A Time For Renewal

Year end, year beginning. A time to reflect on the road just traveled, install new officers, renew our commitments, and plan the next leg of our barbershop journey. How can we make it better?

Musically we're on a roll. Last summer the chorus gold returned to the FWD (wasn't that a great writeup in the Harmonizer?)

and our quartets are again among the top echelon of barbershopping. Thanks to all the hard work of Music & Performance VP Jim Crowley and Quartet Promotion chairman Stan Sharpe, some 300 men participated in intensive quartet training at our schools and quartet workshops during the year—which certainly addresses the needs of the "Q" factor in our Society's initialed name.

We chartered seven new chapters in 2002 (see Peter Feeney's column in this issue) while we lost two. Overall, we, like the rest of the Society, are struggling to keep our numbers up, but some great new membership tools are available, including the new "Singing is Life" video.

Westunes is better than ever (did you know you can now opt for electronic rather than print delivery?) Our pages are filled with exciting reports from the youth outreach frontier, so in that respect the future looks bright. The two COTS in November again were high-quality learning experiences. I'm especially proud of the two District-

added classes—web site design, and fundraising, taught by Keith Eckhardt and Michael Frazer respectively—which were full of eager students ready to explore these exciting frontiers. CSLT VP Bernard Priceman not only coordinated the successful schools, he saw his roster of chapter counselors reinforced, so now every chapter in the District has a counselor assigned.

Task Forces Study Restructure, Plateaus

Two special task forces are at work for the improvement of our District. Following the mandate of the House of Delegates to return to a division VP form of governance in 2004, a District Restructure Task Force, chaired by Long Range Planning Committee chairman Bill Cale, is developing plans for fleshing out our new District Board, with an eye toward maintaining and improving the services for our members and chapters provided by the current functional offices.

A Plateau Study Task Force, chaired by past District president Don Gubbins, is evaluating the plateau system in our District. Years ago we instituted the A-AA-AAA plateaus, to recognize achievement among similar-sized chapters, and to encourage more participation by smaller chapters. It hasn't exactly produced that last result, so it's time to take a look to see what we might be doing better. The Task Force has circulated a questionnaire to chapter presidents to collect data and ideas. I hope your

Make plans now, if you haven't already, to support the novice quartet contests north and south, and to attend the Spring District convention, which is moving to Reno—always a popular site.


chapter has responded, so we can move forward in this vital area.

Attention All FWD 2003 Contestants!

The 2003 Contest cycle will soon be upon us and all contestants (quartet and chorus) are urged to review the eligibility and other rules concerning contests. Briefly these are the items of most concern:

- Eligibility
- Entering a contest/registering for a convention (both necessary for contestants)
- Reports that can be expected via FWD-LIST (listserv)

Eligibility is clearly defined by the Society and FWD SOP regarding the several contests that will be conducted in FWD during 2003. In brief:

- 1. All members of a competing quartet and/or a competing chorus must be paid- up members of the Society and the chapter they represent at the time of the contest.
- "Dual members" and transfers must be completed prior to the beginning of the contest cycle for the year (March 21, 2003)
 - a. Exceptions: a dual member or transfer, as a result of moving to a new area and joining the local chapter, may be accomplished with approval of the FWD DVPC&J no later than 30 days prior to the contest in question. (FWD DVPC&J email: dickgirvin@juno.com
 - New members (never before a Barbershopper or non-members for two or more years) may sing in competition immediately after their initiation dues are paid.

Choruses must compete in their own division, however quartets may opt to compete in another with the written approval of the DVPC&J. Choruses may (and are encouraged to) enter the "Performance Only," category in order to provide a 12 minute "presentation," for the experience and fun of contest without the need for score.

Entering a contest/registering for a convention. Contestants (quartet and chorus) must register online at the FWD website. Only as a last resort—if contestants (and/or friends, relatives or chapter mates) are unable to access the website—will alternate contest entering procedures be used. These procedures can be obtained from the DVPC&J via e-mail

The procedure for **entering a contest** follows:

- Access the FWD website: http://www.spebsqsafwd.org
- Select under "WHAT'S HOT" or "CONTEST & JUDGING" either "Chorus Contest Registration" or Quartet Contest Registration," as appropriate.
- Fill out the form provided (completely) and submit the form. A personal acknowledgement will be received by e-mail from the DVPC&J. Note: if the acknowledgement is not received in two days, it can be assumed that the message may have been lost in cyberspace.... hence, send it again! A contestant can be assured that they are entered in a contest **only** upon receipt of the acknowledgment.

Registering for a convention (required of all contestants).

All contestants (and attendees) must register and pay the registration fee for the convention using forms that are available through WESTUNES or from the host chapter. Note: all divisional conventions are open seating and District Spring and Fall Conventions are reserved seating.

Reports that can be expected. Contestants for any FWD Contest will receive, via e-mail, a minimum of the following reports prior to the contest:

- Acknowledgement from the DVPC&J of receipt of their entry form
- A 30-day advance notice (via FWD-LIST listsery) of contestants entered in the current contest.
- An order of appearance listing (via FWD-LIST listserv) 14 days prior to the current contest.
- A "top 10" listing of the results of the contest (via FWD-LIST listserv)
- Complete contest results (Official Scoring Summary) at FWD website under "SCORES."

Contestants (and FWD members) who have e-mail capability and are **not** currently member of the FWD-List Listserv may join by posting a message to:

We are looking forward to a great season of contests in FWD in 2003. Your awareness of the above rules and recommendations and adherence thereto will make things run even smoother for all.

Planning for 2003



The Far Western District ran two very successful COTS schools in November, the first in a very stormy and wet Pleasanton and the second in a very hot San Bernardino. Not that any time was spent outdoors. On the contrary, almost every minute was spent inside, in classrooms, learning tons of new

stuff. And that's one of the funny things about COTS - many officers said they didn't want to go again because it would be old stuff and they'd done it all before. Yet over and over again attendees came up to me afterwards and said that although they had thought it would be like that, in actual fact there was a great deal new that they learned and from excellent instructors. So thank you to the 62 chapters who had the foresight to send the 254 men who attended. To a man, they agreed that it was well worthwhile and lots of fun, too.

So, now that the COTS schools are over, I hope each new Board is ready to plan for next year. As VP for Chapter Support and Leadership Training I want to do what I can to help that happen, so that each chapter can grow musically and in size and have as much fun as possible along the way. But before discussing some of the things chapters might plan for, I want to talk about the planning process. Board meetings are important and cover many aspects of running a chapter. But they're also very structured. Officers make their reports, a few votes are taken and maybe a couple of other matters discussed. Does this help plan for the future? Probably not. Is there even time to plan for the future at a Board meeting? Probably not. So my recommendation is that you find a totally separate time to sit down and plan the year ahead. And it need not even be the entire Board. Perhaps it's just the VP's, or a planning committee including some men who are not even Board members. The important thing is to set a separate time and to get the right people.

Of course, some things naturally fall into place in a barbershop year: the officers' installation, Valentines, contests and conventions, shows, COTS and elections for next year's officers (already?). But many other things are not automatic. They need to be planned, and when planned properly can be hugely successful. Let's talk about a few of them.

At COTS, a mock planning session took place for one of the most important events we can ever plan for ^ our guest night. This is the lifeblood of the chapter and should not be merely a date on the calendar. Spend a great deal of time planning for it.

Make sure your Chapter development VP tackles the event with enthusiasm and lots of help so that it becomes an evening that every guest will remember. And it doesn't all start when the first guest walks through the door. It starts with marketing and P.R. and coordinating every facet of the event.

Another popular event in the barbershop calendar is a chapter visitation. Most chapters have barbershop brothers fairly close by. What fun a joint meeting can be, with group and quartet singing, mini competitions, tag learning, etc. The camaraderie between barbershoppers is like no other. We need to take advantage of that. And how about social events? These should be planned for and promoted from the very start of the year. The chili cookout, the picnic in the park, a children's games afternoon - events that allow our families to be a part of our world to bring us all closer together.

One other slightly different thought would be to make a serious effort to encourage chapter members to attend contests and conventions, especially when your chapter is not competing. There is no better chance to see great entertainment and meet and sing with far flung barbershop brothers, all for a few dollars. Our Society is all about encouraging people to enjoy an art form. For new members in particular, being right in the middle of hundreds or maybe thousands of barbershoppers is the most wonderful experience.

I know you have a hundred other ideas up your sleeve to keep your members happy and entertained through the year. If you don't, how about starting the year with a brainstorming session. Include the whole chapter. It's fun to hear all the hair brained ideas that people have, except that some of them turn out not to be so hair brained at all! The bottom line is to plan ahead and be successful. And take your planning seriously, even if it's for fun things. You'll see the benefit. I promise.



FIRST (and last) CALL FOR FWD BULLETINS

Here is the first and last call for bulletins for the 2002 Far Western District Bulletin Contest. All FWD Bulletin Editors who have published eight or more *monthly* issues (or eight months of weekly or bi-weekly bulletins) during 2002 are eligible to enter.

Two classes of bulletins will be accepted for contest: Large Bulletins (more than 6 pages) and Small Bulletins (6 or fewer pages). Editors should submit three copies of three successive month's issues (monthly) or nine consecutive issues (weekly) or six consecutive issues (biweekly). One of the copies of each issue should be as printed and delivered to subscribers; the balance can be photocopied. (The Layout and Reproduction judges must see the actual issue (not the paste-up) that went to the readers.)

The bulletins will be judged by certified PROBE Bulletin judges on the following: (actual score sheets available on request)

Content: (267 points maximum per issue), judged on how well the editor:

Informs on coming events

Records recent events

Reflects views of chapter members Recognize efforts of chapter members

Promote barbershopping

Recruitment

Encourage pride and participation.

Layout and Reproduction: (200 points maximum per issue), judged on how well the editor displays:

The "stage presence" of the bulletin

The layout of the Nameplate, Masthead and all printed material

Readability, headlines, illustrations and reproduction.

Grammar and Style (200 points maximum per issue), judged on:

Punctuation

Grammar

Style.

(normalized by dividing by "judgeable pages")

Entries should be mailed to the below address to arrive on or before January 1, 2003 The contest results will be announced with trophies for the top Large and top Small bulletins at the Spring Prelim Contest in Fresno on March 21—at the House of Delegates meeting. The top two scoring bulletins (regardless of size) will be entered in the International Bulletin Contest.

- "Pattern News Releases" Let the community know who your new officers are, and what you're planning.
- "What Makes a Good Community Service Project" get the creative juices flowing in preparation for a Grant request or Corporate Sponsorship.

Once you've reviewed the options, make a plan:


- Decide on what your product is (general membership, guest night, community outreach, grant request, show, etc.).

- Decide on the best ways to reach the above audience/customer


- (Personal contact, Newspaper ad, Public Service Announcement, Audition for Admission, Press Release, etc.)

- BASK IN THE SUCCESS!



Pre-registered were approximately 160 high school and junior high school boys and 190 high school and junior high school girls. As is the case here on "the mainland" not all the young people were able to attend at the same time, what with other commitments like sports events and family functions. However, we learned before departing on Sunday that there were 111 boys in attendance throughout Friday evening and all day Saturday. We don't know yet the total of the girls' participation.

Gary and I shared the joys of singing (especially barbershop harmony) from 6:30PM Friday to 9:00PM. Together we gave them vocal warm-up exercises, explaining the purposes and importance of each. What a magnificent, full sound these young men made!

In teaching the music, which included **Don Gray's** AULD LANG SYNE, (a real OLD song, written in 1799), **Freddie King's** HE'S GOT THE WHOLE WORLD IN HIS HANDS and LET THERE BE PEACE ON EARTH from the Fred Waring Choral Series, we had the generous support and assistance of a dozen stalwart members of **THE SOUNDS OF ALOHA CHORUS**. These wonderful guys shared their time and voices the entire weekend, helping with section practices and quartet coaching.

After closing down Friday evening, our small steering committee met with our counterparts from the Sweet Adelines at a Hawaiian Mexican Restaurant! Would that be called "Haw-Mex" or "Hex-Mex"? (Now I'll get more letters from **Hec Rivas**!) We had a most progressive meeting making certain we were all going in the same direction though in separate venues. Gary and I got to meet Bill Joor's counterpart **CHRISTINA SMITH** and one of the two girls' clinicians, **BARBARA LECTHER**, both from New Zealand. The other clinician was our good buddy and

current Sweet Adeline Quartet Champion Baritone (from San Diego) **SANDY SHELVER**. All systems were GO!

Saturday's events started at 9:00AM at McKinley High School again. But as soon as we arrived, it was suggested that we might want to move to the auditorium where the evening show would be presented. It seemed workers were planning to knock out the rear wall in a few moments. Gee! Just like home! So, we all moved.

We continued to rehearse the music, conduct section practices and coach those young men who had taken the leap to sing in a quartet, octet and other smaller groups. In addition, throughout the day, at each of the planned breaks (so we old guys could catch our breath) we were entertained by Aloha Chapter Quartets: **THE TROPICHORDS**, and **THE CASTAWAYS** plus a ton of tag teaching and singing which the boys *LOVE*!

Then, wouldn't you know, we added a little choreography and/or stage presence to the boys' repertoire! About 5:15PM, buses arrived and about 90 lovely young ladies joined our boys on the risers to run through the closing number LET THERE BE PEACE. Keep in mind, the boys learned only the tenor and bass of an S.A.T.B. arrangement. The only melody they heard was from the piano accompaniment or when they were to sing in unison from time to time. So when the girls joined us, singing the soprano and alto parts, it was like watching a flower blossom right before your eyes...a "bird of paradise!" It was absolutely beautiful and glorious. Even the kids got goose bumps.

Dinner was in the school cafeteria served by the barbershoppers and the Sweet Adelines. And then the show began at 7:00PM. The audience was made up of parents, family members, friends, visitors who read about the event in the local media and...get this...12 MUSIC EDUCATORS! And no admission costs. This was the chance for the Hawaiian Children to Shine...SINGING! It was their gift to us!

There were girl' quartets, boy's quartets, adult groups, mixed groups, the Sounds Of Aloha Chorus with 40 members proud, The Na Leo Lani Sweet Adeline Chorus with 30 lovely ladies, a Quintet singing a very contemporary piece...and well too!...then 10 young men (I don't know what that's called other than an ensemble...is it a "tentet"?) and these guys tore the place apart...they sang "HONEY – LITTLE 'LIZE MEDLEY" with five or six choruses of the latter...but with a rap chorus! WOW!

Then the Young Men In Harmony Chorus with Gary directing AULD LANG SYNE and me directing HE'S GOT THE WHOLE WORLD IN HIS HANDS with staging by the world-renowned **Scorpianaires** from Blythe...followed by the Young Women In Harmony Chorus and finally, after the thank you's from **Chris Smith**...the combined YWIH and YMIH Choruses singing LET THERE BE PEACE.



These men located in all of our five divisions but their availability is the key factor.

There is no fee for their services. We ask only that you provide the assigned Reviewer with a pair of complimentary tickets to the show and afterglow...preferably in the first row of the balcony (if you have one) or in the center of the 8th or 10th row of the auditorium. His view of the entire stage is of the utmost importance. Also, cover his mileage and, if he has to stay overnight, his out-of-pocket expenses.

He would like to meet with your Music Committee, Show Committee and those creative decision makers you feel necessary to hear his comments immediately after the final curtain. Share 30 minutes of you time with him to highlight some of his observations and when he gets home, he will write and send a complete report of his review to you to share with your entire chapter for the next performance.

The majority of the audiences had never heard barbershop music before, but never-the-less the performances by each quartet were enjoyed and appreciated.

Placerville YMIH Program

Ron Murray, YMIH Chairman

One of the Placerville Chapter goals is to promote awareness and appreciation of Barbershop harmony throughout the schools and communities within El Dorado County. One of the ways we accomplish this goal is to visit our schools twice a year with both a female and male high school quartets. In the last four years we have introduced the Barbershop style of singing to over four thousand students.

Once the students have assembled, the program goes something like this.

The first thing we do is tell the students the two reasons why we are here. Number one and most important is that we are here to encourage the students to get involved in the arts programs in their school whether it be art, drama, instrumental or vocal. The reason for this is that it is a proven fact that students who were involved in the arts turn out to be well adjusted adults.

The other reason why we are here is to introduce them to a true American art form called Barbershop singing.

To introduce the students to the Barbershop style of singing we use one of our chapters quartets singing Wild Irish Rose in which each part sings a few bars individually and then all four parts sing the entire song.

Because we learned a few years ago that it is difficult for young students to relate to we adults, we now bring in a female and male high school quartet to present the majority of the program.

Their part of the program goes something like this.

Each high school quartet sings three songs. We then teach the audience the song Harmony Leads the Way. After the audience sings Harmony Leads the Way a couple times they are then given the opportunity to come on stage and sing the same song with the two high school quartets. This is the highlight of the program. To see the faces light up after hitting a couple chords is beyond description.

The audience is then given the opportunity to ask the high school quartets questions. This is a very important part of the program because thestudents want to know why the quartets sing.

We then conclude the 50 minute program with the high school quartets forming an octet to sing the last song.

To accomplish this program, of course, takes funds. Our chapter allocates 5% of all funds raised during the year. A pot is passed around every rehearsal and twice a year at our shows we conduct a raffle to benefit the program. We are fortunate to have the Sacramento Valley Sweet Adelines underwrite all the expenses of the female high school quartet.

Quartet Corner

(written and edited by Allen Fossenkemper – OK Chorale Quartet)

Allen Fossenkemper is a thirty-year member who has performed with the Phoenicians and the Masters of Harmony. His quartet experience ranges from Division to International semi finals and includes such names as The Sound Committee, Remember When and most recently The OK Chorale. He has written and produced dozens of barbershop shows and is a member of the Far Western District Standing Ovation team. Allen has agreed to author and edit the Westunes "OUARTET CORNER." which will be dedicated to the craft of quarteting and profiling of FWD foursomes. Look for much more to come.

Constructing a powerful and professional **Quartet Show Script**

Most serious quartets will work for months on their vocal and visual presentations to insure a clean, exciting and professional musical effort. Unfortunately, and all to often, many will offset this hard work by adlibbing their way through the non-singing portions of their act with meaningless, unrehearsed, boring, unfunny and seemingly, endless banter.

Let your spoken message create an emotional stage on which you present the music.

With a little thought and effort you can bring your audience totally into your performance with intelligent, planned, rehearsed interludes and introductions. The average show attendee doesn't care what company you work for or that your tenor lifted the next arrangement off the Suntone's album. They want and deserve to be entertained by your entire package.

Lloyd Steinkamp claims: " Give me a list of unrelated songs any songs - and I can write a script that will tie them together into a flowing performance package." He's right! And, you don't have to be Lloyd Steinkamp to accomplish this important element to your show package.

All you need to do is tell the audience a simple story that will setup and enhance your song presentation. You can use a variety of ideas to construct your introductions, such as:

- a. What was happening in the world when this song was popular?
- b. What story is the composer trying to convey?
- c. What inspired the composer to write the song?
- d. If the song is from a musical, introduce the characters in the play and how the story line lead up to the song. You can even use the words of the play characters.

For example: "Uncle Remus, in Disney's classic movie Song of the South, introduced this academy award winning song when he said, Honey... It happened on one O'dem Zip-adee-doo-da Days. Now Dat's the kind of a day when you can't open your mouth without a song jumpin' right out of it."

If it's a sad song- set the mood before you sing with your intro and light changes: "Following the death of his beloved wife, Irving Berlin doubted that he could ever pen another piece of music. After months of seclusion and sadness his friends and family urged him to try again. From the depths of his despair and loss came one of his greatest and most memorable works. Here is Berlin's "When I Lost You."

Now aren't these examples (found on the internet) better than trivializing a song with something like: "Here is one of the songs we sang at Division contest last spring, we think you'll like it." or "Our Tenor's arranged this next song and he always insists that we sing at least two of his songs on every show."

Research is the key.

Between your local library and the Internet you have all the resources you'll ever need to construct a very solid set of introductions. Don't make it work - make it part of your hobby. Divide the research among the quartet members. Each man gets two or three songs to research. Set a deadline for getting it completed. Often, you'll find great introductions already written for you right in the research materials or websites. You can use these, word for word IF your give credit to the author or publication. Better still paraphrase their work and turn the message into your own words so you can time the intro to your overall presentation.

After everyone has completed the research, set aside an entire evening for the quartet to analyze the results. Listen to what each researcher has learned about the songs and what message(s) could be used in the introduction. When all have agreed on the message then each member should draft introductions to his assigned songs. When you think you have done the best you can read them to some other chapter members, your spouses, nonbarbershop friends, co-workers, etc. Listen carefully to their ideas and incorporate the best. These simple steps will make a huge difference for both the audience and your quartet's enjoyment of the songs. You will not only feel more at ease on the stage, but you will sing the songs with more feeling and emotion then ever before.

Finally, and importantly, each speaking member must memorize his part completely and practice it every time the quartet rehearses the song. It is very important that the quartet members get used to the timing of the intro so that a smooth and seamless transition can be made from the talking to the song. Never skip this vital step. You must execute your intros with the same emotion, gestures, believability and timing each time.

Research Tip – The Internet:

Try www.google.com as a search engine- just type in the song name, artist or composer and you will get all the information you will ever need for your introductions.

Performance Tips - From a Society Standing Ovation Seminar:

- 1. Always write your own introduction for the MC to use. Your package begins with that introduction so make it positive, short and powerful.
- 2. Open with you best up tune and "No Talking" before you
- 3. Follow that opener with another up tune or toe taper and again "No introduction."
- 4 Your third song is your first introduction. This is where you start the non-singing thread. You can reflect back on the previous songs if you want or you can just concentrate the setup of the next song.
- 5 The non-talking members should always listen to the introductions, too. About half way through the intro you can enhance the emotion of any message by having the three other three members humming or ohooing the verse of the song. You can also hum a refrain of the last song if the verse gives away the title of the next song.
- 6. Never wait until the end of the introduction to blow the pipe and tune. Establish the pitch during the introduction (discreetly) and then go seamlessly, into the song. Practice will make this perfect.
- 6 Your fourth song should also take advantage of the music background to the voice over introduction.
- 7 Your fifth song can and should be done without an introduction and should be on the up tune side but not as strong as vour closer.
- 8 Your final introduction should build toward the climax of the set. It should not only introduce the song but it should tell the audience that this is the end of the journey you've been on together.
- 10. No encores!

Note: The use of three-part background music during a song's introduction, will give the audience the feeling that they have just heard a 25-minute medley instead of six separate songs.

It's up to you!

The amount of time you will spend on this part of your show package will be measured in a few hours but it will make a big difference in your overall performance level. Let's face it. We can't all be in Michigan Jake, Nightlife or Gas House, but we can proudly and effectively share the stage with them buy constructing and executing a professional package that the audience will love.

Money, Money, Money

What would your chapter do with \$10,000? Buy risers, sound systems, and uniforms? Pay for music outreach in the schools? Start youth harmony camps? Fund concert series?

As you might guess, the possibilities are endless. This is the conclusion that attendees to the first two sessions of the new FWD Grant Writing Seminars came to as they began learning the basics of grant writing. You may ask "When and where did this take place?

In an effort to introduce this new program to the Far Western District, the class was added to the C.O.T.S. class list for the Northern California and Southern California weekends held in November for new chapter officers. At the Northern California seminar, we had a total of seven attendees (including one from Oregon), and 13 attendees at the Southern California Seminar. Each of the attendees began to experience the power of effective writing and focused thinking in the development of a winning grant request.

Attendees expressed excitement after being exposed to the number of funding sources available, and ways in which grant requests can be written, and in some cases, the ease with which grant money can be obtained. Many who were in attendance for other classes offered within the weekend expressed interest in future class offerings.

The new classes are part of an effort started this past summer, when designees from each district gathered in St. Joseph, Missouri, just prior to Harmony College, to take part in the kickoff of a new program designed by a handful of individuals with grant writing experience. The concept is that we can gain access to the millions of dollars (YES, MILLIONS of Dollars!) through the process of educating normal chapter members in the art of grant writing, and how to begin to write in a way that will potentially bring in new dollars for programs, equipment, and even new members to our chosen hobby of four part harmony.

If you were not able to attend the C.O.T.S. classes, you may be wondering how your chapter can get in on this new source of funds. We are developing a new avenue to provide this seminar to chapter officers and interested individuals within the district. In the coming months seminars will be made available regionally within the district, to teach interested individuals about the grant writing program. 

Getting Organized or "Lipstick On A Bulldog"

"In a lot of organizations, change is like putting lipstick on a bulldog. There's a tremendous amount of effort involved, and most times all you get is some cosmetics--and an angry bulldog." So wrote Dave Murphy of the San Francisco Chronicle.

During COTS classes preparing chapter officers for 2003, there was a lot of time spent on planning--planning to get ready for 2003. I'm fairly certain that everyone attending those classes agreed with their COTS instructors that planning was a necessity, and they were going to do plenty of it.

But what has happened since COTS? Have you drawn up your plans for the year? Have you done any planning at all, or are you just winging it from week to week? Have you determined what it is that needs to be changed in order for your chapter to be more successful?

Bringing about change is one of the more difficult things to do in any organization. Change is usually met with the comment, "We've always done it that way. Why change now?" I hope your plans have included the answer to that question. You need to be a salesman, but you also need to demonstrate leadership when trying to make changes.

A leader shares his ideas with his chapter. But he also has a good idea about what his chapter members want out of barbershopping and finds ways to meld their wants with his desires. The members need to see what's in it for them and why change will be good for them and the chapter.



Does the change need some massaging to make it work better? Don't be afraid to ask the members for their thoughts. You can bet they'll tell you whether or not they like what's going on. With good advance planning, their responses are more apt to be positive.

I am a strong believer that every minute spent on planning will save you hours of grief in the future. I share with my COTS classes that, "If you don't know where you're going, it doesn't matter which road you take."



The usual songs for Valentine's Day are "Heart Of My Heart" (Story of the Rose), "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" and "I Love You Truly". However, you can add your own love songs, if you so choose. It is a "must" to deliver a Valentine card, whether you buy it, or customize your own. Also, don't forget to deliver a rose and perhaps add a nice touch by having someone take a Polaroid picture of the quartet members and the recipient. No matter what, if your chapter chooses to do this program, be sure to send out that quality product that I mentioned in paragraph two, above. Thanks, and good singing!

We performed one song and then were totally surprised by our four sons who entered the room, costumed in our old uniforms (which fit them like they used to fit us) and performed our entire act for us. It was absolutely fantastic and what a thrill for us.

QUARTETING – THE ULTIMATE EXPERIENCE

Glenn Van Tassell

You have gone through the steps; you've selected just the right three fellow singers. You have chosen several really appropriate songs and you have rehearsed them well. You have even taken advantage of some very helpful coaching. You recognize that the potential of this quartet is actually pretty good. You are about to enter into the part of your quartet life that will test your level of preparation and your will to perform at your highest current level. You will now begin to realize opportunities to sing in front of real people, to enter contests, to sing on chapter shows, and unfortunately if you have not fully prepared for some of the challenges that these situations offer, you just might encounter some real obstacles.

Singing for your own chapter members or singing for a panel of society judges surely can be among the most daunting moments for a quartet singer, at any stage of performing experience. We surely know that these people want us to do our best, but that very fact puts us under additional stress. After all, we want to do our best for them too. To assure that you take your best vocal, emotional and physical capabilities into those situations, you will benefit from a process known as visualization. It is a very common technique among performers and athletes. I used it fifty years ago (in a losing effort) in the New York State high school 100 yard-dash semi-finals. I have continued to use it in more than fifty years of quartet shows and competitions. There can be variations on the process, but it comes down to this: Anticipate every aspect of the total experience and run it through your mind like a movie many, many times. Review, in your imagination, every aspect of the experience, so often and in such detail that there can be no surprises later, when you are actually in that moment. Do not misunderstand the degree to which I mean that you should review these details. Talk about it with your singing partners to be certain that you have anticipated all of the possibilities, but then do this frequently, as an individual exercise. Cover all of the details. If you are about to compete in a society contest, see yourself making the trip to the contest site. Think about your friends who will be telling you how great you are, or perhaps those who will caution you about your limitations. Know that there will be distractions caused by friends and family. Understand how you will deal with them. Picture your rehearsals at the contest site. Know what you will do if one of you manifests a minor vocal problem. Review the back stage routine. There will be a guy with a clipboard there whose job it is to get the competing quartets from dressing rooms to warm-up rooms and to the backstage area. He may or may not be sensitive to your concerns. Someone may, however unintentionally, distract you. Know it and be ready to deal with it. There may be delays or rushed moments. When you hear the master of ceremonies introduce your quartet, no matter if this is your first contest or number two hundred ninety nine, your tension level will be elevated. When you hear the response from the audience, you will be affected. Learn to use the energy of the moment. When you look out at the judges, you will know, more clearly than ever before, that this is it. You may find yourself asking, "Why would anyone put himself through this sort of stress?" You may discover that the audience loves you and that, too can be overwhelming.

The point of all of this is to see all of this in your mind before you put yourself in the real situation. If you have been able to anticipate most of the stresses, both positive and negative, there should be no surprises. You will always deal more effectively with those situations you have already experienced. You will not be undone by events that you know and expect. Be prepared and you will know the joy of the ultimate barbershop experience.

What you saw and heard was our way of thanking all our wonderful family and friends in barbershopping for the love and friendship they had shared with all of us for at least 45 years.

We opened with the wives, THE KNIGHT NURSES, dressed accordingly and helping us on stage. We sang our standard opener...OH, BY JINGO...with pauses for CPR and much chest pounding. I apologized to the audience for the vocal and musical assassination with which we had just abused them but then promised to have another song from Aramian, Rastatter, Salz and Steinkamp. At that point, our four sons: TERRY ARAMIAN, **SALZ CHRIS** RASTATTER, DON and STEINKAMP entered the stage and performed another of our old turkeys: SUPERMAN, replete with costume.

The boys joined the dads and together, we performed BROWN DERBY...another winning contest arrangement with the usual slapstick pratt falls etc. Finally, each Mom, Dad and Son joined together to sing an original piece we put together called HAR-MONY WITH YOUR FAMILY. At the climax of the song, the rest of our family, wives, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren (who could make it to Bakersfield) joined us on stage for the finale of the number.

The audience reaction was far more than we had hoped for which only proved to us that we are not the only ones who realize the love and togetherness that is built in to singing together, especially barbershop harmony. That same love and friendship is there for all of us to enjoy and grow up with. Ironically, that same emotion reversed itself with the mis-handling of the chorus contest. But on the bright side of that fiasco, most of the 18 young men from Westminster who shared their musical gift with us, were touched by that same love and friendship through the Young Men In Harmony Program that we in the FWD have nurtured and developed so successfully all these years with our high school contests and Youth Camps. Those fine boys have the message and keep your eyes and your ears on them...they will be famous and will make us all proud. They will also carry the banner of Love and Friendship high.
