

BarberShop Greeting Cards!

A unique new idea has been created by **The Hi-Country Harmonaires** Chapter of **Apple Valley, California**. The project started as a way to get information disseminated to chapter members quickly and easily. It has developed into a full-blown bi-monthly online newsletter with full graphics and hyper linked information.

But the newest addition is quite creative. It allows any Barbershopper to send a *free* birthday or anniversary electronic greeting card to *any* other Barbershopper (or their spouse). Originally developed for in-house chapter use it has been expanded to allow Barbershoppers worldwide the opportunity to send *free*, Barbershop oriented greeting cards to *anyone*.


Having used many so-called greeting sites with a limited amount of satisfaction as to their quality of cards, performance, ads shown, spam afterwards, etc, etc, it is refreshing to find a legitimate site that really performs and sends cards without ads and does it instantaneously. (Ads are presented to the *creator* of the card, but *not the recipient*!)

Max Maxwell, Lead of the **Apple Valley Hi-Country Harmonaires**, has found this site (*all-yours.net*) that does all of the above superbly. Along with 1000s of ordinary cards offered by this site (most in Flash), he has added eight (8) strictly Barbershop cards under the '*Specials*' category, which can be used for members and wives on their birthdays and anniversaries. **Max** has also added three MIDI files for these cards which feature a "*Barbershop-style Happy Birthday*," a traditional "*Happy Birthday*" and "*The Anniversary Waltz*." The Barbershop style piano is true to our art and the traditional Happy Birthday is full of '*juicy*' chords! An added plus is the Anniversary Waltz, done admirably in piano style.

After developing an accurate list of all members and wives birthdays and anniversaries, any *'Sunshine Person'* can input the cards to be sent for up to three months in advance and be assured they will be delivered *on time* and also be sent a *'pickup notice'* to verify their delivery.

All of this is *totally free* and can be used by all Barbershoppers as often as they wish. You could alternatively elect to set up your own site at *all-yours.net*, but why bother! **Max** has already done it for us and it is super! If you do elect to set up your own site, contact **Max Maxwell** by email (address on site) for permission to use his cards. He expects to expand the selection of BarberShop oriented cards in the near future, but is already functional with eight (8) great cards.


Make Plans Now



2005 is an exciting time to be a part of the Far Western District. At the October Board meeting in Bakersfield we discussed moving forward with action to have our five geographic divisions operate as teams. This was what we envisioned on the Governance Revision Task Force three years ago. The teams will be led by the Division Vice Presidents and closely assisted by their Chapter Counselors and representatives of the Functional Committees. At the Leadership forum in Racine, Wisconsin, we delved farther into this arrangement with members of the District Management Team and the concept was supported enthusiastically. The teams will be guided by one major goal, to provide the best possible Barbershopping experience for every member.

Leaders of other Districts and Society Committees are asking questions and watching with interest how the Far Western District performs.

In 2004 we went back to two COTS which resulted in a dramatic increase in attendance and the comments received from those attendees indicate the COTS were among the best ever. There's a new approach by the faculty to listen to and discuss those topics that concerned the attendees most. The intent was to minimize lecturing on material you could read for yourselves and to concentrate on getting the classes to work on finding possible solutions to real chapter problems and the process by which you can go about solving those problems. There were even two joint sessions between Presidents and Chapter Counselors involving the solving of problems.

Those of you who missed COTS will want to attend next year and those who did attend will want to return. Finally, it's my pleasure to inform you, at COTS we brought on board seven more experienced and dedicated Barbershoppers as Chapter Counselors and we have three more already committed to future membership in this resource group. This brings us close to our eventual goal of no more than two chapters assigned to any one Counselor.

Each quartet sang two songs of their choosing and were judged by a panel of three Contest judges and four Entertainment judges. Contest category judges were: **Keith Mulfinger, Terry Aramian** and **Paul Schmidt**. To balance out the panel, four chapter member's wives sat in judgment for the Entertainment Category.

Interestingly, a total of 22 chapter members sang in quartets, seven sang in more than one quartet and three men sang in two different groups than their own.

The judges were pleased to announce the winners after a close competition as follows:

First Place: Easy Street with Dick Courchaine, Joe Quince, Joe Pascucci and Bob Landes.

Second Place: Plan B with Richard Bailey, Woody Cady, Joe Pascucci, and Bob Landes.



SCHOLARSHIPS, SCHOLARSHIPS, & MORE SCHOLARSHIPS FOR 2005

GREAT NEWS! There will be eleven scholarships available next year for Directors' College. (Ten of these are funded by the Society board and Harmony Foundation. The remaining scholarship is District funded). The criteria for awarding those scholarships are basically the same as last year: Directors who have never attended Directors' College will be given highest priority. There is one additional condition, however. The recipient must agree to submit a tape a month after attending Directors' College. More information will be sent to the recipients concerning the taping. The Society Board has been very generous the last couple of years in funding all of these scholarships.(about \$50,000/year). They are now very interested to see if there is any tangible, lasting benefit to the chapters being served by these directors. The Chorus Director Development Committee shares this concern, and has decided to make the submission of that tape after DC to be a condition of receiving a scholarship. If there are any scholarships remaining, the following criteria will be used in determining who will receive them. The deadline for application will be approximately March 15

- 1. Barbershop Experience
- 2. Size of Chorus
- 3. Contest Score in the last contest with this director
- 4. Time since participation in the last competition
- 5. Time since the director last attended Directors' College

Also, if there are still some scholarships available, associate directors may be eligible.

The scholarship covers the tuition only (\$475). It is up to the director and his/her chapter to provide the transportation costs. Please know that the College is scheduled for July 31 – August 7, 2005 at a location to be announced in January 2005.



NOW IS THE TIME

New Years has come and gone. By now your chapter is in high gear with plans for a spring show and/or the Divisional contests for both choruses and quartets. Why not include some help from the Music and Performance Committee?

By the time you get this every quartet member in the District should have received an email questionnaire about quartet workshops. Your responses will help keep the Far Western District the leader in quartet singing. If you haven't yet, please complete yours and click the "SEND" button. It is probably the easiest survey to take and to send that I've ever seen. I've taken it and sent my responses back.

One of the programs designed to help quartets improve the music they sing and the performances they give is the Quartet Workshop. In 2004 there were 51 quartets which took advantage of this program. They attended workshops given in AZ/SO.NEV/SO.UT, SOCALWEST, NORCALWEST and the District's Harmony College West. There they received individual coaching from several different coaches. At these workshops quartets can get instruction on areas the quartet members feel their quartet needs help with. The coaches, after listening to the quartet, may suggest areas in need of help which they have discovered. As you know, coaches can fix things which a quartet never hears "from the inside".

Another extremely effective program offered by the Far Western District through the M & P Committee is the SOP, or Standing Ovation Program. For those of you, choruses or quartets, who have experienced a standing ovation (a spontaneous one, not one where the audience is simply standing up to rearrange their underwear before leaving) know what a thrill, a high, a rush they can be. The Standing Ovation reviewers will share with you the steps necessary to receive one. Notice I said "receive", not "get". If you present your show or your "singout" (an old fashioned term) with the right songs in the right order with the right amount of talking, humor and enthusiasm you will receive a standing ovation.

The SOP is designed for choruses or quartets which perform for groups or present programs of 30 minutes or more. Reviewers come to see an agreed-upon program or show. They write or record comments and suggestions about everything your chorus or quartet does during your performance. They give this review to the chapter president or chorus director or to the quartet. No copy of it is made. Only you know what he said. You can call him and discuss it. The reviewers are all "biggies" in their barbershop life. They are in the business of generating standing ovations. They have all been trained in the process and philosophy of the Standainjg Ovation Program.

To arrange for one of these "miracle workers" to review your chorus or quartet performance, simply call Lloyd Steinkamp - Unkalloyd - at 619-328-0146. He wrote the program and he'll be happy to help your quartet or your chorus improve the quality of the performances you present.

Making New Year Plans

Tis the season to be making plans for a bigger and better year on the YMIH front. Are your boys participating in a nearby Youth Harmony Festival? The annual High School Quartet contest (this year in Burbank)? Or Youth Harmony Camp?

What can a small chapter do?

Two chapters whose choruses may not challenge the Masters of Harmony musically are earning lots of points in their communities by involving high school singers in their shows. The **Visalia Mighty Oak Chorus** show last spring featured a combined high school mens' barbershop chorus, with all four area high schools (and their directors) participating. Based on the enthusiasm and smiles with which this event was reported, it looks like a new tradition has been established. The **Santa Cruz Gold Standard Chorus'** show in November, entitled "Sing For Your Life," featured two high school choral groups totaling 158 singers and a dynamite high school girl's quartet, in a fundraiser for the school's music programs. At last report, all the money hadn't been counted yet, but the show was a "super success." The high school chorus that participated in last year's show took home over \$2,000. Another tradition established.

And more respect earned. Talk about "leading the cause" for vocal harmony in our communities! What these two chapters have done can be copied all over the District.

Sing the National Anthem

Is the Val Hicks arrangement of "The Star Spangled Banner" in your chorus' repertoire? It should be. The Music Educators National Conference (MENC) is launching a national campaign to encourage all Americans to know and sing our National Anthem. Many of our choruses and quartets are already there, singing at community events, ball parks, etc. What a natural thing for us to do, in "leading the cause" for vocal harmony. Perform that patriotic song—and help school groups learn it and perform it. The honorary chairman of this campaign is first lady Laura Bush.

Help encourage collegiate singers

Another campaign you'll be hearing more about is a new Society emphasis on college-age audiences. A cappella music is "hot" on many campuses. The International Championship of Collegiate A Cappella is expanding its annual competition, with participation by the barbershop community. We in the FWD need to do a lot better at reaching this audience. To that end, I am pleased to announce the appointment of a new collegiate outreach committee: **Four Score**, our current silver medallist college quartet. We will be meeting soon and I'm looking forward to their help in mapping out a strategy. Having been barbershopping since they were a high school quartet, the guys of **Four Score** are also anxious to help any new college quartets get started, and encourage more participation along the way.

Just to share some interesting Harmony Foundation statistics – it appears our chapters will have contributed close to \$70,000 in 2004, with about half of that amount recorded toward a LOCAL charity! And YOU are a part if it!

In addition, Far Western brags of 13 members in the President's Circle – those who give \$1000 or more to Harmony Foundation annually! And YOU can be part of it!

Not to mention the 55 members of the Founders Club, the Foundation's Endowment program – 33 in the Bronze category (\$1000 minimum gift), 17 in the Silver category (\$10,000 minimum gift), 2 in the Gold category (\$100,000 minimum gift), and three in the Platinum category! And YOU can be part of it!

Also, through the good teaching of Michael Frazier, we had more than 20 chapters represented in the Grant Writing classes at COTS – a record number! And YOU are part of it!

So what do these statistics mean to YOU?? It shows that each of us wants to perpetuate this hobby, and there are ways to participate.

By the time you read this, I will have returned from a full weekend session with the 15 other district vice presidents of Financial Development. The session was a full immersion into Harmony Foundation, the programs now offered, the ways to contribute (e.g. matching through corporations), and how to promote them. It was highlighted by a national plan to bring contributions to the Foundation, and a district plan on increasing donations from fellow Society members. All for the love of singing and ensuring the Society's perpetuation. And YOU can be part of it!

What Could Your Chapter Do With \$5,000?



We started singing, and it was not long before the son was crying and holding his mother's hand. I had a hard time keeping my voice from cracking, and I was not going to look to either side of me. The staff had gathered behind us and all eyes were red and wet. As we left I did notice red eyes on some of the other guys as well. Even though this was the hardest song I ever sang, it was the most rewarding of all. I'm already looking forward to next year.

Even a five-year-old can get into the swing of it.

In Seattle, John Kropf brought along his five-year-old grandson, Galen Kintner, who had asked when he was going to get a red jacket so he could sing with Grandpa's quartet, Seventh Heaven. Kropf's wife made one for Valentines Day so he could sing for his teachers.

The music teacher, principal and staff were all in on the surprise appearance. Galen learned the verse to "Sweet Valentine" (Sweet Adeline) and "Let Me Call You Sweetheart." He not only sang, but also presented the Valentine on the cue words "Sweet Valentine" and a rose when the words "You're the flower of my heart" were sung.

Did we mention that this is a really good money-making venture, too?

The Kansas City (Missouri) Chapter delivered an impressive 386 Singing Valentines in the 2002 hearts and flowers marathon. (They actually had orders for 410.) The chapter broke the 200 mark in 1993 and the 300 barrier in 1996. As you'd expect, the amount of money that's been deposited in the chapter coffers has been significant.

While not every chapter has the resources to undertake such an endeavor, every chapter does have the means to run a Singing Valentines program at some level. It's an easy way to make money, and the emotional rewards for the singers are phenomenal.

If you haven't had a Singing Valentines program yet, make 2003 the year you start. Dr. Milo Tedstrom Has A Birthday

No Band Is Needed

When Doctor Milo Tedstrom celebrated his 104th birthday on November 21, his good friend Floyd Blackie Blackwell offered to bring his entire barbershop chapter along to provide the entertainment. All parties were intrigued by the possibilities, because Dr. Tedstrom s life has spanned the same musical period from which we all draw our inspiration. Blackie Blackwell has enjoyed more than eight decades of musical experience, and he assured the Orange Quartet Chapter that the good Doctor would love our singing.

While its member quartets often sing in contests and gigs, the Orange Quartet Chapter does not compete or perform for pay as a group. However, it does serenade in hospitals and at special events. This event would be a public test of the quality of its singing.

Seven Chapter quartets, dressed in barbership attire of vest and black tie, were ready to perform in the beautiful foyer of the Villa Valencia residential complex, where a sizeable audience eagerly awaited the event. Doctor Tedstrom s son and daughter opened the festivities, reminding all present that their father was the first internist in Orange County, California and since 1928 had been a pioneering influence in county hospitals.

Orange Quartet Chapter President Dave Gryvnak had limited each quartet to one song, which allowed M.C. Michael Werner to set a lively pace for the program. A parade of registered quartets, involving interlocking memberships, sang their favorite songs. It s Magic led off with *The Last Time I Saw Henry*, and Indigo sang *On the Sunny Side of the Street*. Four For Harmony sang *I Want to Be in Chicago Town*, and The Orange Town Four sang *Meet Me Tonight in Dreamland*. Singing together as The Plaza City Serenaders, the entire chapter sang three of the best known old classics: *Honey Little Lize, Heart of My Heart, and Let Me* *Call You Sweetheart*, directed by Paul Gutierrez. Then Fermata the Blue sang *Sentimental Journey*, Balderdash sang a special hello to a lady named *Mary Lou*, and California Blend ended the show with *It Had To Be You*.

Doctor Tedstrom asked for the microphone and pronounced the event the best birthday party I ve ever had . Then as refreshments were served, several quartets mingled with the audience for mini-performances. One lady approached Four For Harmony and announced that although she was from Chicago and had been to the amusement park known as White City, she had never heard the song Chicago Town before. The group offered to let Blackie teach it to her, and she accepted.

In its decade of existence, the Orange Quartet Chapter has seen its members develop overlapping repertoires and multiple skills, with some members learning two or more parts. These abilities were brought to bear at Dr. Tedstrom s birthday celebration, which provided the chapter with an ideal audience. If the doctor wants us back next year, the quartets will be ready.

Many years ago we had trouble getting coverage from the music critic in our Salt Lake City Chapter. (The Beehive Statesmen) Our shows were superb and we were selling out an 1800-seat auditorium Friday and Saturday evenings.

So, we presented the music critic with two seats (Do not put in front row - put in center section and about 10 rows back and on the end so he can make a hasty exit to make his deadline for morning paper).

The real "clincher" was to also present him with two gift certificates (good only on night of show) to a very fine restaurant. We had made reservations in his name for 5:30 as the show started at 7 PM.

It worked! AND the positive reviews started coming in.

One more idea that worked for us. We would always put an ad in the Friday evening paper for the shows. However, because we were selling out, we would put in bold print across the ad (from the lower left hand corner to upper right) the words "Sold Out."

This made next year's sell out faster and easier.

Try it! It works!

Galen chuckled to himself when a voice from the stall to his right said, "Sounds like a bass to me!"

Possessed by a sudden impulse Galen began to sing the chorus to "*My Wild Irish Rose*," a capella, and as an aria. Then, slowly and with such definition, the stall on his right added the tenor part as the man facing the porcelain appliance on the wall feathered in the baritone.

Galen's aria became three parts and the excitement of the sound pushed him, with all its energy, into the second phrase, "...*the sweetest flower that grows*..." Then, like magic, all four voices were there, sotto voce!

The acoustics were incredible, and indeed the bass voice to Galen's left was deep and sonorous, almost Bret Littlefield like in its quality. Oh it was wonderful and spiritual as the voices blended and crooned through the entire song. With all the understanding, and awareness of true barbershoppers, they sang on.

As the last chord of the tag bounced and re-bounced off the tile walls of their little 'harmony hall,' Galen heard the flush and saw the departing feet of the man who had been facing the wall in front of him. Then in a duet of flushing, pressurized waters and clanking latches, the doors of the stalls to his left and right flew open. Galen watched sadly as the black wingtips of the 'world's greatest bass' and scruffy tennis shoes of his 'medalist level tenor' quickly disappeared.

Galen felt helpless and claustrophobic, like the night that *Remember When* broke up. By the time he composed himself and emerged from his stall, all the faceless members of his new foursome had vacated.

His chance for a third District Quartet Championship was 'down the drain!'

15 hours, covering 268 miles. After a 9 a.m. gig in a Safeway grocery store, they were approached by a desperate man who wanted them to sing for his wife in the afternoon or anytime they were available. When they sang for her later that afternoon, she was noticeably impressed. She commented what a great husband she had and wondered out loud how he had ever thought of this. If she only knew. If a lot of recipients only knew.

(Hint: your chapter could get scads of these last-minute gigs if you have a central Valentine reservation phone operator and equip each quartet with Valentine business cards and cell phones. When someone hears your quartet and comments that they wish they'd ordered one, hand them a card. The person can then set up a delivery with your central operator, who can call the cell phone of the quartet on the nearest route.)

Sound Assembly lived up to its name at Franklin Elementary School in Littleton, where two school teachers (friends of Mason) bought their own Singing Valentines because "their husbands were too cheap." They filled the gym with well more than one hundred well-behaved children who got their first taste of barbershop. The quartet performed a special show just for them and the quartet, both the kids and the teachers loved it, were video taped for their yearbook, and multiple hugs were exchanged.

From the banks of the Volga River!

by John Wright, Valleyaires Chapter

Sailing north on the Volga River in the good ship (riverboat) "Nicholas Cherenovsky" we passed from the amazing traffic jams, blinding array of neon and billboard advertising of Moscow to the everlasting flat birch forests of northwest Russia. Commercial river traffic, but no pleasure boats this late in the year, and few settlements on the riverbanks.

Two days and many hundreds of miles of forested riverbanks from Moscow, the good ship docks at the small Volga River city of Petrozavodsk, or Peter's (The Great's) Workshp, a stop between Moscow and St. Petersburg. There the 190 river travelers come ashore into buses, and are driven to Petrozavodsk's pride and joy, a big municipal theatre. Now appearing is a famous folk song and dance group, just back from a tour of Siberia.

The costumes are magnificent, the booted young Russian dancers leap and swing each other around the stage and perform that amazing act squatting with folded arms and legs shooting out from under, a performance that defies gravity. The music is loud and fast, a drummer, two regular balilaikas and a monster balilaika with the same triangular shape, but so big it sits on the ground on a peg, like a familiar bass fiddle.

The dancing and singing proceed in good Russian style with men's and women's choruses, and then out comes a smaller act, four male singers in Russian Cossack costumes and fur hats. While the balilaika players and drummer put down their instruments and wander off the stage the four Cossacks blow a solitary pitchpipe, launch into their first number, and baritone John Wright of the Valleyaires almost falls out of his seat. The first line, IN ENGLISH, of their first song, is "Passed me by one summer day, cast those big brown eyes my way." and off they go through "Hello Marlylou Goodby Heart" This was followed by "Take me home again Kathleen," also in English, both in the standard SPEBSQSA arrangements!

I talked to the quartet afterward (they were out in front, selling their CD!) and none of them speak English, even though the English in the songs showed no trace of accent. I'm not sure they know what the English songs are even about, but gathered from an interpreter that they simply mimic recordings. Their CD, which naturally I bought, is split about even with English barbershop standards (the two above, "Wait till the sun shines Nellie, etc") and Russian songs in non-barbershop style. The CD announces in English and English letters "The Hamms, a barbershop quartet" then the rest is all in Russian, with the Cyrillic letters what look like such a jumble to English eyes.

And they are really a good quartet, evidently widely known in Russia!!!

Job Description – Chapter Marketing and Public Relations Officer

[Editor note: Chapter Marketing and Public Relations is a current hot topic. Here's some data about the position.]

The complete duties of the marketing veep, a position now required in chapters of more than 25 members. *Updated: 10/8/04 11:47 AM*

Creation Authority: Standard Chapter Bylaws Elected:Chapter Election if over 25 members in Chapter – Under 25 members appointed by President Term: 2 Year Commitment at a minimum (renewable)

Definition of Job

Marketing is developing, delivering and packaging a message or product for sale.

Public Relations encompasses a variety of marketing activities that strengthen your credibility, enhance your image, and develop good will. These are usually targeted at an audience. Public Relations involves communicating who you are, what you do, why you do it, and how you make a difference.

Commitment:

The commitment of a Chapter Marketing and Public Relations Officer should realistically be for two years because of the rampup time needed to ensure the strategies and or tasks for the chapter's approach to marketing and public relations programs would be successful only with long-term stability.

The Vice President should be cognizant of the fact that media relations are being developed and cultivated which would diminish with a perception of revolving door staffing on the chapter's part. Succession planning (training your replacement) is essential in carrying out the commitments made from one year to the next and seeing programs to fruition. Desired Background Capability:

- Society Member for at least three years other than the Frank H. Thorne Chapter
- Thorough knowledge of the mission, history and programs of the Society and his chapter
- Excellent communication and relationship building skills
- Willing to be held accountable of his performance to the Chapter Board
- Ability to think outside the box
- Marketing and or public relations experience is a plus

Minimum job responsibilities:

• Chapter Marketing and Public Relations Officers are encouraged to form a committee to assist them in carrying out their responsibilities:

• Create promotional material and work with outside vendors such as graphic designers, printers, photographers to make sure all communications reflect the standards and mission of the chapter and society

- Prepare and distribute all communications/promotional materials:
- News releases
- Chapter/District bulletin stories as needed
- Flyers
- Posters

• Insist the Chapter pay for you to join the Public Relations and Bulletin Editors (PROBE) group

- Build relationships between chapter and media, ocal community, civic organizations, and other Society chapters
- Attend COTS and, when possible, other training seminars

• Develop a public relations/marketing plan to communicate with internal (e.g., chapter members, auxiliary, Society) and external (e.g., the public and media) audiences and promote the chapter and the Society.

- The marketing plan should have:
- Goals
- Techniques
- Deadlines
- Budget
- Methods for evaluating success (Metrics)

What does SingingValentines.com do?

A short registration process adds your Singing valentines business to our listing, and makes it easy for customers to connect with you to purchase an unforgettable gift of song.

SingingValentines.com is a free service of the Barbershop Harmony Society for use by its chapters and quartets, and other barbershop group in North America.

What SingingValentines.com does not do

- Singing Valentines.com does not take orders directly. Instead, it offers free referrals to groups that take orders in their own markets in their own ways.
- SingingValentines.com does not "play favorites" among providers. We simply help customers make the connection to local groups and regional brokers to set up deliveries.
- SingingValentines.com does not currently offer credit-card processing. Society chapters may obtain their own merchant accounts through Elan, a partner with the Barbershop Harmony Society.

Some further ideas on Singing Valentines.

How sweet it is!

It is a very simple process, really. A barbershop quartet arrives at a specified location, sings two songs to an often red-faced, sometimes tearful, recipient, presents a flower, card or candy to the person, perhaps a Polaroid photo is taken, and the quartet exits, heading out to repeat the process at yet another location. Total elapsed time, perhaps 10 minutes.

What is it that women (and many men!) find so endearing about receiving a Singing Valentine? The emotion of the day? The ingenuous lyrics of the songs? A little smugness as if to say, "See what my man did for me? Aren't you just a bit jealous?"

Whatever it is, Singing Valentines can be big business and a big boost for the chapter coffers. The secret to success is planning ... make that early planning. Now is the time to dust off that Singing Valentines Manual (Stock no. 4058/\$10). Valentines Day falls on Wednesday, which means businesses will be open and that's good for SV business.

The manual can help even novice chapters be successful. Be prepared to receive a lot of calls—return them all. Plan and plan some more. Scheduling and routing is critical ... don't have quartets crossing paths. Many chapters have found that assigning quartets to geographical areas smoothes out the deliveries. If you schedule a delivery at a specified time (most chapters charge a premium fee for this service), be on time.

Have a non-quartet driver drop off the quartet while he or she finds a parking place. The driver or a sixth person can serve as photographer. Have a cell phone to take late delivery orders (or to phone in the event of a breakdown). Quartets need to be well rehearsed and auditioned. You have an obligation to your customers to provide the best performances possible. Start now. Pick the music and the quartets. Don't just take four guys who say they want to sing. If your chapter is fortunate to have several volunteers, take the time to match the voices in each group. Pickup quartets can do a great job ... the music team or music director should take an active role in helping the groups succeed.

Publicity

Of course, none of this works if no one knows about it. Publicity and advertising are critical to success. Naturally, the more creative you can be, the more attention that is drawn to your program. Attend service club meetings (Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions, etc.) early in January, and give away a Singing Valentine at the meeting. It is a great way to increase the orders. Radio station giveaways are also great publicity and will usually get you on the air without any difficulty.

If you sing for a politician or other prominent person, arrange media coverage. It will help you the following year. Some chapters have surprised local television personalities on air. Tent cards, flyers or posters placed at the florist shop that supplies the chapter's flowers, are very beneficial.

Finally, register your chapter online with SingingValentines.com, the Society's national referral service. Registration is now open. Note: if you were registered for 2000, you need to re-register for 2001. You can confirm the information from 2000 and it will then be activated.

It's difficult to decide who's having more fun, the recipient or the quartet. Many foursomes will find it difficult to sing if the emotion of the moment catches them off guard. But that, too, is part of the joy.




WALNUT CREEK

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
