winning a gold medal with the Masters (my first after 43 years in this Society) was an awesome and emotional experience.

How do we do it? How do we consistently maintain such high musical standards? It starts with all the schooling and support for quartets, from the beginning level on up. Just as the most successful major league franchises depend on their farm systems to develop players, the FWD provides help and encouragement at every level. See VP **Jim Crowley**'s report in this issue on the most recent Harmony College West, and the first two of **Stan Sharpe**'s CAP (Champs Assistance Program) quartet workshops in NorCal West and SoCal West. We are unusually blessed with talented coaches in this District, and they are offering their help to you.

Are you taking advantage of all this? Are you helping your chorus by being a better singer than you were a year ago? How are you doing at reaching your "unreachable star?"

At the meeting of district presidents in Portland, **Society President Roger Lewis** passed out a list of questions he would like the Society representatives to ask when they visit the districts in the fall. They included:

"What is the greatest need in your chapter?"

And, "If you could wave a magic wand and have just one thing happen, what would it be?"

I hope you'll be thinking about those questions, and bring your answers to the House of Delegates meeting in October.

The Bakersfield convention promises to provide more fun and singing opportunities for non-competitors, according to the Email flying around among board members as I write this. #### DIRECTOR CERTIFICATION

#### **Certified Director**

To become a "Certified Director", one must complete (or test out of, or otherwise show evidence of sufficient knowledge in) ten classes, nine of which are offered at Harmony College / Director College. Those classes are:

Sound Management 1 Sound Management 2 \*\* Directing Techniques 1 Directing Techniques 2 Theory 1 Theory 2 History of Barbershop \* Basic Vocal Production \* (\*\*) Leadership \* The Judging Program (So You Want To Be A Judge) \* SPEBSQSA Organizational Structure \* (not offered at HC / DC) \*\*\*

Those five classes marked with (\*) may be taken at a district school. The minimum lengths for the classes so they may be used toward certification are:

History of Barbershop Harmony—6 hours. Basic Vocal Production—6 hours. Leadership—6 hours. The Judging Program—3 hours. SPEBSQSA Organizational Structure—3 hours.

The SCDDC must also approve the instructor and the course content. Syllabi are available on request from the vice chair for certification.



\*\* EITHER Sound Management 2 OR Basic Vocal Production must be completed for certification.

\*\*\* This class may be taken by correspondence. Contact vicechair for certification.

#### **Master Director**

To earn a designation of "Master Director", one must complete the ten classes required for certification plus an additional five classes plus some assignments and an evaluation of skills. The additional classes are:

Sound Management 3 Directing Techniques 3 How To Teach What You Know Theory 3 Advanced Vocal Production

Here is the procedure to be followed to pursue certification as a Master Director, after you have become a Certified Director.

1. Complete or test out of the 5 classes listed above.

2. Submit letters of recommendation from three knowledgeable and known barbershoppers.


3. Complete and submit the results of a Chapter Survey, provided by the Society Chorus Director Development Committee vice-chair for certification.

4. a.) Submit a video tape of the candidate directing his / her chorus according to parameters provided by the SCDDC v.c. for certification.

b.) Answer questions provided by the SCDDC v.c. for certification which become a directed self-analysis of the video tape discussed in part a.

5. A Board of Review, appointed by the SCDDC--v.c. for certification will review all submitted materials. The BoR will make up a few (usually about three) assignments for the applicant which are designed to address areas deemed by the BoR to require more work (or thought, or investigation, or simply more knowledge).

6. The BoR will review the work submitted relative to #5 and will make its recommendation to the Society Music Staff. Once the staff is satisfied with academic and special project results, the recommendation goes to the SCDDC for approval.



#### An Incredible Journey The Masters win fifth gold medal in Portland

It is often said that it isn't the end result, but the journey to get there that really counts. On Saturday, July 6, our latest journey ended and a new one was well underway. In the same way that we reflected on the South in our ballad, let's take a moment to reflect on the incredible journey that brought Mark Hale and the many MOH men to give that memorable gold-medal performance in Portland that has the entire SPEBSQSA buzzing about what is going on in Santa Fe Springs.

For one Mark Hale, this journey began back in April 2000, when he packed up his belongings from his modest apartment in Clarkesville, Indiana, and headed west for California with perhaps a familiar David Wright arrangement playing in his head. Five days later, he was at the Town Center ready for his first MOH rehearsal.

The chorus members were ready to show this new guy what they could do. But after getting to know the men, it was clear that many of the singers who had won gold less than a year earlier, were no longer around. In fact, it was observed that less than half of the 24 members of the front row from Anaheim were still with the chorus. No matter! Mark would take what core of men was still there and work with them. With the help of a dedicated music team, preparations were made to retire the trophy in Kansas City, less than two months away. Everyone pulled together to make that trip a success. Over the course of the next eight months Mark would work individually with over 85% of the 90 singers to help improve the individual quality of each singer. Special coaching sessions were held at different members' homes in which Mark would work with six men an evening for 30 minutes each. Time consuming, but well worth the added effort. The men would soon learn concepts of voice placement would soon adapt to Mark's directing style and focus on the performance aspect of the music. With each successive show, the confidence grew and the chorus again began to grow in number.

More changes and a new choreographer, Erin Howden, brought a marriage of the moves to the singing and were met with great enthusiasm by the men. Society Music Specialist Kirk Young was invited to our mountain retreat and introduced the concept of listening at a 95, asking us to "sing with flare" [sic] and imploring the chorus members to take individual responsibility for singing the vowels correctly and connecting the word sounds, so that Mark could concentrate on performance issues. Top Gun coaching sessions with Darryl Flinn, Jay Giallombardo and Kim Hulbert followed a few weeks after our victory at the Far Western District chorus contest in October 2001. The first rehearsal of 2002 brought a special visit by David Wright, arranger extraordinaire, to check the progress of his latest masterpiece, "Here Comes The Showboat," and to offer some tips on how to get the most from the song. Two weeks later, Erin was in Southern California to teach the choreographic plan to the new song. More new faces and a few old ones began to show up in Santa Fe Springs. After a few more shows, the contest ballad, "Song Of The South," arranged by Ed Waesche and Mark Hale was introduced. With the package complete and after a coaching visit by Greg Clancy, associate director of The Vocal Majority, the contest set was first performed for a live audience in April at the Thousand Oaks show. But something was missing!

An influx of new and returning members, many who had been busy with their own quartets, helped to shore up the ranks of each section. Jeff Baker and Brett Littlefield of Nightlife; Joe D'Amore, Scott Kidder and Gary Steinkamp of Finale; Bob Hartley of Metropolis; Garry Texiera of Gotcha!, Royce Ferguson of Revival; and John Miller of The New Tradition / Grandma's Boys, joined the section leaders (Rob Menaker, Mark Feiner, Kelly Shepard and Mark Travis) to help the chorus get behind Mark. Their cumulative experience would prove valuable down the stretch. In came Greg Lyne for a coaching session and a chance to work with Mark for the first time. The chemistry was starting to work and songs took on a new exuberance. But something was still missing!

We embarked on an optimization program to give every singer an opportunity to demonstrate his command of the contest songs by singing in quartets. This effort helped to identify common problem areas in each of the songs and helped to focus where future rehearsal time needed to be spent. Costumes were added in time for the May 18 show and reworked until the week before the contest to get them just right. The combined talents and special efforts of Jackie Palmquist, Pat Sickles, Gerry Papageorge, Pam Pieson, Carol Medeiros, Gay Place and many others who assisted with shopping, sewing and gluing, helped to make the visual package a success. One last visit by Erin on June 2, prior to her grounding by doctor's orders, and the contest package was almost ready. Pam Pieson and Dawn Texeira assisted Wayne Mendes in honing the choreographic presentation and keeping the men at peak performance during rehearsals. But something else was missing!

A weekend retreat with Greg Clancy revealed it. We each needed to "find our Dixie." We had heard the stories of the men of the Toronto Northern Lights begging in the streets in order to live the part in "Buddy Can You Spare A Dime." If we were to compete with such a formidable chorus, we each needed to get into character. John Miller stood in front of the chorus and described "his" Dixie. He moved the men to tears as he described his joy in getting the opportunity to sing with his son, Justin, who had joined the chorus earlier in the year and was now part of the front row.



Over the next few days, many men posted notes on the Masternet describing their own Dixie. Some described in detail scenes from the South as they remember it, including the various scents of the flowers and trees. Others described their own emotional hooks that would help them envision "Dixie." For Sean Sherrodd, former front row captain, it would be his last time to sing with his father, Gale, as Sean had taken a new job and moved to Milwaukee. Another father and son would finally get to sing together with the MOH. Steve Pence had earned gold with the MOH early in its history, but then moved away. His son, Graham (now 14), was the youngest member of the MOH in 1999 when he earned gold in Anaheim and was prominently shown at the end of the ballad on the big screen. What a moment!

The last rehearsal before leaving for Portland, was clearly the best yet and a perfect sendoff. In Portland, although each successive rehearsal yielded better and better performances, something was still missing! Greg Clancy reminded us that Dixie was a metaphor for "home" and we needed to visualize whatever home was for us so it could be used as that emotional propellant. The rehearsal performances peaked for the chorus on Friday afternoon as Mark, with the help and encouragement from Greg Lyne and Vocal Majority Director Jim Clancy, put the finishing touches on the ballad. The missing piece of the puzzle was to show up on Saturday morning at the MOH breakfast, when the chorus presented a 1927 edition of the book Showboat to Mark, signed by every singer. With an emotional side not seen by the MOH men before, Mark announced that HE had found his Dixie!

It was right here all the time . . . at home with the Masters of Harmony.

A few hours later, the chorus members cumulatively sent their love to the audience. The standing ovation said it all. The Masters are the 2002 International Chorus Champions and Mark Hale, his journey completed, has found his new permanent home.



#### Jerry Orloff Receives "Unsung Heroes" Award

The "UNSUNG HEROES HALL OF FAME AWARD" was given to Jerry Orloff by the AIC and their president, Hank Brandt, during the 2002 International Convention held in Portland. The presentation ceremony was conducted by AIC Vice-President, Ken Hatton, lead singer of the "Blue Grass Student Union", 1978 International Quartet Champions and former director of the Louisville, Kentucky, "Thorobreds Chorus."

Only two non-AIC members have received this prestigious award, **Hal Purdy** (Purdy Chorale Singers) and **Jerry**, for creating and implementing the AIC's annual "Sing With The Champs" in 1985. "Sing With The Champs" has raised several thousand dollars for our Society's Youth Outreach Fund over the past eighteen years and still remains one of our convention's most popular events that enjoys "early sellouts" every year.

The inscription on the plaque reads as follows:

## Join Us at the Fall Convention

Here it comes again - Fall Convention. According to my thesaurus, some synonyms for "convention" are "gathering", "reunion", and "gettogether".

Personally, I love those words. They, in turn, suggest other words which are symbolic of our beloved society – words

like brotherhood, camaraderie, belonging, and, shoot – why not? – *HARMONY*!

Funny thing is...I can't find the words "*competition*", or "*contest*" as synonyms for "*convention*".

I hasten – in fact, I'm falling all over myself - to add that those two words are <u>huge</u> as they relate to our conventions. They're the reasons why many of us attend conventions in the first place. They add purpose, excitement, a chance to see the best of the best in action, and an opportunity for the choruses and quartets to show their stuff. Long live competition and contest!

Here's what I'm fussing about – we seem somehow to have lost the aforementioned aspects of our conventions. Remember when you used to walk into the hotel or convention center and be warmly met by the sound of ringing chords whichever way you turned? Remember how difficult it was to get from the registration desk to your room without singing at least a tag or two with old friends or new acquaintances? Remember how difficult it was to find a stairwell or a secluded corner that wasn't occupied by a quartet – pickup or otherwise? Remember how great it was to – well – to just <u>be there</u>?

Point is – we're trying hard to bring those characteristics back to our Division and District Conventions. The FWD Board of Directors, from President **John Krizek** on down, and the FWD Events Team, under FWD Events Vice President **Chris Wilson**, are working very hard to make our conventions the kind of events that have something for everyone.

We absolutely need your help. First, of course, we need you there to participate. Second, we need you to do just that – participate!

How? Here they come - the vaunted bullets!

• Bring and wear your "I'll Sing *(insert voice part)* With You" buttons. Don't got a button? I'm certain the omnipresent Keith Eckhardt and crew will be there to supply them. Use


the button! Find someone that's not singing, go find two more of the same, and get it on! Suggestion (from **Ray Rhymer**): Have a song or two ready to go – polecats will do just fine. Don't stand around trying to decide. Don't worry too much about what pitch – if you don't have a pitch pipe, go with what seems right – chances are it'll work fine.

- Get the chapter involved in the Convention experience:
- o Organize a bus to transport the chapter to the Convention maybe pick up some neighboring chapter's members along the way.
- o Organize a nucleus within the chapter to engage other conventioneers in the above "I'll sing \*\*\* With You" experience at the convention.
- o Challenge a neighboring chapter to a contest to see who can get the most attendees at "Harmony for Lunch Bunch" at the convention.
- o Encourage chapter members to visit the AHSOW room to do some woodshedding – it's <u>way</u> too much fun to pass up. Maybe even pick a designated time for chapter members to do so.
- o Encourage your chapter quartets to hang around the Barbershoppers Shop and <u>ask</u> people to sing with them kind of a "Sing with the Champs" (which <u>all</u> quartets are) idea.
- o Likewise, encourage your chapter quartets to get out and sing in the community – perhaps in malls or in other public places (with permission from the establishment, of course) to get the public aware of what's going on in their town. Ask them to encourage the public to register for the competition (we don't sell tickets – only registrations), or just come down to the hotel/convention center to "hang out".
- Make the commitment to have fun! Determine that you will do your part to meet new people, participate in special events, respond to invitations to sing, find and exploit all that is positive for you, and share your experiences with others.

May we thus convene – belong – reunite – gather – in sublime HARMONY?

#### The Show That Was

This was to be the second annual show for the new White Mountains Arizona Chapter, High Country Chorus. We had selected July 13, 2002 as the date, to avoid a conflict with the Pioneer Days Festival in Snowflake/Taylor and the American Indian Arts Festival in Pinetop/Lakeside. It would be the weekend following the Fourth of July festivities in Show Low, and of course a week after the international Barbershop Convention in Portland. A perfect weekend with no local competition for our audience.

We had sold out our first annual show in 2001, which was held in the 700 seat Blue Ridge High School Auditorium, and ended up turning people away, so we decided to hold this show in the Show Low High School Auditorium, which holds 1200.

We were bringing back the Paradise Valley, Arizona Chapter Cactus Chordsmen as our guest chorus, and had booked Legacy, Dry Heat, as well as the OK Chorale. Dan Ryan had agreed to do the audience sing-a-long again, which last year had been such a great audience pleaser. Things were looking really good for another outstanding show.

Red flags started going up early in the year, when I learned that Galen McClain, baritone of the OK Chorale had left the quartet. I was reassured by Alan Fossenkemper that they had a very competent replacement in Tom Kish and would not only be able to meet their commitment but would put on a great show. I was non the less concerned. You have to understand that show chairman are expected to do the worrying for the chorus. Little did I know how much worrying was to come.

Shortly thereafter, I learned that legacy was breaking up. Ouch! What next? A discussion with Dan Ryan and Kerry Burns assured me that the quartet would meet their commitment, in spite of the fact that Ray Estes was now singing with Broadway, who were shooting for International competition. My concern was that without full regular rehearsals and shows, they would not be able to maintain their sharpness and not be able to perform at the level we had come to expect.

It was in the same timeframe, that I got the word that Dan Ryan, director of the Paradise Valley Chorus and baritone of Legacy had a serious hospitalization which resulted in the removal of a toe. All kind of thoughts raced through my head. First, was concern for Dan's health, but closely thereafter was the scary thought that we would lose Dan as director of the PV chorus, song leader and the Legacy quartet for our show. This could be disastrous. In early June, I got the word that Dan was recovering and would be able to make the show.

This had to be enough worrying for one year - Right? Wrong! On June 18th we received word that a fire had broken out just north of Cibecue, on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation. You have to understand that we had had four years of well below average precipitation in the White Mountains, and that we were in serious drought conditions with a forest that everyone knew was a tinder box waiting to explode. Word had been given that it was not if, but when it would happen. Little did we know then that this would be the "Big one". The fire spread incredibly fast towards the Northeast, and late on the 19th we in the Linden area, west of Show Low, received word that we had an hour to evacuate our home. What to take with you, what to leave behind? Believe it or not, the first thing I picked up, was my pitch pipe, which went on my belt, followed closely by a cell phone, my meeting night ritual; my barbershop briefcases, family pictures, important papers, valuables, some clothes, and we left to stay overnight with friends in Pinetop.

The next day, with the "Rodeo" fire ever so close, we realized for the first time that we really could lose everything, and had a lot of second thoughts about some things we had left in the house, so we tried to reenter our subdivision, but were turned back by the state police. With that, we decided to return to our second home in Mesa, Arizona.

Others would not be so lucky, having to stay in shelters set up in Eager, near the New Mexico border, or in Holbrook. We learned that one of our basses, George Slone, had lost his home to the fire. On June 20th, a second fire, the "Chediski" had broken out, and fear was that it would join with the "Rodeo" fire. We were glued to the television each day, and watched reports as "The Monster", as Jim Paxon, the Incident Commanders' spokesman called it, roared towards Show Low. All of these reports were originating from the campus of Show Low High School which was to be the site of our show, the staging place for command headquarters and tent home to the more than 3,000 firefighters battling the fire. By the 23rd, the fires had joined and the fire was over 400,000 acres, easily the largest fire in arizona history. Suddenly, and miraculously, the humidity went up, and with herculean effort, the firefighters were able to stop it on the outskirts of Show Low. On June 29th, with the "Rodeo-Chediski" fire stopped at about 469,000 acres, we got the word we could return to our home. I returned on July 1st, and my first thoughts were whether we might still be able to have our show. We had considered postponing or canceling it on the 30th of June, but decided to wait until we knew for sure it was impossible.

That afternoon, I visited fire headquarters at the school and with a lot of pleading and explanations about our planned usage of the auditorium the following week, I finally was able to talk my way into command headquarters and was allowed to speak to Jim Clawson, an assistant Incident Commander. After explaining our situation and asking if I would have to cancel the show, he thought for a moment and then said, "I wouldn't cancel the show if I were you. We are getting our arms around this fire and should be out of here by the 13th." That was what I wanted to hear. We renewed our publicity, and decided to invite all firefighters, police, and EMT personnel to our show as our guests. We had lost two full weeks of publicity and found that many





#### Youth Program Shifts Gears; Less Camp, More Outreach

Youth Harmony Camp North was held in June for 79 boys who had the time of their life. For the fourth year running, the Sunday performance was standing room only. The level of talent among our High School ranks is at an amazing level. **Uncle** 

Lloyd, John Krizek, Mark Freedkin and "other's" (too numerous to name) have built a program that is the pride of the Barbershop Organization. Gary Bolles, Ron Black, Bill Weiser and dozens more have taken the educational opportunities to new heights showing the world how it's done. Seven years in existence, a dozen or more years in creation; our system is the standard by which all are measured. Every year, more and more districts look to our system as a model for their own Youth Education program.



100% of the money needed to put on the Youth Harmony Camp program comes from chapter, individual and quartet donations. Donations are down, mostly due to recent events (9/11, stock market tumble, the recession). Further, chapters in the Far Western District [FWD] want to keep more of their own money to run their local numerous YMIH programs that are so marvelously successful.

Since we agree that the camp is the best thing going, how do we solve the problem of insufficient donations? One approach is obvious - individuals and groups donate more. Unfortunately, we can't count on that happening in a timely manner to support the required advance planning. Another approach is to turn the camp into a local program run by a group of co-operating chapters in the same regional area.


On September 26-28, 2003 we will. Placerville, Sacramento, Davis/Vacaville, Stockton, and others are joining together to host the eighth annual Northern California Youth Harmony Camp at Sly Park about one hour north of Sacramento. To get your chapter involved in this Northern California camp, contact Phil Crawford [916-371-1729]. If you and a group of chapters want

to run your own camp, then contact Mark Freedkin [949-559-9621] in SoCal, Jerry Fox [480-834-6696] in Arizona, or Bruce Sellnow [209-599-2094] in Central California. And remember, you can always talk to me and I'll help get the ball rolling.



The FWD is now moving to a new direction to award grants and offer large amounts of training to help chapters run Youth Harmony Evening, Days, and Weekends. For all the details on how this new approach works, please attend one of the Divisional YMIH training sessions, COTS, Harmony College West (next year), or one of the District Convention YMIH planning meetings. We still need your donations, but the emphasis will be on reaching more boys at less cost through support for local chapter programs.

Several new programs are being developed to increase financial resources. The first is the High School Music Premiere Learning CD Program. Our top district quartets are being asked to sing simple public domain barbershop songs that the high school quartets will want to sing and imitate. The song selection is also good for Joe Barbershopper, hint hint... The sheet music is being put in PDF format right on the CD and is included in the price. A new edition will be released every two years, provided we sell all of our stock. All proceeds from the CD sales go towards supporting YMIH education programs.



To copy another successful program, "Brother Can You Spare A Dime", I am challenging every chapter in the Far Western District to put out a 'Coins For YMIH' jar at every rehearsal.

When you arrive on-site, drop off your pocket change. Just a quarter a week from 2800 people 50 weeks a year will raise \$35,000. Bring your coins to the House of Delegates meeting at the spring and fall conventions. We'll accept coins, bills and paper. If the coins become too heavy, we'll get a brother Barbershopper to truck them to the bank.



Ask your chapter management to donate 5% of the proceeds from your shows to YMIH. Send a portion to the District and put a portion in your own YMIH account.

Contract with a local shopping mall to allow quartets to sing at Christmas time. Two months before the event, have your guys go out and collect sponsors. Call it a sing-a-thon. Ask people to pledge \$5, \$10, \$25 for you to entertain people shopping at the local mall. While at that mall, put a tip cup and membership brochures out for people to see who you are and what you are about. Make a big sign and advertise that you are raising money for YMIH. Tell people that donations can also be given in person on Tuesday nights at your rehearsal hall...;-) Send a portion of the money raised to the District and keep a portion for your chapters YMIH program.



Now you've got a couple thousand in the bank earmarked for YMIH; "How do we spend the money?" You might laugh at such a question, but in fact this is the most popular question asked. We've got some money, now what? First, get some training. If you've never worked with children, and some cases even if you have, you need to know of the many legal issues that are involved. Accidents happen and in most cases we have insurance to cover the costs, but many accidents can be avoided with just a little forethought. If you cannot make it to one of the MANY district training programs, then seek out educators or Boy Scout leaders; they know how to work with kids and how to avoid common pitfalls.

Next, do something small. YMIH is a team sport. Each success builds towards more success. Your program may not attract 100 boys, but four sessions of 25 achieves the same results and a fraction of the cost. Don't hold out for the big score; know that lots of little hits will win the game.

Lastly, tell people what you did. Don't be ashamed if only ten boys showed up; be proud of your contribution. Of the 83 chapters in our district, most of you don't have large communities to draw high school students from. 50 chapters running three ten boy events a year will contribute 1500 Barbershop introductions to high school students. Keep in mind that running an event for ten boys can cost less than \$50.

With Harmony in our hearts and determination in our minds we can Keep The Whole World Singing, one boy at a time.





#### Harmony College West

Most Districts hold an annual music education school; Far Western District has TWO, plus five Divisional quartet workshops! If you attended Harmony College West this past weekend, no words can increase the exhilaration you are still feeling. If you missed it... well, you really missed it.

21 quartets submitted their minds and bodies to 8 hours of instruction from some of the best coaches in the Society. The foursomes ranged from several very serious competitors to one brand new group that met via the Harmonet, exchanged charts by e-mail and showed up to learn. (They live so far apart, that their next step is for each to share his excitement and knowledge with three more guys in their own locales. Pretty clever!)



A bunch of other guys enrolled for intensive 8-hour courses; Vocal Production, **Dr. Rene Torres**, History of A Cappella Music, **Dan Jordan**, Arranging, **Russ Adkisson**, Woodshedding and Tag Singing, **Warren Grant** and **Dick Dickey**.



As Education VP for AHSOW, I was at the school to teach a special course in "Ear-Arranging." The class was amazed to discover that "Woodshedding" requires exactly the same vocal production and tuning skills that champions use to win their gold medals. After class, one of the students (a chapter officer) said, "Gosh, this ought to be required of every man before he's allowed to join a chapter. My chorus director should have been here!"

(And you thought AHSOW was for decrepit old fogeys. Hah! The latest man to pass his audition is legendary gold medal lead, **Drayton Justus**. If you haven't had "The Manly Art of Woodshedding" at your HEP School... contact **Toban Dvoretzky** at www.AHSOW.org immediately, to get it on the calendar.)



I also had the pleasure of coaching 5 quartets. Now, I do a lot of workshops and harmony schools, but this one had a pervasive attitude that I have rarely seen in other Districts; EVERY quartet man really was there to learn and improve. No matter what I asked them to do, they just did it. Then, on Saturday evening, they took those new skills on stage. Very impressive.

The Saturday Evening Show was in the University of Redlands Memorial Chapel. The first half was a stunning parade of 21 quartets -- in 58 minutes! Rumor has it that someone bet HCW Dean, **Jim Crowley**, that he couldn't keep the first half to an hour. (Some guys will do anything for a free beer! ;-) Jim had all of the student quartets queue up along the side aisle, and as one group would leave the stage, the next made its entrance. (BTW, Jim's also a fine MC.)



The efforts and quality of the coaches was evident. The quartets had come to learn, and they did. All of the quartets did splendid performances... and several were worthy of international

competition. (The running joke with the coaches was how often our quartets said: "You guys all must read the same book. You all hear the same mistakes and give us the same fix." As my roomie, Singing Judge **Gary Bolles**, so eloquently said, "Well, duh! We've been teaching this for 35 years... and only the champions have been listening."



Capping the first half was a marvelous performance by FWD's 2001 Senior Quartet Champs, **4 Old Times Sake**. Wow, did those guys sing! Feisty little tenor, **Jerry Fairchild**, hasn't lost a thing since winning a gold with the Sidewinders in '64. The quartet proved that excellent vocal technique works just as well for mature voices as it does for the young'uns. (What a shock!)



The second half was worth much more than the cost of the school. It opened with 2002 National A Cappella Champions and FWD Medallists, **The Perfect Gentlemen**. Holy smoke, can these guys sing! 35 minutes of non-stop ringing chords, great laughs, costume changes and novelty tunes. (Imagine "Harvest Moon" sung in the style the 1910's, '30's, '50's, '70's, '90's? Imagine a tall skinny bass with an huge afro-wig impersonating Aretha Franklin ... Hysterical... and, beautifully done.) Truly, they gave a masters class in barbershop quartet showmanship.

Just when you thought it couldn't get any better, our 1990 International Quartet Champions took the stage and raised the ante. **Acoustix** never sung better! They left absolutely no doubt that they are the masters of barbershop harmony singing.



As they masterfully rang their way through their set, the various members gently alluded to the Harmonet firestorm that followed their AIC performance in Portland. Their message was clear: "We are a Barbershop Quartet, we proudly sing Barbershop Harmony and when we venture into non-traditional music, we do it very well because of our Barbershop skills. We've have some CD's in the lobby... if you like what's on them buy 'em, if you don't, don't."

Towards the end of their set, Bionic Baritone, **Jason February** stepped forward to introduce the next song. Suddenly, he looked nervous and he seemed to be checking all the exits. "Isn't this the home of the 7th Judicial Circuit?" he asked, "Where all those weird rulings have come down?" The audience howled as he begged them to lock the doors so the quartet could do their next song without getting arrested. The Stix put down their mikes, walked to stage right, faced the flag, raised their hands to their hearts and, without sound reinforcement, filled the auditorium as they sang the "Pledge of Allegiance", segued into "The Stars and Stripes Forever"! Whew! What a finish to an all-barbershop show.

Unbelievably, the next morning we had three more quartet coaching sessions... and, the men were vocally and mentally ready to work. (FWD is serious about excellent Barbershop singing.) HCW Dean, **Jim Crowley** may not be able to give up this District job for a while... he's too good at it.

perhaps the world's biggest bookstore, beautiful sights, and a transportation system that I wish my home town of San Diego would copy.

#### **Contest sessions.**

The **Santa Fe Springs Chapter**'s chorus, the **Masters of Harmony**, took the contest by storm. There was no doubt who won the chorus contest shortly after they began to sing their first song. Prior to the time they sang there was debate going on within the audience as to who was leading. (Only the judges knew for certain.) The MOH contest package was excellent, and their costuming was beautiful to see. The **Phoenicians** presented a good package, also.

The quartet contest was great, but picking the winner in this contest was not as easy as it was for the chorus contest. The FWD quartets did a fine job and made us proud to know they were representing our district. Three quartets made the top 10. Congratulations to all six quartets!

#### **Society Board of Directors Actions.**

The Society Board of Directors deliberations in Portland included the adoption of the practice of regularly representing the Society as "The Barbershop Harmony Society", accompanied in some manner with "doing business as SPEBSQSA, Inc." It was also recommended that chapters and districts use the same Society name reference in their communications and promotions activities. In addition a new logo is to be designed or words are to be added to the Society's stationery and other printed and electronic materials that visually indicates our Society is a North American, international organization. This will serve to recognize the fact that Canada and the United States have been long term partners in the Society's history.

Another important matter was the adoption of a "SPEBSQSA Youth Policy Statement" in support of the Vision of the Society "to be an ever-growing fraternity of barbershop-style singers, leading the cause of encouraging vocal music in our schools and communities." The Society's commitment to maintaining high standards of personal conduct by its members and to providing a wholesome environment in which the activities of the Society and chapters and districts take place lead to the development of the policy. Headings found in the policy include: Policy Application, General Standards of Conduct, Members' Responsibility, Youth Responsibility, Alcohol, Society Membership, and Youth Participation. Sample forms were also developed to accompany the policy. I strongly urge all Youth Outreach chairmen to review this new policy. The policy may be found on the Society Website, www.spebsqsa.org.

In other Board action, a "Member Contact Information Policy" was adopted regarding the appropriate use of members' contact information in electronic and other marketing techniques. Again, this policy may be found on the Society Website.

Those who attended the SING A cappella! Festival in Nashville will be happy to know that the Events Committee has been directed to evaluate the merits of an A cappella Festival to be held in 2004 at Louisville.

#### COTS is coming, COTS is coming.

By now I am sure that all chapter Nominating Committees are completing their task of nominating chapter officers for 2003. I trust that the nominees were told of the expectation that they would be attending the Chapter Officer Training Seminar session in NorCal November 9-10 or SoCal November 16-17. The expenses for these sessions are legitimate chapter expenses. ALL new and returning officers should be attending COTS. All COTS instructors are undergoing certification or recertification in Racine, WI the weekend of September 13-15. New materials are being developed for use in COTS this year. Returning chapter officers always have a wealth of insights to offer to the newly elected men. Even those long-term Secretaries and Treasurers should be attending, as there is new information for them each and every year. A sure way of getting your chapter off to a flying start every year is to have all of the officers attending COTS. See you there?

There will likely be about fifty guys making the bus trip from the Fullerton with chapter member **Maynard Allard** doing the driving. (Don't worry; he does this stuff for a living, at least part time) I just hope he doesn't get his beard tangled up in the steering wheel. (Just kidding, Maynard) I encourage all Far Western District Chapters to take the time for one, or more, inter-chapter visits every year. trailer parks were still mostly empty, but we pushed on.

What else could happen? On Sunday July 7, I learned that another of our basses, Bob Koons, had crashed his airplane on landing at Show Low Airport. Fortunately, he had only facial lacerations, and his 14 year old grand son escaped with no injuries whatsoever. Bob was not so pretty, but made rehearsal on the Tuesday prior to our show. The firefighters moved out of the SLHS complex on July 8th, five days prior to our show.

Due to the evacuation, we learned that the Show Low Chamber of Commerce had misplaced 200 tickets that had been given them to sell for our show. We quickly replaced them and they resumed selling tickets. George, whose house was burned, was the Afterglow Chairman, and the tickets had all been destroyed in the fire. His wife, however, had thought to take his chorus uniform during the evacuation process. By this time, we had a new perspective about what was important in life, and what was totally irrelevant. I had the tickets reprinted and we went on with what was now the show that had to go on. We had too much invested in this to fail.

On July 8th, I learned that the auditorium manager, who I had worked with on discussions about the sound and lighting requirements for the show would not be there the night of our show. The Secretary of the school district said that her son was familiar with the sound equipment and could run the sound. So we would have a new sound man. That evening I had to make a trip to the local Ace Hardware store for a home project and, miraculously, ran into a fellow who had sung lead with us a few times, but was not active with the chorus. I discussed our plight about the sound and lighting, and he told me that his wife was the expert on lighting at the High School and would be glad to help us out. What a relief that was. Things were starting to go our way at last.

The day before the show, I picked up the keys to the auditorium and went there to check out the auditorium. Everything was OK, and I left to get ready for the Friday evening extra rehearsal we were to have at our regular meeting place.

At noon on Saturday, I went to the auditorium to unlock it for the technical rehearsal we were to have at 1:00 PM with the sound and lighting people, and the combined Choruses. What a shock I had when I went to the stage. All the stage lighting was on it was an absolute oven in the auditorium. There must be at least 250,000 watts of lights on that stage. Someone had entered the auditorium unauthorized on Friday evening and turned all the lights on and left them on for nearly 20 hours. Having lived in Phoenix for many years, I estimated that the stage was at least 140 degrees and that the auditorium was over 120 degrees. The auditorium is not air conditioned and so we turned off the lights and frantically opened all of the auditorium doors. By the time we were ready for the show, it had cooled down, but not even to a tolerable level. It was just plain hot and miserable in the auditorium.

The curtain opened on schedule at 7:00 PM and we found an enthusiastic audience of about 750 people in attendance. Our MC, Bob Jackson, of Music Appreciation 101 fame, welcomed our firefighter guests, and the show went on. Legacy and the OK Chorale performed flawlessly to a very receptive audience, and when we completed the singing of God Bless America to close the show, an enthusiastic standing ovation sent us to the afterglow with a feeling of accomplishment that we could overcome any obstacle that stood in our way. I have been told that one should only worry about things that are in your control. I should not have been worried at all, I guess.
