### 2015 SoCal Novice Quartet Contest

The 53rd Annual Southern California Novice Quartet Contest was held January 31, 2015, in the Little Theatre of Fullerton Union High School. The Orange Quartet Chapter hosted this year's event, with significant assistance by the Fullerton Chapter to secure and operate the venue.

Many individuals contributed their time and skill to this year's event. The onstage operation of the contest was expertly managed by Don Derler as emcee and Dave Lowerre as Contest Administrator. Quartets were managed backstage by Jimmie Eacret, and other house operations handled by Pete Saputo, Tom Nichols, and Steven Sarandis. Finances were managed by Paul Sandorff, who was assisted at the box office by a team led by Debbi Iniguez. Tim Gedney provided welcome repair and upgrades to the travelling trophy, adding a new level for engraving. Many others added their efforts to make the event a success.

The contest was available to Society members of all levels of accomplishment. A handicap based on prior contest participation and achievement was applied to level the playing field for less experienced singers. Each competing quartet performed two songs and was scored according to standard Society methods. Winners were determined based on the handicapped scores.

A single panel of judges trained in the Society evaluation categories generously made themselves available: John Brockman (Music), Stephen Katz (Performance), and David Tautkus (Singing).

Thirteen quartets competed, representing at least ten SoCal Chapters. Third place went to **Big and Tall** (Santa Monica Chapter), and second place to **Gotta Wear Shades** (Temecula Chapter). The 2015 SoCal Novice Quartet Champion was **Harmonic Heartbreakers**, a quartet from La Habra High School with members of the Fullerton Chapter: Josh Salgado (Tenor), Andrew Hernandez (Lead), Justin Gabriel (Baritone), and Tristen Urban (Bass). The winning song set featured well-timed comedy performances of "I Don't Mind Being All Alone" and a Parody of "M-O-T-H-E-R."

Tom Nichols of Fullerton Chapter deserves special recognition. In addition to coaching and mentoring the Harmonic Heartbreakers through the contest, he succeeded in getting all four fully registered as Society Members in three days so that they could be eligible to compete!

Completing the top five handicapped scores were Shave the Bear (Brea) in fourth and Charles in Charge (Santa Fe Springs, Riverside, and La Jolla) in fifth. Other competing quartets included Jin & The Tonics (South Orange County), Pacific Coast Highwaymen (South Bay), Cookie Monsters (Orange), Sound Encounter (South Orange County), Sound Choice (Orange), Orange Apeel (Orange), Close Shave (Orange), and Pay Dirt (Brea).

Following the contest, each judge took the stage to provide group evaluation comments to all interested competitors and audience members, providing a valuable educational element to the evening.

Welcome to 2015! I hope everyone had a great holiday season and is ready to take on the coming year with a renewed sense of purpose and vigor.

As of this writing, our Spring Convention and combined NE/NW Division Convention is just around the corner in Sacramento in March. Just a few weeks ago, we had a successful combined Harmony College West and Leadership Academy. I'm sure if you talk to anyone who was there, they'd be happy to tell you what a great experience it was, with course content for individual members, directors, and Chapter officers, as well as quartet coaching pods for quartets (who each received seven 50-minute coaching sessions on Friday and Saturday, followed by their performance on the Saturday night show). We will be taking feedback from this year's event and making some decisions for next year, but generally we like the format that we adopted this year and will look to continue using it. The most important factor which would make it better next time is for \*you\* to be there.

In the Chapter President's course, I was happy to invite the participants to be the first Presidents to start using the District's online threaded discussion forum. We're in the process of getting the 14 Presidents who were there onboarded into the system, after which we'll be inviting the rest of our Chapter Presidents in groups of 15-20 at a time. The forum is a place where Presidents will be able to discuss issues which their Chapters are facing, bounce ideas off of each other, and hopefully come up with solutions to many of our common problems. In addition to Presidents, we also have private forums for the other Chapter Officer positions and will be onboarding those people once the Presidents are done.

At this year's International Midwinter Convention, I had the pleasure of attending the keynote address by Dr. David Wright on The Future History of Barbershop. # Executive Vice President Gordon Bergthold

We recently held the first Leadership Academy/Harmony College West joint meeting in Las Vegas and it was a breakthrough in many ways. We had

chapter officers, quartets and many talented instructors and coaches from the Far Western District in attendance and doing "their thing" Friday, Saturday and a half day Sunday. We were fortunate to have Don Fuson, our Society President in attendance the entire time and he made the rounds, visiting classes, quartet coaching and being available for one-on-one discussions with anyone who requested his time.

One of the ongoing topics in our district, and the society as well, is *communication*. This topic is the underlying challenge within the Barbershop Harmony Society leadership and board and the 17 district board leadership teams that meet several times a year to attend to the business that drives our organization. The District President's Council has made good strides in establishing a strong working relationship with the Society leadership and Board and we are now turning our efforts towards improving the communication with our district chapters and members.

It occurs to me, and many others in leadership positions, that communication is the key to success in

maintaining a healthy relationship within our districts. Retention and recruitment tend to be our immediate goals in the FWD and we feel that by putting emphasis on our chapters and the members, retention and recruitment will improve in the future. There are many factors involved in maintaining a healthy chapter and most of those factors begin with good singing and a strong musical team. Again, we have one of the strongest districts in the society and the placement of our quartets and choruses at the International Conventions is proof that we are at the top of our game musically.

Now we have to address the average chapter (which make up a majority of the 75 chapters in the FWD) and its challenges which are also based on musical success and leadership. Many chapters are looking for a director and we are working on that challenge with our Chorus Director Development program. We are also working on developing strong chapter leadership through the Leadership Academy and other programs directed at assisting chapters when they request help.

If you have concerns or questions pertaining to the growth or survival of your chapter give your Division Vice President, or any district officer, a call and he'll get the right people involved to assist you with your challenges. The biggest communication problem is that, we do not listen to understand, we listen to reply. I'm working on the listening skill so that I can communicate more effectively.



### District Vice President 1 SW Brent Anderson

I'm new to the job and haven't as yet, had the chance to talk with every chapter in detail about what issues they have, how viable they feel and

what the FWD might do to help them to be more successful chapters. I plan to visit as many chapters as I can and I assure each and every chapter in my Division that the FWD leadership is listening and aware of your issues and we'll do all we can to help you and your members become more successful in 2015. All the chapters I spoke with reported they are hoping to do well in Singing Valentines, which is one of the best publicity as well as money-making campaigns among the entire non-profit world. I sent out some personal hints at making the event a success and several chapters reported they appreciated the tips and were incorporating them into their process. Based on a few reports I received prior to this article, it seems several chapters had great results, at least as good as in the past and several reported new records.

I have some ideas about getting new members... prospecting in different arenas than where we've gone in the past. There's another article in this Westunes that addresses that topic so watch for that. In the meantime, don't ignore current members who miss a night. Assign someone to call that person after they have missed even one night, and let them know they were missed. Did you know that about 40% of new members do not renew for year #2? And 50% are gone after two years. That's not right, and I believe it's because we focus too much on getting new members and not enough on keeping the ones we have. Just because they gave you their money doesn't mean we're giving them everything they need. Stay in touch and be sure you are giving them the fun they are seeking.

Most of the chapters had Installation Banquets of some sort during the quarter and you'll see from digester reports the names of many people who were acknowledged for their contributions of the past year...whether that be as an officer, show chairman, membership person etc. and you'll also see the names of several awards given such as Barbershopper or Rookie of the Year... My chapter, Rincon Beach, was fortunate to have famous BHS arranger and performer, Dave Briner, as our installing officer, and we also enjoyed a wonderful performance from Flightline, our current 2nd Place FWD quartet. I've been to dozens of Installation Banquets over the years, and even had a chance to be the installing officer at several and I'm telling you, you don't need a district politician to do the honors. Take a tip from Rincon and ask a District Hero (often our district politicians are also heroes, but many of our other heroes prefer to lead without a title) to be your installing officer. We have so many wonderful heroes in our district, the choice is intoxicatingly pleasurable. These leaders and heroes would love to come and share stories about the wonderful experiences this hobby gives to us members as well as to the world in general, and those stories provide the inspiration for incoming officers to do their best to perpetuate the Society as well as make their chapters successful.

The spring show season has started and in February, **South Bay Chapter** had a great show, under the direction of the inventive and talented **Pete Neushul**. You all may know of his mixed quartet, **Ready Willing and Mabel**, but you may not know he's also created a "big band" composed mainly of barbershoppers and a few other professionals to accompany RWM and also **139th Street Quartet**. The band is called the **Rockin' Moroccans**, they wear dinner jackets and sport a fez, and those who have seen the shows say it is totally entertaining and great fun.

I encourage all readers to look at the calendar of events in Westunes and go to other chapter shows. First of all, each chapter goes to great lengths to create a very entertaining show, and chances are you and the friends you bring will have a very pleasant evening of harmony and laughter. Second, you will be exposed to the barbershop world outside of your chapter, and many of you will be pleasantly surprised to realize you share many experiences with many other similarly-talented You'll be entertained by champion-quality men. quartets and by up-and-coming talented quartets. You'll "learn" much from watching other choruses and you'll be "in the know" because you realize how much effort goes into the production of a show...and you'll be more of a resource to your own chapter by virtue of sharing another chapter's experience. Attend the afterglow, and meet some new friends while deepening your relationships with other, old friends.

Upcoming is the **SW/SE Division convention and competition in Santa Monica on May 9**. It's a single day event in which you'll see and hear many quartets of varying talent, all in competition for many purposes. Some may be competing to score high enough to qualify for the FWD quartet finals in Mesa, Arizona, this October. Others may not have that aspiration but may be competing just for the experience of seeing how far they have come, benchmarking to see how far they need to go, and for the opportunity to receive 45 minutes of coaching from some of the best coaches in the Society. I encourage all my division choruses and every registered quartet to compete just for the fun and the experience, if for nothing else. It's a simple, one-day trip to beautiful Santa Monica, and the warm, welcoming audience will appreciate you and acknowledge your efforts with applause and accolades which you deserve and will have earned. You'll meet other competitors and perhaps share experiences that will be the springboard to many more competitive experiences.

BTW...I have it on official authority that you do NOT have to give up your whole day to go through the many hours of warm up, rehearsal, almost ready room, ready room, green room and last room before you go on stage.... I have been in chorus contests where we have "practiced" all day and didn't get to see and experience any of the contest. There is no "rule" that you have to give up your whole day to rehearsal and other readiness. You only need to be aware enough to get to the ready room in time to go on stage at the required time. Rarely does a chorus learn enough new notes or perfect vowels or dynamic levels sufficiently to improve their contest scores on the morning of the contest. Arrive at the contest dressed and aware of when you need to be backstage, and get there at the appropriate time and go sing! In the meantime, sit in the audience with your spouse and friends and enjoy watching and learning from the contestants you get to see. Contest day is fun, not Do the "work" prior to contest in order to work. present the best performance you can give, but on contest day...that's the fun...that's the "payoff" for all the work. Perform your best, "let the chips fall where they may" and enjoy the experience, the knowledge you gain from the experience, and all the friends you get to see at the convention.

Lastly I want to briefly share with you some thoughts that have impacted my thinking, especially with respect to recruiting members for this wonderful hobby of ours. It is a concept called the Golden Circle. The Golden Circle looks just like a target with rings. The outer ring is "What"; the middle ring is "How"; and the inner circle is "Why". We all typically start with the outer ring.

### WHAT

EVERYONE knows what they do. Everyone understands what they do. Everyone understands that we open our mouths and songs come out. It's fun. It's rewarding. It makes us feel good. And people around us feel good. It works!!

## HOW

EVERYONE knows how to do what they do. Everyone understands how to sing and make beautiful sounds. Not everyone can make sounds as good as Tim Waurick, but that doesn't really matter in terms of inspiring the folks who hear us and listen to us. People understand in their gut that music inspires; it feels good. They want to listen and hear you sing.

# WHY

And then we may talk about why we do what we do - but just a little bit. This is what we all do. We talk

about the **What**; then about the **How**; and maybe a little bit of the **Why** – in that order.

The Golden Circle concept suggests we reverse that order and talk about our WHY first. Why do we do what we do? I must admit I was stopped cold when my wife asked me to articulate my Harmony Camp **WHY**.

I submit to you that people respond to our **WHY.** I submit that in order to sell yourself and Barbershop you need to about talk your personal **WHY** first and foremost.

Apple is an example of the WHY approach because we are familiar with it, and everyone knows how successful it is.

But Why is Apple such a successful company? What is it about Apple that makes people buy its products, year after year?

What if Apple approached its sales in the following way?

We make great computers. They're beautifully designed, simple to use and user friendly. Wanna buy one? Neeaa. I Don't think so.

That's how most of us communicate. That's how most of us communicate interpersonally. We say What we do, we say How we're different. We say what a great product we have. Wanna buy? Neeaa. Don't think so.

Here's how Apple actually communicates.

"At Apple, Everything we do, we Believe in Challenging the status quo. We Believe in thinking differently.

The way we challenge the status quo is by making our products beautifully designed, simple to use and user friendly. We just happen to make great computers. Wanna buy one?"

This is a totally different message, right? Now, you're ready to buy a computer from Apple. All I did was to reverse the order of the information. People respond

to **WHY** you sing Barbershop, not what you do (sing Barbershop).

It is those who start with their **WHY** that have the ability to inspire those around them, or find others and inspire them.

So I leave you with this question: What is your **WHY**? By articulating your **WHY**, would our membership expand? Has the quality of your life benefited from being a part of this hobby called barbershop? Think about that, and ponder the implications of that question.

### Chorus Director Development Greg Lyne & Royce Ferguson



### Hello, FWD!

I am thrilled to join Dr. Greg Lyne in support of our Chorus Director Development programs for the Far Western District. We are ready to provide support for director education

training in the coming months ahead and are eager to assist.

Directing a chorus, or aspiring to become a director can, at times, feel like an isolated and lonely endeavor filled with many challenges. In my experience, it is far better to travel this road with others who share the same passion, drive, and enthusiasm for barbershop chorus directing as you do. Along the way, I have been fortunate to have had wonderful teachers. At the core of this list of influences, I count Dr. Greg Lyne's instruction as fundamental to success. He has been an inspiring mentor and friend each step of the way on this amazing journey thus far, and it has made all the difference – both as a quartet singer and chorus director.

I recall a feeling much like a bolt of lightning when I attended my first directing classes with him and I knew nearly instantly that directing was what I wanted to do. What an amazing opportunity to empower others to experience far more from singing barbershop harmony than I previously thought possible. It is also interesting that the more one gives as a director, the more one gets back in return and, as a result, the successes follow.

In my role as a CDWI Instructor, I have noticed a few interesting tips. Here are five that you may find helpful as well.

1] Stay Centered, with a Lifted Countenance while you direct. What a difference this can make, when a director doesn't pace or walk around, but rather gives the chorus a solid central focus that reflects a handsomeness and integrity of a vibrant musical delivery.

2] **Team Building Language.** Use inclusive language to enroll active thinking and imagination in your singers. This will ensure everyone comes together with shared responsibility and reward as a team. Utilize terms such as "Let's, Us, We, and phrases that encourage individual exploration such as "Together, might we connect with our audience even more if we were to vigorously lift that intonation and for bonus points, continue that lifted vitality on our faces? ;)".

3] **Break Things Down.** Simplify and build upon small successes. This is a great trick to keep rehearsal interesting and fun with "lots of trys", while cleaning up a song – rapid-fire repetitions of a section with "Let's try clapping that challenging rhythm at measure 4; Now talk-sing that same rhythm on a 'Dee' while snapping on 2 + 4; Basses, talk-sing that line and everyone else sing 'do'; Leads, let's sing that melodic line and high-five a baritone; Now just the back row singing while everyone else stands in complete amazement" etc.. This changes the environment, keeps guys from being anonymous and best of all, accomplishes a lot while having fun in the process.

4] **Build Upon What is Right.** "Catch people being good". We are often trained as directors to fix problems. Don't forget to more often reward individuals who are really on their game and bringing their best to the party and always point the chorus toward the possibilities of what can be achieved with enthusiasm.

5] Achieve Ahhh!(s), aHa!(s), and Haha!(s) During each rehearsal. This was a great point Dr. Lyne made at a Friday night Keynote address during one of our FWD Director's schools: Every rehearsal should have "ahhh(s)" that come from the beauty of singing barbershop music together; every rehearsal should also have "aHa(s)" that come from discovery of something new and rewarding. Finally each rehearsal should have "Haha(s)" that are found when a group has fun and enjoys being together.

Greg and I would like to assist you on your chorusdirecting journey and invite you to take full advantage of our many wonderful training programs, which in addition to our HCW weekend include:

Director programs - Chorus Director Workshop Intensive (CDWI), Next Level, Outstanding in Front (OIF), Director Certification courses.

# Marketing & Public Relations Jerry McElfresh

The District Leadership Academy's marketing and public relations class that I conducted with the help of Webmaster David Melville in Las Vegas this January resulted in a lively discussion, a lot of questions and,

happily, some answers

For those who were not able to attend the Leadership Academy and possibly as a refresher for those who did I'm taking this opportunity to provide some highlights from the class.

First we established that **marketing** involves communicating the value of a product or service (in our case, musical performance) to customers for the purpose of selling that product or service.

The aim of **public relations** is to inform the public, prospective members and customers, to provide them with a favorable view about an organization such as ours and its membership, products and role in the community.

**Paid advertising** is another way to market your chapter if you can afford it. It allows you to pick your audience and get your message out in the time and with the message that you choose.

Marketing efforts of Barbershop chapters mainly are directed at helping the chapter earn money to support itself and to gain members. Marketing usually is responsible for getting paid performances, show ticket sales, program advertising, seeking donations and grants and the sale of Barbershop merchandise (CDs, T-shirts, etc.)

We also typically work with the chapter membership committee to attract prospective members and help retain current members.

Any promotional campaign may include personal contact; chapter answering machine messages; email messages to patrons, fans and followers; announcements on your chapter Website, Facebook and Twitter and other social media; your chapter bulletin, fliers mailed and e-mailed to active and inactive members, guests and fans; press releases and calendar listings sent to publications and radio and TV stations, and paid advertising.

That all is a pretty tall order and there are several things that chapter marketers need to keep in mind:

- Don't do it alone, get an active committee to help with all of those tasks
- Develop a marketing plan stick with it but be flexible
- Prioritize the many things you are working on ranked by importance and timeliness
- Determine who your audience is. Does it mostly come from retirement communities or the general population?
- Make use of Marketing and PR tools found under Resources on the BHS Website -- posters, press releases, etc

These points barely cover the four-hour session that included questions from the class and an outstanding PowerPoint presentation on social media by David Melville and one adapted from a society PowerPoint on marketing and PR that I used.

If you want to delve further into chapter M&PR and social media you can find the PowerPoint presentations on the FWD Website under the "New and Improved" tab near the top right of the home page, then clicking on "Documents and Forms." # Quartet Activities Bill Kane

As you may know, the FWD-inspired Platoon has become a fixture at conventions in FWD since it began in 2012. We have had around 300 men participate and have introduced about 40 songs, primarily from the BHS

Music Premiere Series. We have announced Platoons for both the Spring Prelims convention and AZ Division convention and are working with Bill Rosica to make one happen at the SE/SW Divisions convention. Look for registration forms on the FWD website or <u>HarmonyPlatoon.org</u>.

Platoon has also been introduced beyond our district as well. Don Salz has conducted a Platoon at EVG District conventions for two years, will do a Platoon in RMD this spring and completed one at Midwinter in New Orleans. He also did one in Vegas this summer for the International convention, following the one I did in Long Beach for Midwinter. There will be a Platoon at the spring district convention in North Carolina this March and one was done on the Comedy Cruise last fall.

I am now working on ideas to take Platoon further into FWD chapter level activities. As a first step, I have become President/Secretary of the Arizona Quartet Chapter (AZQC), a group who was planning on dropping affiliation with BHS. The dozen or so guys will continue as an informal "club", meeting every other week to sing Polecats, etc. The chapter will now focus on Platoon quartet activities.

The first meeting of the "new" AZQC was held Jan. 3, with 19 men attending (including two cars-loads from Tucson). Besides singing many of the Platoon songs in various quartet combinations, song leader Ray Estes taught a new song and High Priority performed their set for the competition in New Orleans (where they finished a strong #2, congratulations guys). A second meeting was held January 31 with guests from Prescott and Tucson as well as Phoenix, and a future

meeting is planned as a visitation to Casa Grande Chapter to give that small chapter a boost.

We are looking for opportunities to bring the convention Platoon activity to the chapter level in other Divisions as well. The first step was a gathering last fall in Southern California, where nearly 20 guys from at least a dozen different chapters met and sang a couple dozen prior Platoon songs in various quartets for well over three hours. A great time was had by all. Pre-convention gatherings are planned this spring in both Northern and Southern California, enabling guys to experience singing the new songs with other voices before arriving at convention.

Even though we will continue to introduce new songs with additional Platoons, I am working to identify the best set of songs from the current group that can begin to function like a new Polecat group. As awareness of these songs expands it can greatly increase the opportunities for informal quartet singing at conventions with some fun songs everyone knows beyond just the Polecats.

If you have ideas for how Platoon could help you and your chapter, let me know. Maybe a visitation by a "Platoon" quartet? Hmm? We could maybe put some together. One from AZ/CA went to Harmony College West for some coaching I know.

The show's second set featured a gripping re-enactment of the 100-year anniversary of the 1914 World War I Christmas truce, complete with "trench soldiers" in silhouette. As Christmas trees appeared on the risers, soloist Megan Lyne stepped down to the stage singing "Stille Nacht" (Silent Night). Masters "soldiers" on each side of "noman's land" joined her in song before exchanging gifts and hugs, just as the real soldiers did on that never-to-be-forgotten (and never-repeated) night of informal truce. The Newfangled Four (Joey Buss, Jackson Niebrugge, Jake Tickner, Ryan Wiesnewski) dazzled the audiences with performances worthy of the International stage.

As the Masters near their 30th Anniversary celebration, they gratefully acknowledge the importance of having an excellent, centrally located rehearsal hall provided gratis by the City of Santa Fe Springs. They repay that generosity in several ways. One way is to provide a free mini-concert at the city's Annual Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony, done each year on the first Saturday in December.
