

## Back To School

Two years ago, one of my quartet mates, Tim Reeder, suggested that we audition for the Los Angeles Music Center's Education Department. He had performed at schools for many years with his vocal jazz group, Vocal Works. So The Perfect Gentlemen, members of the South Bay Coastliners (Hey Hey South Bay!), auditioned for them at an elementary school in Burbank on Halloween morning. During our performance, the school's power went out (lights, sound, everything!). As we stood in the dark in front of 500 elementary students, as tough an audience as one could already face, we muddled through our performance. When it was over, the Music Center representatives said they have never laughed so much during an audition and we were offered an opportunity to perform our educational show.

Just one problem: we didn't have an educational show. Over several months, we discussed story ideas and performed excerpts of our work for the education division's artistic director. In the end, we wrote "100 Years of Harmony".



Based on a routine originated by the 139th Street Quartet, we adapted our own rendition of "Salute to the 20th Century", and turned it into a 45-minute actionpacked, three-ring circus of period costumes and props, complete with a re-creation of the Norman Rockwell cover of the Saturday Evening Post, audience participation with the help of a teacher, appearances by such iconic artists as Elvis, The Beatles, and The Beach Boys, and finishing with a rap and hip hop tune that weaves its way through the audience.



We have now performed our show 74 times at 37 different schools from Oxnard to San Clemente and from Ranch Palos Verdes to Riverside. That's a lot of miles on all of our cars! However, in this climate of arts under funding and under appreciation, we feel a responsibility to help expose students to music at school. It is how all four of us learned to love music and entertaining.

As former or present members of the Dapper Dans of Disneyland, we have experienced being touched by the wonder and innocence of a child walking down Main Street and discovering our group singing. We now have a chance to give something back to this generation: to teach them about music, to give them a bit of historical perspective about where music has been, and to encourage them to become its future.

If just one person sees our show and becomes excited about music and pursues it, then we will have succeeded. Many students may never go to a theatre or a concert hall, let alone sing with other people. It is both a rewarding and humbling experience to perform these shows and we are honored to have been given this opportunity.

As I'm writing this I just returned from the Midwinter Convention in San Antonio, and what a great one it was! If you've never attended a Midwinter before, you should really consider it. It's very relaxed and has a completely different atmosphere from the July Conventions. For one thing, unless you're a competitor in the Seniors Quartet Contest, you have a lot more time to enjoy the convention activities and get a little sightseeing done in the convention city itself. And the singing you hear... my, my, it's the best we have to offer with the top five medalists from the previous year's convention each doing their show package over two nights of great shows. Also, this year there was a lot more casual guartetting around the hotel lobbies, restaurants and other parts of town than I remember in a long time. It was also the second highest attendance ever for any Midwinter convention.

Other things you would have seen and heard included a great Seniors Quartet contest. This competition achieves a higher level every year with the influx of many of the better singers from the Society into the Seniors category. This year's winning quartet was Eureka from the Southwestern District containing such past favorites as lead Art Swanson and bass Brian Beck. Ably representing the Far Western District were Vintage Gold in a close third place finish and California Crossroads in a solid eighth place out of a field of twenty-five.

Arguably everyone's weekend highlight took place on Saturday afternoon when six choruses of young men took the stage in the first ever Youth in Harmony Festival. They came from all over the country including a chorus all the way from New Zealand, and they brought a breath of fresh air and an optimistic look at our future with them. Each group received a standing ovation and the winning chorus was from nearby San Marcos, Texas. Plans are already underway for the second year's edition of this event to be held right here in the Far Western District in Pasadena next January. It's hoped that the number of entrants will grow, and my own personal goal is to have multiple entries from right here in our own District. If you have any ideas along this line, please contact John Krizek or me with your thoughts. If nothing else, with the convention so close to home I hope you'll take this opportunity to come and join in the fun and harmony.

The other subject worthy of note was the dinner held for Chapter Presidents on Thursday night. All Chapter Presidents in the Society were invited to attend as guests of the District Presidents, and in addition to enjoying a nice dinner had a chance to mingle with District and Society leaders as well as Staff members and hear all about current and new Society events and programs. I hope that all our District Chapter Presidents will be on the lookout for next year's invitation and join us in Pasadena.

Finally, there were multiple meetings of the Society leadership with many topics discussed, but I want to touch on one in particular. During one of the meetings

of the District Presidents, we were all struck by the sharing of ideas among the various members taking place in the group. Then someone said, "Well, after all we're all in this together." That really resonated with me, because as I've said here before we're all members of the same



team, and if we work together we can accomplish a whole lot more. So, in keeping with the past practice of District Presidents coining a phrase or motto for their term of office, here's mine... "Together in Harmony!"

Before I close, I want to urge all of you to come to the District Preliminary Contest to be held in Bakersfield, March 14-16, in conjunction with the SoCalWest Division Convention and Contest. It will be a chance to hear some marvelous singing as well meeting and greeting old friends and ringing a few in the halls. It's not too late, and I know there are some good seats left.

I look forward to seeing you in Bakersfield... stop and say hi, and let's sing one!

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


We have just completed a very successful Far Western District-run series of COTS programs, including one in Arizona for the first time in recent memory. All of the COTS were one day in length, were designed to cover basic material while giving an opportunity for interaction among officers, and were designed to keep costs low. Each COTS was priced at \$30 per participant, and although all costs are not in at this writing, it is likely that we came close to breaking even for the first time in recorded history.

Many thanks are due to Past-District President Chuck Hunter, COTS Coordinator, for the yoeman's effort he put into organizing the COTS programs. After the evaluations of the COTS sessions are analyzed, we will begin putting together our program for next year.

If you are interested in Membership and Marketing (and who isn't?), please watch this space for information on a combined Membership and Marketing effort being designed for next Summer's Harmony College West. No details are yet available for this, but it should prove to be a winner!

Harmony College West will be back at the University of Redlands. Those of you who have been here know that the University hired Redlands' best caterer to run the cafeteria. If you've been here, you know what I'm talking about. It is truly something to look forward to. - in addition to a whole bunch of great classes and the finest quartet coaching this side of.....well, not this side of anywhere, just the finest coaching! You don't believe me? Just read some of the evaluation comments from last year's quartet members: "I loved it. Can't wait for next year." "HCW is a TREMENDOUS value -- I'd call the experience PRICELESS!" "We felt we got the maximum value out of our time and money." "I loved the coaching." We're going to have some dy-no-mite classes again this summer and we've added some new ones! In no particular order:

5. Barbershop Arranging.

Rather than having to pay someone to arrange your song, do it yourself.

6. Contest Emcee.

The FWD needs men to emcee contest sessions.

7. Quartet/Chorus Emcee.

Every quartet and every chorus NEEDS one - a GOOD one.

8. Tag Singing.

For most quartet men, this is where the most fun is. Don't miss out!

- 9. Barbershop Acoustics.
- This is what makes our style of music so special. **10. Show Production.** 
  - How to create a great Show.
- 11. Director of the Future.
- Every chapter needs one. YOU can be it!
- 12. Comedy.

Each quartet and chorus needs comedy. Here's how. Not "Did you hear the one about..."

- **13. Marketing.** We have the product. Learn how to sell it.
- 14. Public Relations.
  - People need to know how good we are.
- 15. Membership.

For the past 6 years the FWD has been able to provide Harmony College West schools, with ever improving classes and quartet coaching for the same price - \$150. This, despite the fact that the cost of living has increased nearly 20%! We are trying to keep the cost of registration for classes at the same price again this year, in spite of the huge increase in the price of gas and airfares, as well as the increases for room and board at HCW. However,you can still register for 10 hours of instruction again this year for the same \$150.....if you get your registration forms and payment (checks ppayable to Far Western District) in before Monday, June 16th. Send them to Keith Eckhardt, 5449 Robert Road, Pollock Pines, CA 95726. That will be the "Early Bird" price. Registrations received after that will be \$175.

I have made a concerted effort to improve the level of coaching for quartets at Harmony College West. This year

eleven of the coaches will have earned an International Quartet Gold Medal. Three of the coaches have directed International Gold Medal Choruses. One has an International Quartet Bronze Medal. Seven of them have sung in District Championship quartets. If that isn't the highest level of qualified quartet coaches for a District Harmony College, I'd like to hear of one better qualified.

Which brings me to another case of having to face reality. Quartets who want to improve can find no better value in coaching than HCW, particularly when we have such a strong coaching staff. The cost of registering your quartet for HCW will be \$200 per man. The student/teacher ratio for quartet coaching is much lower than in the classes. We can't continue to cover that with the same registration fee. And don't forget your registration entitles you to attend two one- hour classes on Friday afternoon at 3:00 and 4:00 as well as two nights and five top-class cafeteria meals, a super Saturday night show with Realtime as our AIC Gold Medal headliners and then a free pizza party. All that for \$200 per quartet member! Can't be beat!

To repeat: registrations and payment (checks made out to Far Western District) must be received by Keith Eckhardt, 5449 Robert Road, Pollock Pines, CA 95726 by June 16th. That is the date I have to give the University the number of quartets registered.


every opportunity. We should all be very proud of our guys—they are out there creating the future of the Barbershop Harmony Society.



During the early years of Kidder and Sons, we were often among adults and expected to act like adults. Lloyd was truly a kid at heart who encouraged our "goofing around." He insisted that we just be kids. I loved listening to Lloyd pretend to be upset at not being able to reach the last bass note of Wagon Wheel. Lloyd arranged Kidder and Sons FWD champ swan song, "Thanks for the Memories." My understanding is that Judy helped develop some of the parody words of the song which made it even more special. Lloyd was one of the "good old" guys who helped teach us it was not over until the "short stocky guy" sings. He always found a way to laugh and to make others laugh, too. Todd

If I had to describe Lloyd in one word it would be that he was an "entertainer." Whether he was singing in a quartet, directing a chorus, serving as MC of a show or contest, or just standing around in a hospitality room or afterglow, he had the uncanny ability to entertain people of all ages. As an audience member, I was drawn to watch Lloyd perform. If he was going to be somewhere, I didn't want miss it! Being selected by an audience to receive the Lloyd B. Steinkamp Standing-O Award means just as much to me as any district championship. It is recognition of success in what this "hobby" is really all about -entertaining people. Scott

I first encountered Lloyd back at a Mini-HEP school around 1980. I was a young college music-major and had sung barbershop for several years, but had never encountered the Society. I met many men who, like me, loved to sing vocal harmony. Unfortunately, most all of them were way older than me and I figured barbershop was a musical sport for "old guys." Then I went to a general session led by this screwy, old guy named Lloyd...yes, he was old even then. He had the group engaged in the action while he taught everyone a song. I laughed hard that afternoon and learned a new arrangement in the process! Lloyd always cared first about the entertainment value of what we gave our audiences from the stage and how we shared our love of this great hobby with them. Let's see...when did I first fall in love with Lloyd Steinkamp? Was it in 1979 when, performing on my first show with the Pasadena Chapter, I laughed myself until I almost wet my pants over Lloyd's patter as MC? Or, was in Lloyd and Judy's hotel room in Pasadena at a convention a few years later, with stepdaughter, Jill, sleeping under a stairwell, when Lloyd - while holding my hands and expressing himself as only Lloyd could do, using the most colorful of words, as sincere, loving tears poured down his cheeks - encouraged me to transcend the obstacles, to



Masters members Russ Squires and Mark Freedkin continue in their tireless efforts to promote barbershop harmony to young men. After several years, Russ succeeded in getting his youth chorus initiative off the ground. This year's International Midwinter Convention, held in San Antonio, featured the first International Youth Barbershop Chorus Festival, which proved popular for competitors and attendees alike. More than 200 singers, including some from New Zealand, took part in the inaugural event. Mark, on the other hand, continues to see the Young Men's Harmony Festival grow. This year's allday event, to be held at Orange Coast College in February, will attract nearly 300 high school young men and help develop skills that will enrich them and their respective campuses. ## Memories of Lloyd Steinkamp and the Memorial Service

The purpose of our visit to San Diego was to attend a memorial service, to celebrate the life of Lloyd Steinkamp. Co-accidentally, Don got court order to visit some prisons around San Diego and LA that week.

No one could ever able to replace Lloyd's ability and contribution for the music. Lloyd Steinkamp was a child actor on the Broadway stage in New York, he was also featured in some radio plays, and he was a barbershopper. His first barbershop experience was in Washington, DC in 1945. He sang the tenor / bass part in the Desert Knights Quartet, with Joe Salz (Don's father) (lead), Sam Aramian (baritone), Charlie Rastater (tenor). They won district contest 50 years ago. Although the Knights have never won the international championship, they are well known internationally. This is the longest quartet that has ever registered in the society. Their last show was in Phoenix, AZ last year.

Lloyd arranged over 350 barbershop songs, over 250 Glee Club and Liturgical songs. He sang with and couched a lot of barbershop quartets and choruses and won several medals, always around the district and international stages as MC, champs' chorus director (made up chorus that consists of all district's quartet champs), Hall of Fame. He worked a lot of times with youth because he really cared the youth and the preservative of barbershop music. He directed some big choruses, and brought San Diego chorus to a 5th place in international. He was the funniest MC, and he always made others feel good no matter who they were. One thing I always remember (because my husband always told me) that Lloyd never asked for an arrangement fee for his songs. We got "The Lydia" from him, that song is always become a big laugh in our show. He didn't commercialize his talents. He was 79 years old on December 2006. He started 173 barbershop chapters plus one in Japan. He and his wife Judy moved to San Diego and became a member of Tierrasanta Lutheran Church, service choir the past 14 years, served as Church Council of Worship & Music, was an Assisting Minister & Communion Server, taught Sunday School in that church. Judy, their children and grand children most all the time became Lloyd's joke materials on the stage. Judy is also a singer, she sings with a good Sweet Adelines chorus in San Diego. I think they won international few years ago.

The wonderful memory I have with the Desert Knights and their family in most conventions is that we had time together with Mom and Dad and Llyod and Judy for dinner, the first evening before the convention. Then we went to some body's room, spent time together as a big family, snacking, drinking, laughing and told stories until 1 or 2 in the morning. Lloyd always had some stories to tell that made all of us laugh a lot. I learned a lot about how they loved and cared each other and kept the relationships in good shape and strong. All the family that lives around me are really not at all like the images of bad Americans' life we got from Hollywood movies (when I lived overseas). I believe that a lot of people from overseas still don't know that Americans really care their family. I feel lucky that I am surrounded by good people and happy families.

No quartet has ever done what the Desert Knights did. They were the first barbershop quartet I saw in my life. They made their wives acted on the stage as their nurses, completely with some nurse's tools and costumes, so the quartet name became "The Desert Knights and Their Nurses". AND they were very funny! No matter how many times they did the same act, they still funny. The quartet and the wives love each other as a big family for more than 53 years. Their children played together when they were little and have very good memories about that. Charlie and Joe are friends since the first grade in elementary school (they are 77 years of age now).

It was a wonderful memorial service. Held in Tierrasanta Lutheran Church, San Diego. Lloyd wants a happy memory and leaves an afterglow of smiles when the life is done. About 800 - 900 people from all over country came to attend the ceremony in the church and afterglow. Too many people had to stand at the church because we didn't have enough seats. We and all the family came more than one hour before the ceremony began, and we were able to meet people we knew and talk to them. At least nine representatives of international quartet champions were there. Asked to sing in the ceremony were

"Nightlife" Quartet, a past International Quartet Champ from the Far Western District, and "The Westminster Chorus", second place 2006 international chorus (first place in 2007 after this was written). Gary Steinkamp, the oldest child of Lloyd, a loving brother to all of us, gave the personal reflection and tribute, he told some of his dad's jokes. He ended the words with the song his dad arranged "When I Leave the World Behind" and asked us to sing the tag with him. You can imagine the voice of hundreds barbershoppers singing that tag, then gave Lloyd a long applauses. The pastor turned his head and looked with amazement and happiness on his face.

After the memorial service, we had an afterglow at the hotel where we stayed. It was wonderful to watch and listen to the Knights' kids talking to each other about their childhood memories. The entire event lasted about 9 hours. It was a happy event, the event that Lloyd wanted us to have when he left the world behind. The Scorpionaires Chorus (district quartet champions) sang their song that made all of us couldn't stop crying, "Metropolis" a comedy guartet sang a Lloyd's song, and a made up chorus sang another Lloyd's song called "Rosie". (I remember the Knights put me on a chair in front of every body then sang this song FOR ME when I just arrived from Australia - my first barbershop experience !!). Not too many people singing on the stage considering so many best international singers were there, but so many talks and laughter and singing around the room. It felt more important to talk and show the love and care to others that time. We all sure that Lloyd was happy to see that we all had a good time.

It was a great honor to know Lloyd Steinkamp and his big Desert Knights' family, AND to become part of the family.

Don and Sally, our best friends drove from Hemet (near Palm Springs) to join us for the memorial service and afterglow. It was a great surprise for me and at the same time I felt the love and support to see how our friends came to join us.

[Editor note: Thanks to Rosye for a heartfelt letter. Although this was written about a year ago, the thoughts are quite appropriate today, a year after Lloyd passed. Let us not forget Barbershop is family.

Lloyd had great passion for his "kids", and he would be so pleased today to see the Youth In Harmony program growing throughout the Far Western District and the Barbershop Harmony Society. The BHS held the first Youth Chorus Contest at the MidWinter Converntion in San Antonio in January 2008. The FWD Youth Harmony Camp continues. An Arizona Youth Festival was held in Tucson last fall with nearly 200 young men and women attending. Thanks, Lloyd, for your passion for Barbershop, your passion for the "kids" and for the memories.]

The repertoire is challenging—only quartetters with the capability and the work ethic to memorize all 10 arrangements listed above, and who come prepared to quartet them well, in a public performance, are welcome to apply. Showing up unprepared or only partially prepared is not an option—XQ Brigades are specifically for those who can quartet the arrangements, even the most challenging ones, and will show up FULLY ready to do so.

<u>Where are other XQ Brigades? How does one start?</u> The original XQ Brigade—North Carolina Harmony Brigade—started in 1993. If you want to attend Harmony U classes through the week, then switch and become a Brigade participant starting Friday morning for the last two days, just add \$40 to the regular pricing guidelines advertised for the full-week Harmony U.
- Money will be refunded on HUXQB applications which are turned down. The applications may be turned down for either of two reasons:
  - application information does not convince the Application Review Team that the applicant has the ability, experience, accomplishment and commitment to be a successful Brigade participant;
  - o all available slots have already been filled for the applicant's voice part.

The Application Review Team is comprised of experienced "brigaders" who make the subjective determinations. The Team's goal is to position quartetters for success. Due to the way Brigade activities are set up, an under-prepared singer disrupts success for many others. For a successful XQ Brigade, each participant needs to be so well-prepared that other participants can't wait to quartet with him!

#### PATRICK BOYLE



## From Rincon Beach To the Emerald Isle

This was the title of our recent Fall show but it also was the underlying theme of our most recent travels. Many of the members of the Rincon Beach Chapter really enjoy traveling. That is if work schedules and finances are available. In 2003, a trip was made to St. Petersburg, Russia and in 2005 the chorus traveled to Harmony College (as it was then called) in Missouri. In 2007 it was time for another adventure. (Actually in 2006, we were invited as a wildcard entrant to the International Conest and Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana-which was a terrific experience.)

Two of our Chapter Past Presidents, Bob Lally and Michael Marion put their heads togeather and envisioned a trip to Europe somewhere. Ideas for travel that were discussed included Wales, Germany, and Ireland. A poll was held among the chapter membership and Ireland seemed to be the most popular venue. Bob and Michael met with Doug Weaver from Witte Travel of Grand Rapids, Michigan at the Indianapolis Convention and began fleshing out ideas.



Being a member of IABS (Ireland Association of Barbershop Singers) as well as a member in the Barbershop Harmony Society, Bob Lally sugested that maybe we could not only perform in Ireland but it was possible that we could compete as an International entrant in their International Irish Barbershop Convention. Messages were sent to Gunner Karlsson, the IABS Chairman, and we became official entrants in the Internation portion of their competition.

The Irish International Conventions are very similar to ours except that they are only three days long. Friday night has the National Quartet Contest (open only to Irish quartets) with both female quartets and then male quartets competing in separate competitions. Our own Metropolis Quartet was the Mike Warmer quartet. Saturday morning starts with the National Female Chorus competition followed by the International Male Quartet Contest. After a short break, the International Female Quartet Competition takes place, followed by by the National Male Chorus Competition. Lastly, The competition between the International Men's and Women's Choruses take place. Their were four men's choruses interspersed with four women's choruses.

We finished second overall in the International Chorus Competition. The winning Chorus was The New Harvest Singers from The Netherlands, a terrific singing women's chorus. We actually placed first in Singing, second in Presentation and third in Music. What a thrill it was to win a silver medal.

There were a total of three entries from the USA in the competition. We had a quartet called the Rincon Rovers in the International Male Quartet Contest and there was a ladies quartet called Change of Heart that received a Bronze Medal as well as our chorus. Other International entries came from England, Scotland, Sweden, Finland and The Netherlands.

We visited four main cities in Ireland, during our visit. Cork, Killarney, Kilkenney and Dublin, with side trips to the Dingle Peninsula in Killarney and the Rock of Cashel and the Waterford Glassworks in Kilkenney. In Dublin we visited St. Patrick's Cathedral and Trinity College, both the oldest in Ireland.



We had the opportunity to sing at a Mass at St. Augustine Church in Cork, at O'Donohoe's Pub in Killarney, at the Paris, Texas Pub and at the Rock of Cashel in Kilkenney, and at St. Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin. We did our final performance at the Crumlin Bowling Club in Dublin as a joint performance with the Mello Chords, an Irish Barbershop Club. They sang the first half of the show and we sang the second half before the Mello Chords joined us in singing the Irish Blessing and Keep The Whole World Singing.

The sites that we saw and the places that we visited will long be in our memories. What a beautiful country and what hospitable people. Everywhere we went, the Irish people were polite and friendly and they really made the trip rewarding. During the eleven days that we actually spent touring in Ireland, we saw many interesting sites and I'm very sure that each of us our own favorites but it will never be enough to see everything.
