The following letter from Joe Hunter, Presentation Category Specialist, is to clarify any misconceptions regarding the "talking rule". Please read carefully, as the rules will be followed more closely starting this Fall.

In our ongoing initiative to add reality and relevance to our contest performances, three years ago we came to the realization that a "two-song $\hat{}$ no-talk" performance had a plastic and unrealistic feel about it. We were seeing forced or badly done mime to help set up songs and performance packages. The rule as it existed didn't even allow for such things as "All Aboard" or "a.. One, Two, Three" Σ etc. To address this situation the "talking rule" was approved three years ago and our performers have been, as they always do, testing the boundaries of the rule. The rule reads currently:

ARTICLE XII: NON-SINGING COMMENT/DIALOGUE

Non-singing dialogue is generally not a part of a contest performance. However, brief comments made with supporting visual communications may be permitted more clearly to establish mood/theme, to assist the transition of packaged songs, or to add to the effect of closure of mood/theme. Spoken words deemed to be excessive or detrimental to the performance shall be penalized by the Presentation judge(s) up to and including forfeiture.

Obviously the word "brief" is one of the major components of the rule that we judge. "Brief" is not judged necessarily by quantity of words or duration of time, i.e., Σ anything over X number of words or Y number of seconds is a penalty. However, our judgment needs to consider the purpose and intent of the rule and as judges we are chartered with the responsibility of creating a "sense of boundary" by the way we adjudicate performances. In creating a more "real" environment in which to present our barbershop songs, the category determined that limiting the interpretation of the rule to "All Aboard" or "One, Two, Three" was not in the best interest of the competitors and was too narrow an interpretation regarding a competitor's ability to create talking, dialogue, or voice-overs that would enhance the performance, generate mood, provide for smooth transitions, etc. However, it was also determined that some of our competitors had strayed too far from the basic tenet that our contests are still, and always will be, primarily presentations of music.

At the recent category school there was much discussion of how we are to adjudicate the "talking rule" and how we are to interpret "brief". The intent of this rule is to address dialogue or spoken words before, in between or after the 2 song performance. In making this determination we chose to expand the definition of "brief" to state that any talking, dialogue, or voice-overs Σ or visual "takes" for that matter, needed to be "on-point, concise, and effective."

Additionally, we determined that it would be appropriate to penalize and list as penalties on our sheets any violations of this rule. The penalty is, as all penalties seem to be, "up to and including forfeiture" and shall be determined by the judge when weighing the severity of the infraction. This penalty is to be applied "on top of / in addition to" of any score lowering of the performance that resulted from the rule violation / act creating interference or causing a "detriment" to the overall impact of the performance.

Our contests are primarily music oriented and any talking, voice-overs, transition material, etc., should be considered as "spice" added to the musical performance and should enhance the overall impact / entertainment value of that musical performance, not be an end unto themselves.

IMPORTANT NOTE TO OUR COMPETITORS:

THIS IS A CHANGE from how we have operated - our consciousness has been raised, and we will apply the rule more stringently starting this fall. As a rule of thumb, if you have more than a few words or more than 2 lines of dialogue, you will have to be very sure that the level of effectiveness and pertinence and value to the overall performance is very high. If you can imagine the same effect being had with less words or dialogue, this implies that shorter would be more effective and therefore more prudent.

We communicate this to all of you prior to the fall season, so as not to shock or "ambush" competitors who have already prepared packages and performed them at International or other levels of competitions. As stated above -

THE RULE DID NOT CHANGE, BUT WE WILL ADMINISTER IT MORE STRINGENTLY.

If you have questions about gray areas, please feel free to contact a Presentation judge - our answer will be that we would have to adjudicate in real time to give an accurate answer, but as laid out above, we think this is a clear set of guidelines to work within.

We are always looking to allow and encourage our performances to be more real, more natural and more effective, But we also need to maintain the sense of this as a musical competition, within the barbershop style.



Finally, a reminder that all of the District Officers and Committee Chairmen listed in the front of this publication were either elected or appointed for the express purpose of helping you to have the best singing experience possible. The Chapter Support and Leadership Team of the Far Western District has two major responsibilities: planning, organizing and delivering Chapter Operations Training Seminars (COTS) for new and returning chapter officers within FWD, and recruiting, training and assigning Chapter Counselors to work with our 83 Chapters throughout the District. Both of these functions are undergoing significant change through the coming year.

Past District President Chuck Hunter has accepted the responsibility of COTS Coordinator for the District, continuing a long history of service to barbershoppers in our great district. Four one-day COTS programs will be presented this year, and they are presently being planned by Chuck. There will be one COTS in Northern California, one in Southern California, one in the Las Vegas area, and one in the Phoenix area. Our target is to have COTS no more than a three hour drive for most FWD barbershoppers. More information will be forthcoming in the near future.

The Chapter Counselor program will also be undergoing significant change this year. A year-long study is being planned that will gather information from Counselors, Chapter Presidents, past Chapter Presidents, District Officers and Committee Chairs, and others who have information to share. We will be looking at effectiveness of the role itself, structure of the role, responsibilities of the role, and how the role relates to the chapters. Our target is to have the role and function of Chapter Counselors redeveloped in time for new training of Counselors to be offered during Harmony College West, 2008.

If anyone has suggestions, comments, or questions to offer as this process gets underway, please do not hesitate to contact me.

The Show of Champions will be spectacular and you will see the winner of the first Lloyd Steinkamp Standing Ovation Award (described elsewhere in Westunes).

We are now accepting proposals for the Mar 18-21, 2010 and Mar 17-20, 2011 Spring Conventions as well as the Oct 13-16, 2011 Fall District Convention. Talk to your Division Event Planner (see below) for details. They can provide ongoing advice about running your event and help you locate a venu.

The planning for our 2008 Spring Convention has been fraught with setbacks. The La Jolla Chapter was not able to continue as hosts, mainly because they couldn't find an affordable venue. This will now be a District run event. We would very much like to keep the Spring Convention in SCE so that the division contest dates will be the same as previously advertised. We are actively seeking a venue, but school districts will not commit facilities until late August for the upcoming school year. We have not found an adequate contest venue for our dates in SCE that is not a school facility. Our fallback position is to hold the Spring Convention in SCW - most likely in Bakersfield. If all else fails, The FWD Board of Directors has give the Events team permission to hold a Spring Convention with the International Preliminary Quartet Contest only. If it is not necessary to accommodate the staging requirements for choruses, the convention and contest could be held in a hotel ballroom anywhere in the district.

What's in a name?

The Board of Directors has approved changing the name of the Regional Convention Planning Manager (RCPM) to Division Events Planner (DEP). The HOD will be voting at the Fall Convention on the language change to allow this.

For a brief period several years back, there were no Division VPs. Operational VPs (Membership, C&J, Events, etc.) were the official FWD Board of Directors. The Events VP appointed three RCMP's – one each for Arizona, Southern California and Northern California to help him manage events. When the FWD reverted to their original Division VP management structure, an RCMP was appointed in each division by the Events Committee Chairman to assist the Division VP. This name change better defines the role.

Paul Sandorf has agreed to be the DEP for SCE. He steps in during a very tough period. I have known Paul for many years and I know that he will do a wonderful job supporting Gene Clements and the SCE community.



A RECORD HARMONY COLLEGE WEST

Although the exact number of students, quartets and staff is not known at the time of publication, it is known that the total number of different classes will exceed every preceding HCW! Again, this year, HCW was held on the campus of California State University East Bay in Hayward

Once again, quartets had the privilege of being coached by the top coaches in the top District in our Society, including eight Gold Medal winners! They were coached in PODs, where four coaches work only with four quartets. There were five PODs with four quartets and four coaches in each. Each coach focused on one of four coaching categories: Music, Presentation, Singing and Performance. This method of coaching is used at Harmony University and was the third year in a row it has been used in the FWD. Quartet responses to this process have been extremely enthusiastic.

Every quartet coached sang on the Saturday night show, right in the campus Theater. And our 2006 FWD Champions, Late Show shared the second half with the 2003 International Champions, Power Play!

We've said it before, and it's true! Harmony College West is **EVOLVING**. Students selected from a greater number of different classes than ever before.

He will work with your chorus on whatever you want - except he won't help you learn the notes and the words!!. You have to do that before he gets there! You tell him what you want help in and that's what he'll do. The District will reimburse 50% of what it costs to get his help (up to \$150 per coaching session and \$300 per chapter per year, as long as funds last). Mr. Barberpole Cat- Floyd Connett

During the Society's first two decades our members had no common repertoire-different choruses and quartets sang different songs, or the same songs in different arrangements. Many men could sing common arrangements of "Coney Island Baby" or "Shine on Me" or "After Dark," but that was about it. Connett's first collection of songs intended for every barbershopper, Just Plain Barbershop, provided a common repertoire for the first time, in the late 1950s. But more was to come. In 1971, Connett, with two other Society leaders, the legendary Mac Huff and thenpresident Ralph Ribble, formulated the first Barberpole Cat program, originally six songs. Currently there are 12 songs in the Barberpole Cat collection. Five of them are Floyd Connett arrangements, all in the key of B-flat: "My Wild Irish Rose," "Down Our Way," "Honey/Little 'Lize Medley," "Sweet, Sweet Roses Of Morn," and "Shine On Me." The legacy of one of our Society's greatest figures, Floyd Connett, lives on every time barbershoppers harmonize these songs and feel the close fellowship they bring.

2006 FWD Quartet Champions Late Show

In this issue, we would like to feature Mike Stewart, our bass. I thought it would be fun to just call him up and ask him some questions to share some insight into the bottom of the bass clef. Mike is a two-time FWD Quartet Champ, also winning in 2003 with Q. He is the rock. Solid. Good looking. And nice ... he's really, REALLY nice!!

Gabe: How long have you been a barbershopper? Mike: I joined in the fall of 1990; so for about 17 years now!

G: So, who got you involved in the Society? Who are your main barbershop influences?

M: When I was a freshman in college (University of Nevada-Reno), our music department sponsored a choral festival on campus. One of the guest performing groups was the Reno Silver Dollar Chorus and I thought they were incredible! Also appearing was some quartet called Special Feature (1990 FWD Champs) and they were really cool! THAT was the first quartet I had ever heard! Anyway, two other buddies and I joined the Reno Chapter the following week. I was influenced a great deal by all of the Special Feature guys (Raymond, Jamie, Paul, and Billy). They let me sing with them all the time after chorus rehearsals and they sure taught me the ropes! I also have received a lot of encouragement and support from Bill Weiser, the director of the Reno chorus, and many other guys from the chapter over the years. More recently, I would have to say that Mark Hale has taught me how to be a better singer and understand the importance of a solid, consistent, and resonant bass sound.

G: What is your favorite quartet?

M: I love everybody! [Interviewer note: Mike is such a nice guy!] I don't know, I've had a lot of them over the years. The

Gas House Gang would be one of my all-time favorites. And OC Times, of course. I'm very proud of my former quartet mate and buddy, Cory! It seems like I've learned so much from various recordings. Raymond loaned me a couple early on – The Boston Common and The Bluegrass Student Union. I guess you can't do much better than that!

G: What was your first quartet? Did you compete? And, if so, how did you do?

M: The Four Knights (named after my High School mascot, the Lancers). We competed in the first FWD high school quartet contest – and were dead last! I remember meeting Uncle Lloyd there for the first time. He allowed us to compete, even though a few of us were in college and not in high school. He was so supportive and made a lasting impression on me. My first registered quartet, The Wild Cards, placed third in Division and last in the 1993 District Contest. But we did a lot of local gigs over a six year period and had a repertoire of at least 40 songs. We had a lot of fun!

G: So, Mike . . . you've got one of the biggest ranges of anyone I have ever met . . . how did that happen?

M: I don't know ... I didn't really sing until I was 18 years old and I started taking voice lessons shortly thereafter. I think it really helped me because I didn't develop poor bad vocal habits and I learned good singing technique from the beginning.

G: What are some of your greatest barbershop moments?

M: I'd have to say that winning District with Q – mostly because it was so completely unexpected! Singing on the International stage is right up there, especially my first time in Montreal in 2003. And I'd have to say that singing with Qyduhmix (Bill Weiser, Paul Olguin, and Cory Hunt) for so many years – because we had so much fun doing comedy stuff in competition. Of course, I'm experiencing my greatest barbershop moments right now singing with Late Show.

G: What do you do in real life?

M: I am a Legislative/Policy Analyst for the Nevada State Legislature . . . [interviewer note: at this point I nodded off for a while...] . . . and I've been doing that for the past 11 years!

G: What about your hobbies?

M: In my free time (of which I have none!) I love to go camping, fishing, skiing, and playing outdoors. I also love to play tennis (even though I haven't played for a while), as well as Piña Coladas, long walks on the beach, romantic sunsets . . .

G: Where did you go to college?

The 2007 Quartet Workshop

On July 21, the Orange Empire Chorus in Fullerton hosted a Quartet Workshop at Cal State Fullerton. The location provided easy access for the 7 attending quartets from throughout SoCal East and West. This is a VERY full day for the quartets with concentrated coaching on specific skills with 2 review sessions built in. The goal of the workshop is to assist experienced quartets in reaching higher singing and performance levels in competition. Quartets are encouraged to bring recording equipment to the sessions so they can refer back to the coaching tips and techniques over time.

This year the coaching skills included breathing techniques, benefits of duetting, rhythm (it's more than tempo), visually "selling" the song, vowel matching & tuning, lyrical interpretation and synchronization methods.

An outstanding array of coaches ensured the success of the 2007 workshop: Craig Ewing, Martin Fredstrom, Tom Moore (all of Hi-Fidelity), Kelly Shepard (Metropolis), Rob Menaker (Nightlife), Sean Devine (OC Times) and Phil Ordaz (Brea Chapter Director). Added to this year's agenda was a question and answer session with the 7 coaches, where the quartets could ask about such things as warm-up routines prior to performances and competition, the use of quartet coaches, selecting an identity or theme for the quartet, etc. The closing session allowed for each quartet to perform one song for the entire group plus the group of coaches also performed.

Judging from the comments and written evaluations from the quartets near the end of the day, each quartet got what they wanted out of the workshop. Here are a few sample quotes from the evaluations:

"Liked it better than Harmony College".

"Super Day!!".

"I learned so much today. I wish it could happen more often".

"Interesting course, we learned a lot and will make improvements". "I benefited from each coach's input".

"Excellent - easy to absorb and understand".

"Holy Cow! Such a big help to our quartet".

Having experienced the workshop first-hand, I encourage other Chapters to consider hosting the 2008 Quartet Workshop. It is a valuable learning experience and certainly enhances the quality and entertainment value of barbershopping.

So many individuals contributed to this year's event and I particularly want to recognize our fabulous coaches plus Jerry Fairchild, Deane Scoville, Craig Ewing and the many volunteers from the Orange Empire Chorus who made things happen behind the scenes. Their participation, guidance and donation of time made this year's workshop a big success.

The Southern Arizona Youth in Harmony Festival will be held in Tucson on Sept. 8. This will be an all-day festival workshop for male and female vocal music students from area high schools, community colleges and universities. As a joint endeavor of the Tucson Sunshine and SAI Tucson Desert Harmony Chapters, chaired by Ron and Annie Hayes and Connie Keil, we are prepared to host between 200 and 250 students along with their teachers. Connie will be joined by Charla Esser, acting as clinicians, assisted by the Sonoran Sound, Eastsiders and Havin' a Blast quartets in teaching two songs each to the individual male/female choruses, and one song to the combined chorus. After a full day of workshops the quartets and choruses will perform to an audience of friends and family.

The festival began last year as a half-day workshop clinic for male singers only. After a meeting with local music educators it was decided to open the event to all vocal music students throughout southern Arizona. Southern Arizona's largest school district, Tucson Unified, agreed to host the event, which is to be held at Rincon/University High School in Tucson, with Mareena Boosamra-Ball as the host music educator. The Arizona Music Educators Association agreed to publish the event on its academic calendar.

We have gained a great insight into festival management, thanks to Mark Freedkin's Southern California YIH program, the Houston Tidelanders YIH program, Florida's St. Petersburg YIH program, the Society YIH program and the successful SAI Young Women in Harmony program. SAI has incorporated a YWIH workshop festival into their annual convention as is planned by our Society's own James Estes for the 2008 International Midwinter Convention.

Great things are ahead for Youth in Harmony; it is hoped more chapters and communities will come on board.

I distinctly remember the conversation. Here I was in my first quartet that was scoring in the Top 10 of the Far Western District, and I was just trying to figure out how I got so lucky to sing with three of the nicest guys in this hobby. I asked the lead of TopCats, Tim Huntsinger, about how he found barbershop and got involved. "Oh that's an easy one," he replied. "It was the High School Quartet Contest put together by Lloyd Steinkamp. I think it was the first one, actually."

Tim was right. He did compete in the very first Far Western District High School Quartet Contest. And it was just the thing that got him hooked on barbershop. The AFWDC has plenty of HSQC alumni among it's members as well. James Sabina of Metropolis competed in one of the earlier contests, as did Mike Stewart of Late Show, and in later years we saw Sam Papageorge, Cory Hunt, and Jordan Litz, just to name a few others. I'm sure there are even more that I'm omitting, but I do know that all of them can attest to what a great impact this contest had on their early barbershop experiences.

Lloyd Steinkamp was a man of many dreams and many visions. Fortunately for all of us, he was also a man able to make his dreams into realities. Back in 1990, Lloyd's love for barbershop and inspirational ideas gave rise to what we now know as the High School Quartet Contest. And it's been Lloyd's legacy ever since, with a fantastic 18 years of barbershop experiences and great memories for many, many young men.

For the young men who compete during the weekend of FWD Prelims, the High School contest itself is just one aspect of their experience. On Saturday evening after the Show of Champions, they retire to their own private afterglow. And for the next several hours, the quartets who qualified for International take time out of their busy evening to come sing for the guys, and sing *with* the guys. This is another part of Lloyd's vision – that these young men get to experience the best that this hobby has to offer, up close and personal with the best quartets in the Society – the ones from the Far Western District!

That relationship between the AFWDC and the High School guys continues strong today, just as Lloyd established back in 1995. Even during a full weekend of competition at Prelims, AFWDC quartets have been performing as our judging panel for this contest. Members from Gotcha, Metropolis, OC Times, and Late Show have all stepped up to the plate to take on this very meaningful role. After the High School contest is over and most everyone else is out getting a bite to eat before the finals, this panel of judges is busy providing coaching for all the High School quartets. Imagine being in a High School Quartet and getting an hour of coaching from Gotcha! and Metropolis, or OC Times, or Late Show! Yeah, it really is that cool! And we have Lloyd and the AFWDC to thank.

I was fortunate to get involved in this contest a while back, and Lloyd officially handed me the reins a few years ago. Of course, Lloyd remained involved in the contest, and continued to be an inspiration and motivation for all who participated. Ed Bejarana and John Krizek were also instrumental in helping us shape and mold the contest into what it is today. But we all know that it was Lloyd who made it all happen. And that's why we made the following announcement at the 2007 FWD High School Quartet Contest:

The High School Quartet Contest trophy is officially being retired in 2007. Starting with the contest in 2008, we will have a new permanent trophy that is being sponsored by the AFWDC. It will be the Lloyd Steinkamp Memorial High School Quartet Contest Trophy. On behalf of your FWD Young Men In Harmony team and the AFWDC, I am proud to be a part of the group of men who will carry on Lloyd's legacy... and his dream.


SANTA FE SPRINGS


Welcome to our newest member, and bari, **Anthony Chenault.** He really worked hard to learn all the music for the chapter show, and did a great job.

Recognizing the age distribution of my brothers in the FWD membership, I thought a certain group of you might want to take my experience into consideration.

WHO WAS FRANK THORNE?

Any SPEBSQSA member who's not a member of another chapter is a member of the Frank Thorne Chapter. This is the largest chapter there is. So who is Frank Thorne? Here is an excerpt from "Melodies for Millions", by Will Cook, published in 1965 for the 25th anniversary of the Society.

... Frank Thorne, International President in 1946 and 1947. He was medium tall, slender, balding, very distinguished, with a mustache; he presented a commanding appearance but at the same time seemed to have a twinkle in his eye. He was an excellent business man, being vice president of one corporation and president of several others as well as a member of the board in additional companies. Frank was a good instrumental musician and a fine singer; he sang bass with the 1942 International Champion Elastic Four.

Frank's trademark in the Society was his writing longhand notes in the margins of letters sent to him to mail back as replies. One of his most famous replies was one he addressed to then International Secretary Carroll Adams; at one point on a margin of a letter several pages long, Frank wrote: "Nuts!"

Frank Thorne was one of the most aptly named men; Frank was really "frank!" He had a way of making comments and offering constructive criticism which was startling in its bluntness and brevity, but you remembered what he had to say and you knew he said it for the good of the Society or your own personal good. He was outspoken but never mean or vindictive.

He had a sense of humor too. He was asked by the Executive Committee several years prior to his death to talk to a recalcitrant District President, one who called a lot of us Communists and was really stirring things up. Frank was asked to tone him down.

When reporting on his success he opened the coversation by saying, "I talked to God last night."

He was an excellent correspondent and took great pains to say the right thing and to be as helpful as possible in letters to arrangers and quartet men.
