Membership Matters

This new and exciting recruiting campaign is now underway. You can read the entire plan on our website, www.spebsqsafwd.org, or in the latest issue of the Harmonizer. The campaign is the largest effort undertaken by the Society to increase membership in years. The plan includes national advertising, and incentives for individuals and chapters, including monetary rewards.

To be eligible to participate in the monetary rewards program new members recruited must be recruited with membership applications processed between August 1 and October 31, 2005. Other incentives are also available. Chapters can earn free arrangements by an arranger of note for achieving new membership growth for a least two consecutive quarters in 2005. The grand prize for the chapter with the greatest net membership gain in 2005 is a weekend retreat with Dr. Greg Lyne.

Your House of Delegates ratified a decision by your board to donate \$2 per member to the Society to help fund this important program. Chapters are welcome to reimburse the district for this donation and while a few chapters have already done so, it is entirely up to the chapter.

All of the activities in the program lead to a national membership guest week during the week of September 12 – 16, 2005. The key to success will be preparation! Each chapter must take responsibility for creating a welcoming environment for our guests. We'll need you to keep records so we can track the numbers of guests, and each chapter will need to have someone on the leadership team focused on Marketing & PR working closely with VP for Membership and Chapter Development.

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
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


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I'm writing this shortly after attending our annual FWD Spring Convention in Burbank. This was another instance where we combined the Society International quartet preliminary contest with the contest for the FWD "District" qualifying competition. Since the location was in SoCal West, the quartets and choruses from that division shared the venue. Segregating the "Division only" quartets and allowing them to sing first seemed to work very well and I would expect this procedure to continue whenever it's necessary to combine contests in the future, such as in Reno next March.

When I got home on Sunday, I checked my e-mail and saw one of those messages that arrive all too frequently these days. Floyd Holmquist, a 42 year member of Stockton, and then Sacramento Chapters, had passed away. He had been able to share his love for our music with his son, Dwight, for 36 of those years. As I sat in the memorial service and listened to his life's accomplishments, I was taken by how involved with his community he was. He had been involved in Little League, been a Boy Scout leader, helped build his church and was Superintendent of its Sunday School, among other things. The more I thought about all Floyd's activities, the more I thought, "How typical of a Barbershopper to show his love for his community as a whole."

I didn't have far to look for other examples close to where I live. Just look at the letter inside the back cover of last month's Westunes, and you'll see where two members of the Fremont-Hayward Chapter stepped up and in 19 days organized and presented a joint a cappella concert that resulted in over \$13,000 being sent to help the victims of the tsunami in Southeast Asia. Thank you, Kevin Smith and Brian Carter. Money is still coming in, so it is not too late for any or all of you to participate in this worthwhile project. Chapters might consider contributing part of their show revenues.

Another, higher profile individual comes to mind as being a kind of "Community Hero." The Friday night before COTS in Sacramento last November, I was watching the local late night news in my hotel room and they were covering a story about the collecting of Christmas gift packages for our troops in Iraq. I saw a man walking through an office carrying an armload of boxes and adding them to a huge pile. I said, "Whoa, I know that guy." It was **Andy Wallace**, baritone and Clown Prince of **Freestyle**. Andy was president of his local Rotary Club and had volunteered his office as a collection point for the gifts.

Above are examples of senior members, followed by middle-agers, and then someone in a bit younger bracket. This dedication to community doesn't stop here but extends even to our high school members. **Jordan Litz**, lead of a brand new quartet, **Playback**, is considered by the Lodi High School swimming coach as his top individual medley swimmer.

I could go on at length and don't mean to pass over anyone, but this gives a glimpse of the way this community involvement pervades our Society no matter the age group. It's just another reason I'm so proud to be a Barbershopper.

Revised Chorus Plateaus Expected At This Fall's HOD Meeting

After three years of work, first by the Chorus Plateau Task Force and then by the Long Range Planning Committee, the FWD Board of Directors received a new proposal to revise the chorus plateaus at their March meeting. The board will vote on the plan at their June meeting, and then forward it to the House of Delegates for final approval this Fall. This article is to inform the district membership of the proposed change and solicit your feedback.

The proposal establishes three plateau levels based on average scores from the two most recent district contest appearances within the past three years:

Plateau AAA: Average score of 71% or higher or returning International Chorus Champion

Plateau AA: Average score of 61% to 70.9%

Plateau A: Average score below 61% or has not competed at district in the past three years

Any chorus can opt to compete in a higher plateau. For example, during their first year of competition Westminster and LaJolla were eligible to compete in Plateau A, but either of them could have opted to compete in AA or AAA. Choruses, however, cannot compete in a lower plateau than their average score dictates, although they may petition the district C&J committee to move down a plateau due to significant changes in the chapter.

The complete document submitted to the board will be posted to the district web site. It fully explains the proposed system along with the pros and cons of this system versus other systems considered. A summary of the main points follow.

Plateaus were established to place choruses on a relatively equal playing field with similar groups and provide them with intermediate contest goals short of winning first place. But plateaus based on chapter size no longer accomplish this goal because chapter size is less relevant today. First, chapter size and chorus size are neither synonymous nor directly proportional. Second, smaller choruses now experience more success in contest than

before. This may or may not be attributable past judging category changes, but the smaller choruses from Westminster, LaJolla, and Rincon Beach have shown that they can compete at the highest levels of district competition. At the Society level, The Northern: Lights and The Alliance choruses have both recently finished in the top five.

In our district, many chapters and choruses have shrunk and therefore tend to clump together in the A and AA plateaus. Consider these numbers from the 2004 district chorus contest with twenty-three competing choruses:

- The four Plateau A choruses number of Men on Stage ranged from 17 to 29, and their contest rankings ranged from 4th to 22nd.
- The twelve AA choruses ranged from 19 to 50 on stage and ranked from 3rd place to 23rd place.
- The seven AAA choruses ranged from 21 to 109 men on stage and ranked from 1st to 17th place.
- Santa Rosa and North Valley both had 29 men on stage but were in two different plateaus based on chapter size.

Over the past couple years, different plateau criteria have been considered including one presented in the November 2003 issue of Westunes and another plan base on chorus rankings. Those other plans have been scrapped in favor of one that can be more simply calculated and explained. This new proposal is similar to plateaus already used in the Sunshine and Illinois districts.

The current plateaus no longer group choruses that are similar. The new plateaus will.

The district really has two options this year. The first is to approve the new plan. The second is to eliminate plateaus altogether and only present awards for first, second, and third place. There are valid arguments for both options, but the new plateaus will provide choruses at least two intermediate goals short of winning first place: winning a plateau and raising their scores to move up to a higher plateau. The plateaus reward contest performance achievement and do not discourage chapters from growing their membership.

I mentioned above that the cost to each boy is \$70 which includes meals, room, everything. Scholarships are available; no boy will be left behind for lack of the money. All anyone has to do is let us know if a boy needs assistance; we will take it from there.

Finally, we still have a number of 2003 Camp videos that are for sale for ten bucks. The video is truly Remarkable! It tells the story of what Camp is all about in a fast paced, entertaining way that anyone watching will be moved to support the idea of Youth Harmony Camps.

The Chapter Counselors discussed the importance of visiting their respective chapters and talking up the Society's Marketing & Membership Plan – "Membership Matters."

Below are some of the ideas that came out of the meeting:

- Biggest success is to visit your chapters on a regular basis
- Encourage "grouping" of chapters and have combined events (i.e. performances, picnics, BBQs etc.)
- Suggest periodic "all Presidents" meetings for purposes of sharing ideas, strategies and other opportunities
- Visit board meetings and chapter meetings/rehearsals
- Visit the Society Website frequently to keep up with major events and news that affect everyone
- Be a good communicator to your Chapters
- Suggest to your chapters to revisit their "mission statements" and identify what kind of chapter they are or would like to be (Quartet Only, Social only, Competitive, Semi-competitive, Community Chorus, Show Chorus etc.)

FWD Scholarship Awarded

Congratulations to **Duane King**!! I am very pleased to announce that he is the recipient of the Far Western District's scholarship to Directors' College in August. Duane is the frontline director of the **Santa Cruz Gold Standard Chorus**, and has been their Musical Director for about 10 months now. I predict that great things are in store for the Santa Cruz Chapter.

The Society and Harmony Foundation has funded 10 other scholarships to Directors' College. This is the 3rd year that they have done so. We had about twice as many applicants this year than we ever had before. I was able to recommend 10 frontline directors who've never received a scholarship before. And only one of these applicants had attended DC before, and that was eleven years ago! The staff at Kenosha will be notifying the recipients soon as to what they need to do next.

Director of the Future

The *Director of the Future class* will be held at *Harmony College West* again this year. This is an introduction to directing. It is designed for those who think they might be interested in directing, but don't know where to start. It also would be valuable for assistant directors and section leaders. This introduction to directing includes basic conducting patterns, posture, directing cutoffs and pickups, tone production, elements of the warm-ups and elements of being a leader. What more can you ask for in an introductory class?? This class will go all day on Saturday, with time on Sunday morning for individual attention as needed or requested.



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LOOKING AHEAD AT CONVENTIONS

Another great convention is over and for those of you who were not there you missed a great week end of music and fellowship. I'm sure you will find all of the details and the results elsewhere in this issue.

My thoughts are dealing with a challenge we have (as a district) if we want to have more of these fun conventions.

I have talked before about how we plan and contract these conventions years in advance. Right now we are working on Spring 2008 and the year 2009. As we all know prices are continually going up and it is getting more dificult to find an acceptable venue for our conventions.

It used to be that we were required to use nothing but auditoriums with all raised seating. We have now had to go to flat floors because of the high price of theaters. Flat floors requires us to build a venue which means staging, drapes, lights, sound, seating, etc. which mean higher costs.

When we use a facility (such as we did at the Burbank Hilton) there are contracts we have to make with the hotel. To get all of the space we need for meetings and contest space we have to agree to a number of sleeping rooms we will fill. If we meet this number we get all of the function space for free. If people (attending the convention) do not stay at the hotel and we do not fill our room block we have have to pay a penalty and that can be very large.

Over the last years the attendance at our Spring and Fall conventions has been on a steady decline. That means that room blocks at hotels are not being filled and we have to pay to use the function space. This also means that we are not going to make the money that is needed to help run our district.

If this trend is to continue and we want to continue the FWD tradition of great conventions we must take measures to help pay for the venues. My recommendation to the board is that a dues increase is necessary.

I don't want all of this to sound like I'm being negative. It is just a fact of the times we are living in. If we don't get more support in attendance at our conventions other solutions must be found.

A COACH IS A PROFESSIONAL GIVER

One of the definitions of the word "coach" is "a private tutor who prepares a student for an examination" and for the word "tutor", "one who gives additional, special or remedial instruction". So there is no expertise or degreed requirement to be a coach other than to care and to want to help. Coaches need to be prepared to give direction, friendship, an audience to sing to, constructive criticism, resources and honest encouragement. Over and above these basics, the more expereience in the performing arts is a bonus.

If the coach is successful in maintaining a giving philosophy, the web of control and ownership can be avoided. The coach can then continue to give the gifts of optimum performance while helping to develop the God-given talents of many more performers.

So, the question is...what kind of coach do you choose to be? A Giver or a Taker?

Dr. Dave Tautkus Vocal Procuction

Keeping your voice healthy through good vocal production

In this class I will introduce exercises and vocal techniques that will help you overcome a variety of common (and some unusual) vocal maladies. As someone who was told that I had to quit singing for six months or potentially lose my voice forever, I have made it a personal goal to help other people avoid being told the very same thing. I plan to help tune your ears in more to potential assets and potential problems of the voice. I plan to use class members (as they are willing) to share their stories and help them work through these issues along with the rest of the group. I don't clain to be able to solve all of the problems that may exist, but if I can help save 1 voice, it is worth it. If there is extra time, I propose to use class time to listen to examples of good singing and how to improve your performance through singing and nonsinging issues.

Dawn Texeira Performance SEEING IS BELIEVING

Do pictures conjur up memories or emotions for you? Let's face it. Most of us on this planet are very visual beings. When we see things with our own eyes, a lasting impression is made and identifiable emotions are stirred within us. This is the very principle behind why we use visual tools to enhance our musical performances in Barbershop. Pretty simple, huh?

But how do we get a hundred guys or even just four guys to paint the same picture as they physically move through a song? Well, there are very concrete tools that anyone can learn which will accomplish this task with ease--and a great deal of enjoyment, too!

Come and learn how to deliver an excitiing visual performance rewarding to both you and your audience!

LET'S SEE, UPSTAGE IS, ER...OR IS IT DOWNSTAGE/

A hands-on class to understand the skills applied backstage at a show and how to ask for what you want. Topics covered include lighting, sound, staging, planning, timing, organization, crew management, and, as they say...much, much more.

Ray Rhymer So You Want To Be In A Quartet

We will take the weekend to discuss many of the factors of being in a quartet, beginning with how to start one and ending with competition issues. We'll use language throughout that we will all understand. Participation is vital to the learning process, so we'll all sing and do as much as posssible. This will be an action class, so come prepared to be active.

We'll go through the "Now What?" that follows starting a quartet. We'll spend time coming to understand and apply how to conduct ourselves duing non-singing time, which is rarely taught. We'll video ourselves in action. Be prepared to recognize and say: "I didn't know I did that." Music selection is always important and not only will we talk about how to do that, but we will do a demonstration or two. Most quartets want to sing for somebody; we'll address how to do so and not to embarrass ourselves. Many quartets want to compete, so we'll discuss and demonstrate contest parameters.

There is no such thing as a "dumb" question, so here's your chance to ask. I may not have the answer, but there'll be enough experts available during this HCW weekend that we'll get the answer.

Jim Turnmire **Director of the Future**

This class is a one-day class designed for aspiring directors, assistant directors, and section leaders. This is a beginning class that introduces basic conducting patterns, vocal techniques, warmup techniques, and what is involved in becoming an effective leader. This class is for individuals who have a feel for music, a desire to create music with their chorus, but don't have the tools to get started. Each participant will have several opportunities to be coached in learning conducting patterns, attacks and releases.

The rest of the classes will also be designed to solve Barbershop problems, develop your skills, increase your knowledge, help your chapter, and make Barbershopping more enjoyable for you and for those who hear it.

SPECIAL NOTICE!!!

There will be a special class provided for Music Educators, vocal teachers in public and private schools. They will be our guests at Harmony College West for a class presented by Jim DeBusman, himself a music educator and on the staff of the Barbershop Harmony Society. It will give them a hands-on view of our style of music, how we learn it, interpret it, accomoadate voices to it and it to voices, and how the schools can incorporate it into their vocal programs, for girls as well as for buys (men and women in college). Please make sure you bring this to the attention of any vocal teacher you know in your area. In the long run it will help your chapter and Barbershopping.

Too Much To Do?

With all the changes taking place with our Society—new name, new logo, new membership marketing campaign—one thing that remains constant is the commitment to our mission: to be leaders in the cause of encouraging vocal music in our schools and communities.

And yet, about half our chapters have no one assigned to this important role, and nothing going on in the area of youth outreach. Is it because the task is too daunting? Sure, there are a lot of choices, of things you and your chapter can do:

- Host a youth festival for high school singers
- Sponsor a high school quartet, or a college quartet
- Do a "Get America Singing Again" program for a middle school
- Hire a school choir on your show
- Provide funds for sheet music for a school choir
- · Volunteer to help at a school choir show
- Arrange for a (quality) quartet visit to a school
- Provide a scholarship for a music educator to Harmony College
- Provide a music educator with music, tapes, CDs
- · Raise funds for a school music event or cause
- Help some high school young men get to Youth Harmony Camp

If the choices seem overwhelming, pick one. There's plenty of assistance available. And whatever your chapter may choose to do, remember it starts with a simple question posed to a music teacher at your local school: How can we help?







Bob Oertel Receives Posthumous Hall of Fame Award

The objective of the Far Western District Hall Of Fame Award is to honor the all-time "greats" of the District, the individuals who have unselfishly, and with dedication and devotion, performed through the years the highest degree of service to the District.

The guidelines of the Hall Of Fame allow "a posthumous award to be made at the discretion of the committee, in addition to and in the same manner as the regular award."

On the evening of March 19, 2005 at the Far Western District Spring Convention, it was announced that BOB OERTEL had been inducted into the Hall Of Fame. Here is a brief history of his barbershopping career.

Bob joined the Oak Park, Illinois, Chapter in April 1946. One of the featured quartets in that chapter was the "Barber Q 4", with our own Emmett Bossing and a bass named Tom Watts. Not only did the chapter get a new member but Tom got a brother-in-law when Bob married Tom's sister, Jean.

The Oertels moved to California in 1950 and Bob transferred to the San Gabriel Chapter. When the word got out that Bob had been a choir director, he was pressed into service and for the next 20 years, directed choruses in Arcadia, Fullerton, Pomona, Newport Harbor and West Covina. He also held membership in the Whittier Chapter and served as President in 1978. He and Jean were so active in the chapter, they were named "Mr. & Mrs. Barbershopper of The Year" in 1981.

Bob was a certified Judge in the Balance & Blend, Voice Expression and Stage Presence Categories, and served the district as Chairman of the Contest & Judging Committee for several years. He was instrumental in raising the level of our judging as well as our competitors. He was given the Judge Emeritus Award by the Society in 1985.

Bob served as a Vice President on the District Board and continued to share his expertise as a coach and arranger. He was also much in demand as an M.C. for shows and contests.

Jean Oertel now lives in Northern California and was unable to attend the presentation, but she designated Floyd Thaller, veteran barbershopper and Past District Secretary to accept the award for her.

Arrangements have been made for the Hall Of Fame plaque, lapel pin and name badge to be presented to Jean at her home in Napa, California.

In closing, here is a short story that was told by the Pastor at Bob's Memorial Service. He said words to the effect that Bob accomplished something that he had been trying to do for a long time, which was to "fill every pew in the church". We miss Bob and his unique humor that filled the air wherever he went.

Ray Rhymer Inducted Into FWD Hall of Fame

On Saturday, March 19, 2005, Ray Rhymer was sent into a state of "shock" when it was announced that he was the honoree to be inducted into the Hall Of Fame that night. The site was the Burbank Airport Hilton Hotel and the evening was capped off with the Show of Champions, following the Quartet Finals of the Spring Prelims. The presentation was made during the Show of Champions.

To reach the heights of becoming a member of the HOF, you must be voted in by the current members, which is no easy task. Each of the past Hall of Famers that are present at the event reads a segment of a prepared biography of the new guy coming in. Soon the honoree figures it out that he has been chosen to be a member of the HOF and he immediately goes into an emotional shock. What follows is the wording that was shared by the Hall Of Fame members when Ray was inducted.

Our Hall Of Fame winner joined the Society in the Illinois District in 1949, while still a student in high school. Following graduation, his development in barbershopping was temporarily interrupted by the Korean War when he volunteered to serve in the United States Marine Corps. Unable to get those ringing barbershop seventh chords out of his head, our honoree used his limited spare time harmonizing whenever he had the chance and could find three "good men".

Following his discharge from service, he returned to continue his education, receiving a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Tennessee and a Master of Science Degree from the University of Southern California.

He is a recipient of Aerojet's prestigious R. B. Young Technical Innovation Award. Now retired, he spent 34 years as an aerospace engineer and manager and his last assignment was program manager for N.A.S.A.

Our honoree is an active quartet man, as a tenor, lead or baritone with: Summer Sounds, Four Points West, Sixty Something, Foothill Songsters, Older Than Dirt and Preservation.

He is a charter member of the Far Western District Chorus Directors' Guild and has directed choruses in Simi Valley, Oxnard, Conejo Valley, Sacramento and Placerville.

In 1972 he became a Judge Candidate in the Harmony Accuracy Category; then a Certified Sound Category Judge from 1975 to 1993, judging the International Contests in Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Kansas City and San Francisco. In 1998 he was recertified as a Singing Category Judge.

He is "on call" constantly as a coach for quartets and choruses locally, district-wide, at our own Harmony Colleges West, at Harmony Incorporated Music Seminars and on coaching faculties at Harmony College in St. Joseph, Missouri.

On the chapter level, over and above his service as chorus director, our honoree has served on most chapter committees and held almost all offices including president.

On the district level, he has served as Area Counselor, Assistant Contest & Judging Chairman, Assistant Director of Music Education, Vice-President for Music & Performance and later, for Youth Activities and Editor of WESTUNES since 2002.

Our Hall Of Famer has received the Conejo Valley Barbershopper of the Year in 1979, became a Whittier Chapter Honorary Life Member in 1979 and Placerville Chapter's Barbershopper of the Years 1997 and 2000.

We have all been the beneficiaries of this man's talent and generosity for over 40 years. His personal motto is: "ENCOUR-AGE...ENJOY...ENTHUSE... EXCITE!"

His successes over these many years, aided by his attention to detail, and devotion to the basic principles of harmony have made him the obvious selection for the Far Western District Hall Of Fame.

Convention Dedicated To Doug Maddox

The Far Western District Board of Directors and the district membership take great pride in dedicating this 2005 Spring District Convention to Doug Maddox -- the Cecil B. DeMille of the Far WEstern District, the Masters of Harmony and the Santa Fe Springs Chapter.

All of us who attend FWD Conventions recognize Doug as the stagehand par excellence, hilariously manning the broom when the occasion warrants, and standing lanky and tall on both sides of the curtain for every aspect of show production. For the competitors, he's the last one they see before making their entrance, and the last one to wish them good luck.

A native Californian, Doug was born in Redlands. He was attracted to music at an early age and, as a result, learned to play the French Horn and the cornet. We were unable to discover how his wife, Jan, and he met nor when and where they were married. Maybe they'll share that with us later! Backstage...with a Little Theatre Group perhaps?

Doug became a member of the SPEBSQSA n 1973 when he joined the Pasadena chapter, serving several years as music director. In 1977, he moved to Atlanta, Georgia, and was music director of the Atlanta Peachtree Chorus for 2 years; then another move to Detroit in 1981, serving as the assistant music director. He transferred to Dallas, Texas, in 1984 and joined The Vocal Majority. Finally, in 1988, Doug returned to California and immediately transferred his membership and tenor vice to The Masters of Harmony. Holding a BSc from Cal Ply, Pomona, Doug has been a longtime staff engineer and project manager with Unisys Corporation.

He has served on the Far Western District as well as Society Events Committees, taught classes in stagecraft, and demonstrated creative marketing and technical theater skills both in our district as well as Harmony College in St. Joseph, Missouri. He has been the Production Manager of the Masters of Harmony since 1988 and the Production Director for all FWD contests for over ten years. Preparing for shows and contests are high-pressure, time-critical activities and Doug gets it all done with humor and style. He began working with Greg Clancy at the Society level in 1999 when the International Convention was held in Anaheim and hosted by the Masters of Harmony. As a part of the Society Events Committee, he was one of the chief contributors to the study that produced a standardized district convention technical manual that includes extensive recommendations for sound and lighting standards. This has now become the official Society Handbook for all sixteen districts in the Society.

Numerous awards have been presented to Doug Maddox including five President's Awards, Mr. Broadway Award [1977], Director's Award [1992 & 2001], and the Barbershopper Of The Year [1990]. He also has all five Gold Medals won by the Masters of Harmony...plus one with the Vocal Majority.

Without the continued efforts and total involvement of members like Doug Maddox on all Society levels, there would be no Far Western District, nor even a Barbershop Harmony Society. So, step up to Doug sometime this weekend, shake his hand and say: "thanks." He's more than a Class Act...because he'll all class and no act!

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
