FWD Convention in San Jose

The Fall FWD Convention in San Jose is now "in the books". I congratulate Chairman Chuck Hunter on an outstanding convention. Please extend my gratitude to the entire Voices in Harmony team and the NCW barbershoppers that stepped in to help with the contest flow while Bay Area Chapter folks competed. I think the Friday classes, especially the "One hour convention and contest", were terrific. Thank you Keith Eckhardts for all your hard work – it is starting to pay off! Doug Maddox and Bill Stephens put on another masterful contest production. Thank you!!

The biggest problem we had (again) was the break time between the Chorus contest and the Quartet Finals. This has been a problem the last couple of years because there is not enough time to run the chorus contest; clear the hall; have chorus evaluations; give the judges a dinner break and then start the Quartet Finals on time. To avoid this in the future, we will move our Saturday chorus contest start time to 10:00 AM.

Show of Champions

We tried a new concept for the Show of Champions that has some exciting potential. We hope to continue it next year and make it even better. The concept is to have a "focused" Show of Champions and sell separate tickets to it to support local school music programs - through the local school music programs. We sold \$5 student tickets on line with \$4 returned to the school for their music program. \$10 adult tickets returned \$5 to the school program. This accomplished several things:

- Support to the schools for singing
- Exposing young singers to the best we have to offer in chorus and quartet performances
- Filling the unused seats in the hall for the Show of Champions. We didn't start this early enough in San Jose to sell out the house, but we should set aside a block of seats in Phoenix (back of the house) for this purpose and do the advance work with the schools to make it happen. The money not going to the schools covers our expenses for the ticketing, etc.

RCPM changes

John Jones has agreed to take over the NCWH division. Thank you John and thanks to Dick Whitten for doing long distance double duty the last couple of years. For now, Ivan Jensen is handling the RCMP job in the AZ division (also double duty).

It is the one weekend when quartets can immerse themselves in concentrated performance-enhancing coaching from truly gifted coaches. Where 100% of the evaluations of this year's quartet POD coaching said they were "Satisfied" - 13%, or "Very Satisfied" - 87% with the overall value of their coaching experience at Harmony College West! It is where 98% of those who took classes such as Sight Reading, Vocal Production, Arranging and seven others reported on their evaluations that they were "Satisfied" or "Very Satisfied" with their experience at HCW!

Let me assure all you quartet men - the POD format will be used in Harmony College West 2007!

Don't forget the other reasons the FWD is so good. You can utilize the skills-based quartet workshops, the chorus coaching program and for your annual or cabaret shows you can schedule a Standing Ovation Program review. More on these next time.

THE JOYOUS SAGA OF "A REALLY GREAT CHORUS"

As its second song in the Far Western District chorus contest in San Jose, the Peninsulaires (Palo Alto-Mountain View Chapter) sang "A Really Great Chorus," an original parody saluting the Westminster Chorus (Westminster Chapter). This article describes our great fun preparing for and presenting this comedy performance. A TOUGH SELL?

How do you convince a chorus of average barbershoppers to work hard for sixteen weeks on nine pages of new music that will only be performed once at a contest and then be thrown away? What do you say to convince them that they could be successful, creating a memorable performance while making complete fools of themselves? This challenge faced Peninsulaires Director Steve Sammonds and Music VP Paul Eastman last June. But the story actually started five months earlier.

THE GENESIS OF FOOLISHNESS

During the week of the Mid-Winter Convention in January, the Westminster Chorus, hosted by the Bay Area Chapter, performed at Dublin High School. After the show as we left the auditorium, comments were heard like "Boy, I wish there had been a chorus like that nearby when I was nineteen!" Thus was born the idea of doing a song about Westminster envy.

An Embryo Gag Idea: Shortly thereafter, when the Peninsulaires were rehearsing a low chorus move by bending their knees, a few mock groans in the struggle to get back up prompted Steve to note to Paul: "There's a visual gag in that, maybe even a whole parody package." Their post-rehearsal rehash inspired some other gag ideas and some lyrics that would fit with melody lines of songs well known to barbershoppers.



Fertilization by Steinkamp: After sharing a few more ideas during the next few months they decided to "get serious with doing a parody of the Westminster Chorus." So Paul contacted an outside advisor, Lloyd Steinkamp. The song would not have happened without his encouragement and expertise with creating comedy packages, such as timing, set-ups to punch lines, reinforcing punch lines with sight gags, and building the presentation to a climax.

Multiple Arrangements Sprang Forth: All through the spring, Paul delayed finishing the arrangement because he was waiting to see Westminster's fate at the International chorus contest in July. In the meantime, there were many revisions, with feedback from Steve, Lloyd, and Paul's number-one best advisor on such things, his wife Sue. He later told the chorus that he had 18 arrangements in his head and he couldn't remember which version was currently on paper.

WOULD THE CHORUS BUY IT?

At a Saturday workout session in mid-June, when the medley was nearly finished in Paul's head, they decided to spring the idea on the chorus.

Risky Business: The chorus was asked to take some big risks:

- Should much of the next three-and-a-half months be spent working on a song that would be changed right up to what might be its only performance?
- Should funds be spent on new black tux shirts, red ties, and all those wigs and props?
- Should the Peninsulaires go beyond their usual performances to become clowns or even silly fools?
- Should they risk a low placement or even disqualification just to get hoped-for laughs?

The Fools Were Eager for Foolishness: Nevertheless, the chorus embraced the idea enthusiastically with only the first two pages of what would become a nine-page song. The goal was to entertain the District audience without worrying about scores or placement and to be the chorus that everyone talked about afterwards. To this day, Steve's wife Terri cannot believe that he would propose such a goal! Throughout the development we would ensure that none of gags might be taken as mean-spirited or offensive; the song was to be a tribute, not a roast.



Finding a Goofiness Coach: The plan was to convince Lloyd Steinkamp to join us for an all-day session in August. But shortly after International came the sad news that Lloyd had been diagnosed with lung cancer. That just strengthened our resolve to make this performance one for the ages.

So Bob Hartley, the lead of the infamous Metropolis quartet, was asked to coach the August session. He gave us many ideas and effective coaching for both our ballad ("Pennies from Heaven") and the parody. But, best of all, Bob gave us three simple words, "Over the Top." It became our mantra, repeated several times every week and behind the contest.

GAG AND MOVE IDEAS FROM EVERYONE

The chorus members contributed many ideas to the package. After that day with Bob, we took off at full speed, proposing many ideas and moves, both big and small. Paul had developed most of the big moves and gags while putting the music together. The whole juggling bit, the Sean Devine rhyme with the facemasks, and the Mark Torrance curtsy as a tribute to Cory Hunt's move with Qyduhmix were Steve's gems.

A Mustache Goatee: Andrew Inenaga, one of our newest basses, discovered on the Men So Forte web site that their baritone is Japanese and has a small goatee. Andrew proposed he wear a false mustache; just before the parody quartet's song, he would

rip it off and paste it back on as a goatee. He worried was whether the audience would get the joke. Paul, from his chair in the auditorium. observed the w h o l Westminster block saw and loved the gag!



The Pin Servant: By the day of the contest, Tom Day, one of our long-time basses, had transformed a simple walk-on into a complete court jester routine, with a platter of pins, a kneeling bow, and an exiting flip of his wig when the "king" wasn't looking.



The Jack Handle: During the chorus-tilt move, a long jack handle was needed for the "help getting back" gag. Paul had envisioned a slim pole about six feet long. However, Bert Laurence, our prop guy, walked in the door with a twelve-foot piece of three-inch PVC pipe, striped in bright red, definitely "Over the Top." It allowed Dave Velleman to really "ham up" the routine. Anxious Moments: Could we really pull this off? Would the phrases smooth out? Could we navigate the nine key changes? Would the guys really let it go? However, it was getting better every week; the enthusiasm and energy levels were extremely high; new ideas were still forthcoming. With only 10 days to go, we added the glare at the judges on "should have been GOLD?", the Cherry Coke bottle, the rubber chicken, and about a dozen other things.

IT ALL CAME TOGETHER AT THE END

The Dress Rehearsal: Tuesday night before the contest, an open dress rehearsal provided our first non-stop performance with full costumes and props. We could work on the real onstage costume change. At last we realized we were going to pull this thing off.



The Energy Kept Building: As we always do for our annual shows, the gang pulled it all together on the day of the contest. The music was still a bit ragged, and the adrenalin surge removed any semblance of vocal support. But it didn't matter---we went "Over the Top."

AND THE AUDIENCE RESPONDED

Oh boy, did they respond! There were hopes that the audience would get the jokes and laugh, but the huge ovations were beyond imagination. A standing ovation in the middle of the song! We had over achieved our goals! Our euphoria was boundless!

Post-Performance Moments: The audience didn't witness the last highlight of the performance. As we arrived back in the assembly room for photos, guess who was standing on the other set of risers? "Those Westminster guys" swarmed over to see who was wearing those crazy wigs and was dressed like them.

They showed our guys how to pose with a Westminster attitude for the photo and the correct way to form the "W" sign with our fingers. One of them quipped, "Just think, guys, in about 40 years that could be us!" The first gray hairs probably sprouted on those young heads right then.

The auditorium seats of several Peninsulaires were in or near the Westminster section. When it was flooded by returning young men, what were the comments they received? The talk was all about our performance, not theirs. What a kick!

One Disappointment: The men of Westminster were warming up during our performance and didn't see all the fun. There was

Chuck Thompson---Bob Hartley got us all psyched on being funny and "Over the Top!"

Dave Kocharhook---Like the Gilbert & Sullivan shows I did 30 years ago, this song had life, action, sparkle, and audience reaction throughout. thrill of "wowing" the audience is why I came back to singing.

Jack Metz---This was an awesome experience. I have never seen a standing ovation like that.

Terry Moore---One judge said he was sorry he had to write down scores; he just wanted to sit back and watch us.

Bob Hartley---Now that the guys have tasted this kind of fun, I hope they will want to do more "Over the Top!"







Did You Know?

Ed. note: Two recent "Input for Chapter Presidents" posts for consideration.

From: Steve Shannon sshannon1@houston.rr.com Interesting thread, gents.

During my 50 years as an up-front director and chapter builder, I've seen an increasing number of once successful groups come apart at the seams because their Music Leadership and the Administrative Leadership were not on the same page. Even when both teams believed they were acting in the best interests of their chapter, the lack of unified teamwork lead to fingerpointing and the eventual demise of the organization.

It just doesn't have to be that way. Successful chapters do not operate on an "annual plan"; changing directions with each new board or director. They operate on a renewable success plan, with clear goals and clearly defined responsibilities for every member of the chapter.

I have been teaching an extremely effective "Chapter Development Workshop" for several decades. The foundation for this class is a comprehensive Questionaire; parts of which are to be completed by every member and leader. If you want a copy, drop me a note. As always, you are free to use my material, in part or in whole, and may ask for phone and e-mail help as needed. If you want a weekend workshop, we'll work out details.

This has been a fun thread and it's time to talk about it in real-time with less theory. With your permission, I'd like to do that from both perspectives...those of the administrators and those of the directors.

Here are some truisms from the administrative side:

- 1. A chapter that has not developed a mission statement and/or goals shared by all it's members is destined for some degree of conflict.
- 2. The single most important asset a chapter has is it's director. Unless your mission statement stresses that you are a social club, someone has to be responsible for the music and you hired this guy/gal to do the job.
- 3. The single most important event in the administrator's calendar is the day you interview the director for initial employment. This is the time to find out what this person stands for and what he will deliver. Be tough!
- 4. After that event has passed, the next single most important day is the annual assessment that the chapter does of the director. The essence of barbershop is singing, not uniform procurement or guest nights or annual budgets. Each has it's place but they are there to support the singing. The chapter must annually review

the director's performance. Failure to do so can eventually lead to conflict if checks and balances are not in place.

- 5. The leadership team must understand that the director is a creative person. He/she does what he does as an outlet for his/her creativity. Allow him/her to dream and to lead the chapter to places they might not envision. Betcha Jim Clancy and Mark Hale and Jay Giallombardo and Jim Henry are allowed to set goals and pick music for their chapters without a lot of administrative involvement. And I'll betcha they each involve the administrators because they understand the need for a flourishing organization.
- 6. If you are an administrator who always second-guesses the director, why don't you become one! Understand your role...be supportive. Insist on accountability that is measured on an annual basis and let your director lead. Make clear decisions on all the chapter business. My experience is that directors prefer to work under stable conditions and don't want input on the day to day stuff. But, because we are "driven" people, we will jump into the vacuum if important decisions are left hanging.

Now, because this is the Director's List, here are some truisms from our side:

- 1. Know who you are as a director. What do you stand for? What programs would you introduce? Where do you stand on taping, etc? Be prepared to articulate that at an interview. Be brutally frank during the interview. Let them know up front what to expect in the next year. If you are not a good fit for a particular chapter, you don't want to go there. And there will be another chapter who will want you for who you are and what you represent.
- 2. Insist on an annual review. Just as the chapter should review you annually to see if you are meeting their goals, you should be reviewing the chapter to let them know how well they are supporting you. Lay it all out on the table once a year so the air stays clear. 3. The single most important asset a chapter has is YOU! Live up to that responsibility!! And, if you think that this is a boisterous statement, talk to me about chapters who lost a talented director and went into long periods of doldrums or about chapters that found a talented director and began to immerge for the first time.

From my personal experience, I am now directing my fifth chorus since I started over 30 years ago. During that time, each chapter had it's curmudgeons who fought against everything the chapter wanted to do. I'd like to think that is pretty standard for almost all our chapters. The good news is that is usually only a handful at best, more often one or two. The important news is the chapter can't allow a couple of guys to destroy what it is trying to create. Take their views into account, test them for validity, and go from there.

As Steve Shannon so eloquently states "Even when both teams believed they were acting in the best interests of their chapter, the lack of unified teamwork lead to finger-pointing and the eventual demise of the organization." If done correctly, the teamwork will start at the interview.
