2017 International Champion Chorus Santa Fe Springs Chapter The Masters of Harmony

When the Masters of Harmony were offered the opportunity to host the Southeast/Southwest Divisional contests at El Monte High School in early May, we accepted the challenge even though we had not hosted a convention in years and had less than the usual allotted time to prepare for it. Under the skillful leadership of **Bill Rosica**, two-dozen Masters members volunteered to chaperone the unusually large number of competitors (19 quartets, 16 choruses). FWD Events Chair Bryan Forbes noted, "...the flow of contestants across the stage was smooth and timely, allowing the audience to enjoy each performance without delay or confusion." Bernard Priceman MC'ed the chorus contest that saw Masters members on the risers of nine of the choruses. Six of the 18 competing quartets listed Santa Fe Springs as one of their chapters. Congratulations to the chorus winner, Westminster, and 184, the quartet winner!

Once again, the Masters of Harmony annual spring show was held at Cal State Long Beach's Carpenter Center. The theme was "From Broadway to Main Street and Back Again!" The opening set featured songs from Broadway shows and chorus members dressed in costumes matching the various characters in the songs-swashbucklers, fantasy creatures, gamblers, phantoms, tough guys, even Spiderman, the Aladdin genie, and Dr. Seuss-truly a costume menagerie for the ages! After changing out of the outlandish outfits, the Masters performed the contest package and were rewarded with loud, sustained applause from the nearsellout audience, a welcome confidence booster so close to the contest. Featured quartet Main Street (Roger Ross, Tony De Rosa, Mike McGee, Myron Whittlesey) regaled the audience with its unique mixture of traditional barbershop and pop songs. Also performing to enthusiastic applause were MOH quartets Masterpiece (Brett Littlefield, Alan Gordon, Patrick Haedtler, Rob Menaker) and The Newfangled Four (Joey Buss, Jackson Niebrugge, Jake Tickner, Ryan Wisniewski). Long-time MOH supporter Carol Stephenson made a stunningly successful debut on the show. Her solo on the chorus rendition of "For Good" produced one of the loudest and longest ovations of the show. The highly successful show was an excellent propellant toward the showdown in Las Vegas.

From June 2-4, the Masters traveled to mile-high Idyllwild for a weekend of work on the Las Vegas contest package. Coach Tony De Rosa continued to tweak vocal aspects of performance while **Erin Howden** fine-tuned the choreo. On Saturday evening, after 10 hours of work, the chorus sang the package for Tony and Erin and the looks of approval on their faces were just priceless-to this point — Mission Accomplished!

On June 16, over 400 people gathered at the Old World Festival Hall in Huntington Beach, California for a "Celebration of Life" Ceremony honoring the late **Jeff Baker**. **Joe D'Amore** opened a ceremony that featured the Masters of Harmony singing "You'll Never Walk Alone," Nightlife singing "Steal Away" (with Cody Littlefield filling Jeff's baritone position), the Harborlites Chorus singing "For Good," a number of spoken and video remembrances (including Jeff doing an impromptu choreography bit with The Rich-Tones Chorus (SAI) that had the audience in stitches), and The Vocal Majority singing "The Lord's Prayer." Jeff's infectious smile and the warmth of his presence made the world around him a brighter and more beautiful place. Rest in peace, our dear brother.



On July 3, the Masters family began to assemble Vegas Las for in the eagerly anticipated 2017 International chorus and quartet competition. The Masters knew that The Vocal Majority, winner of 12 International championships, came to the contest with the nation's highest District

qualifying score and that the Masters were tied for second with Central Standard, the chorus that finished 38 points ahead of us in the 2016 Nashville contest. The Masters, winner of eight consecutive chorus gold medals, had faced the VM in competition only once, in Las Vegas in 2014, when the VM prevailed by 49 points. An interesting rehearsal assignment had the two choruses rehearsing at about the same time in adjoining rooms and, throughout the week, each could hear portions of the other's contest songs coming through the walls, sometimes overlapping key parts being rehearsed-distractions that may have actually boosted the performance level of each chorus. On contest day, both choruses sang in the afternoon session. The VM sang 23rd of the 30 competing choruses. Its package of Danny Boy/Stouthearted Men threw down a formidable gauntlet to all others in the contest and drew thunderous applause from the audience. Five choruses later, it was the Masters of Harmony's turn on the stage. The ballad was a medley of love songs from West Side Story ("I Have a Love" and "One Hand/One Heart") arranged by Kirk Young. Its eternal message of love overpowering hate was possibly the most emotionally moving song the Masters have ever sung. The audience in the Axis Theater at Planet Hollywood responded with loud applause to the poignant love story so beautifully set to music. The Masters then took the audience on a musical


journey the likes of which no International audience had ever seen from the Masters. The uptune, "Its Too Darn Hot/Fever" is a rollicking, high-energy, fun-filled song based in part on a Cole Porter musical, arranged by Aaron Dale and choreographed by Erin Howden. The audience reacted with an ovation that rivaled the massive one given to the Masters in Las Vegas three years ago. When the scores were announced, the Masters of Harmony were judged the winner by 8 points – a score of 96.4%, their highest International contest score ever, to the VM's 96.2 percent. Central Standard took third. When the Masters held their medal ceremony, the men of the VM came from their adjoining rehearsal room chanting MOH, MOH! To which the MOH men responded with VM, VM! The chants quickly merged to become VMOH! The two choruses then intermingled on the risers and sang, "You'll Never Walk Alone." What a treat it was for all in attendance that late Saturday night when over 260 men from two evenly matched choruses with great respect for each other joined forces to make beautiful choral music as the week in Las Vegas drew to a close.

Congratulations are in order for these Far Western District entrants: Flightline (Oscar Sotelo, Daniel Huitt, Marcus Kang, Kyle Williamson), the 2017 Youth Barbershop Quartet Champion; Artistic License (8th) and The Newfangled Four (9th) – each foursome moved up two spots from the 2016 contest; and Fog City Chorus from the San Francisco area, a 34-man chorus just two years old, which finished ninth with a score of 88.4 percent.

Meanwhile, the MOH's vocal coach Tony De Rosa led Main Street to the International quartet championship, garnering his fourth gold medal – Keepsake, Platinum, Max Q.

Since the last issue of *Westunes*, the Masters of Harmony welcomed Nick Bratcher, Adam Ehrenpfort, Ryan Hicken, Kent Jenkins, Domenick Murray, Mike Nicholes, Kenny Rios and John Yost into membership.

2017 Lifetime Achievement Award

Acceptance speech by Nick Papageorge

On behalf of his daughter MeIanye, I am very honored to accept the Society's Lifetime Achievement Award for EARL MOON.

I spoke with Melanye, and she wants to thank the Society for this great honor. Luckily, she and Millye were able to go to Kansas City in 2011 to receive Earl's Hall of Fame Award. Unfortunately, neither of them will be here tonight. As some of you know, Millye passed away this past November and Melanye just lost her husband of 36 years. So for personal reasons, she is understandably unable to make the trip here. Earl was my mentor, my quartet baritone, co-director, and most importantly, my friend. He and Millye "adopted" a young quartet from Occidental College in 1974, and was our first coach. They did pretty well because we made the semi's the following July. (I say they because Millye was coaching from the kitchen)

But we were not the first "youngsters" to be "found and mentored." Doug Anderson, Jimmy Kline, Ron Black, Nightlife, Tom Gentry, Rik Johnson, Phil Ordaz, and it goes on....

And what about his iconic arrangements? Shine on Harvest Moon, Baby Won't You Please Come Home, Nighttime in Dixieland, Sam the Old Accordian Man, Who's Sorry Now.....and it goes on. Did you notice that these were all uptunes?

Many felt that he was only an up-tune arranger; until the Boston Common won the International Contest in 1980. Of course they sang his great uptune, The Barbershop Strut. But all were flabbergasted to find out that he also arranged "Forgive Me!" A BALLAD!

In summary, Earl was a Barbeshoppers' Barbershopper. In my mind, I still see Earl standing outside the cafeteria at Harmony College, pipe in hand (he fashioned himself as Bing Crosby), in casual conversation with first time attendees. That conversation shortly turned into him teaching a tag. The chords ring, and everyone goes crazy! And before long there was a chorus of 40 or 50 singing another tag. Here was this iconic medalist quartet man, medalist chorus director, and premier Society arranger standing outside the Harmony College cafeteria at breakfast, lunch, and dinner, teaching tags to numerous followers. And of course, during those tag sessions he was also teaching them the Barbershop Culture. That area outside of the cafeteria was his living room away from home.

Again, on behalf of the Moon family, I thank the Society for honoring Earl Moon (E2 Moon) with this very special award.

After attending Harmony Camp, one choral director commented «My boys learned in three days what it would have taken me weeks to teach them.

Please share this with your male students and don't hesitate to contact me should you have questions.

And a note regarding a phone call I recently received from a young man who attended Harmony Camp in 2008. He called asking if he could assist us this year at Harmony Camp. He is currently singing professionally at his church while working on his Ph.D. However he said he misses barbershop and wants to get back in. Obviously he will be one of our volunteers this year.

Harmony Camp indeed does make a difference in lives. Once exposed to Barbershop Harmony at Camp the experience sticks with young men for the rest of their lives. I ask that you not hesitate to give this gift to young men you might know or come into contact with during your daily life.

I encourage you to join us on September 10th at 11:00 am, Sly Park Education Center in Pollock Pines for our "Friends and Family" show. I guarantee you won't come away disappointed.

Fog City Singers credit chapter mission to their success

The men of the Fog City Singers were extremely proud to represent the Far Western District in Las Vegas this year. We've been asked what we did as a chorus to finish where we did in our international debut, and we credit our work on our chapter mission as the driving force that led to our thrilling 9th-place debut finish. While we have a wide-ranging set of Objectives and Key Results that we regularly use to assess our health and achievement as a chapter, very few of them are related to contest. In fact, qualifying for Vegas checked off perhaps our loftiest contest-related goal! Earning a wildcard invite resulted in extensive discussion around the question "What do we do now?" With our mission as our inspiration, we decided that we would use our first appearance on the International stage as an opportunity to make a splash and deliver a memorable performance.

The mission of the Barbary Coast, CA, chapter is to create a close fraternity of musicians; to apply diverse, world-class resources; and to revolutionize how barbershop music is performed and appreciated. Since this is the first time we've been asked to submit an article for the Westunes, we hope that sharing some details about how we worked towards our mission will serve as a bit of an introduction to the rest of the district.

Possibly our proudest accomplishment in Vegas: 60% of our chorus in Vegas were newly active BHS members, including 11 singers brand-new to the society, and nearly as many previously inactive BHS members. Creating and cultivating our fraternity involves contending with professional and high-performing amateur ensembles in the San Francisco Bay Area vying for talented singers' time, so consistently offering an exceptional

artistic and social experience is necessary to thrive in our local community. Prospective members are given a thorough audition that ensures our members are surrounded by peers of equal or greater musical abilities, and we keep our singers (and audiences!) engaged with around 25 new songs per year.

We are fortunate to have an extremely talented director, Chris Lewis, who has challenged us with different styles of music ranging from pure contest barbershop through southern harmony and on to Russian liturgy. The variety helps us grow, but some of those styles are outside of the expertise of our musical leaders, so we augment our internal team as needed. Since we started in the Fall of 2015, we have worked with world-class resources, including top BHS coaches, directors of local groups like Chanticleer and Musae, and Stanford University faculty. These diverse experiences continue to play a key part in our musical and fraternal successes.

Revolutionizing how barbershop is performed and appreciated is a tall order, and our partnership with Musae was especially meaningful in this regard. While part of the collaboration was for us to learn about singing traditional choral pieces from an established San Francisco female vocal ensemble, the other part was being able to return the favor by helping them with barbershop songs that were a part of their program. This collaboration helped a highly-experienced ensemble to enjoy performing barbershop music in a state-of-the-art manner, and they brought our music to an audience who may have never heard barbershop sung as well as Musae can sing barbershop (spoiler alert: they sing it exceptionally well!). We are looking forward to building on the success of this initial collaboration with Musae and are

continuing to reach out to other groups in the city.

Moving back to the topic of Vegas, we were excited to learn there would be hand-held mics available for the first time ever, so we jumped at the opportunity to try something new by featuring soloists on an empty stage. We applaud the spectacular stagecraft of our brothers to the south, and also applaud the wonderfully elaborate sets and costumes from our brothers to the east. While we are less likely to attempt such endeavors (other spoiler alert: we haven't yet found the right rehearsal space to even try!), we promise to continue to find ways to be memorable and entertaining.

We would like to congratulate the Masters of Harmony for a well-earned gold and also to thank the Las Vegas chapter for hosting a great convention. Our guys want to thank the members and families of the Masters of Harmony, Pacific Coast Harmony, and Voices of California choruses as well as the rest of the Far Western District for your cheers and applause. You really made us feel welcome up there, and we are grateful for your support! We also owe an immense debt of gratitude to Allan Webb and the FWD board of directors for helping us assume the Whittier charter. Without the help of Allan and the district board, we would not have even been able to compete in our first division contest, much less international. We hope to honor that gift and the history of the Whittier chapter in everything we do.

We found Cody Littlefield and went on to win the FWD Contest in 2015, the Dealers Choice Award in Pittsburgh, as well as medaled 3 times in the youth contest from 2014-2016, reaching as high as 2nd. We owed much of our success in these years to our main coaches Brett Littlefield and Martin Fredstrom.

After being 6 points away from winning the YBQC in Nashville we knew we wanted to come back even stronger. However, Cody told us his plan to step down to focus on school, leaving us a man short (again). Luckily our friend John Sifuentes suggested Marcus Kang from Texas as a replacement. We sent a lot of messages back and forth and sang together for the first time at midwinter in San Antonio. He fit in instantly, and our local quartet suddenly became long distance.

It was Kyle and Marcus' last year of eligibility, so to make the most of it we set up a lot of sessions with our coaches Will Harris, Sam Papageorge, and Royce Ferguson and worked our butts off for 6 months crafting our set. All our hard work paid off and we finally achieved the goal we set for ourselves five years ago. We are so honored to represent the FWD by being your 2017 YBQC Champions. Kelly Shepard Moves to Australia





The High Sierra Harmony Brigade swept through Reno on the last weekend of August with its unique version of high octane quartetting, eye-popping chorus singing, and hilarity. Now in its 7th year, the High Sierra Brigade is part barbershop's quickly growing Brigade movement that has already expanded beyond the US to Europe. As the only Brigade in the west, the High Sierra Harmony brigade offers ambitious singers an opportunity learn 11 challenging songs and then join 100 other men to compete and sing in endless number of quartet formations. By the end of the weekend, a brigader may have sung with more men than he has in his entire barbershop career. The experience gains momentum on the days leading up to the weekend when guys arrive early to go to local schools to sing for music classes. Competitions through out the weekend test the "come prepared" philosophy unique to Brigade as random foursomes are assigned songs as they walk onto the competition stage. Judging is handled by celebrity judges of the likes of past champs Flightline, Newfangled Four, 95 North, Special Feature, the Velvet Frogs, and this year's FWD 2003 reunion champ, "Q" who showed they haven't missed a beat from their original victory. For many, the highlight is singing with the Hundred Man Chorus made up of singers who know their music so well that one rehearsal puts the chorus into eye popping competition and performance levels. For others, the highlight is simply the passion that brigaders bring to a weekend of quartet singing. Brigade may be something you've just casually heard mention of, but every year more singers are getting a peak into this remarkable part of our beloved hobby.

It will be an awesome opportunity to show off the "timeless talent" of the Far West. If you are over 55, dust off your vocal chords and get ready for a fun experience with your District friends.

Midwinter is the venue for the International Youth Chorus Festival. This year there were 20 choruses (five from FWD) and 599 singers. Well, the big news of the past quarter is that we had an International Convention, right here in our own back yard, and it was a heck-of-a-lot-of-fun, with some excellent SW Division results to report ...

It was so nice to see so many SWD members at the convention. While Las Vegas is not ideal in many, many ways, it offered us one of the best auditoriums we've ever been blessed to have, and a sound system that in my opinion (38 International Conventions) was the best I've ever heard. In addition to the two mics in the center for each quartet, there were two other mics, placed perhaps 2 feet to both the right and left of the center. Those other mics picked up the outside voices in such a subtle way that you suddenly, could "hear" those voices, making the joy of four-part harmony very perceptible. It also enhanced the opportunity for "performance" and some quartets were masterful in their use of those new mics.

You all know by now that crowd favorite, Main Street, from Sunshine District, was the Quartet winner, edging out Signature, also from Sunshine. Artistic License from VoCal in Sacramento was 8th and breaking into the top 10 for the first time (9th place), with a very enjoyable six songs was Newfangled Four. Joey Buss, Jackson Niebrugge, Ryan Wisniewski and Jake Tickner make us SW Division members proud.

A SouthWest Division sidebar...the Baritone of Main Street is Mike McGee, from Santa Barbara. Mike moved to Florida 15 years ago, was instrumental in the formation of Main Street and, as you'll see elsewhere in this Westunes, he's now moved back to Santa Barbara and is the new musical director of Rincon Beach Chapter (Pacific Sound Chorus).

Before we leave the subject of quartets, **Flightline**, was

the winner of the Youth Quartet (formerly Collegiate) Competition. They were second last year and this year, in an extremely close contest, were able to snag the gold medal. So, congratulations to **Oscar Sotelo**, **Daniel Huitt, Marcus Kang** and **Kyle Williamson**.

The Chorus Competition was the tightest we've seen in years. The incredible Dallas **Vocal Majority** was there in full force in quest of their gazillionth gold medal, and they lived up to the hype. Their performance was flawless, as far as I could see. Four choruses later, the **Masters of Harmony** took the stage and gave an equally flawless performance. I was never so glad to not be a judge. When the results were announced, the MOH were declared the winners....by 8 points out of almost 2900! A 96.4 average score, which I'm sure is one of the highest of all time.

In a fantastic act of brotherhood, the VM crashed the MOH victory party, individually hugged and congratulated all the MOH and then all 300 of them sang Jim Clancy's arrangement of *"You'll Never Walk Alone."* THAT was a thrill.

We are so fortunate to live in the FWD, and also the SW Division, because the MOH are our "homies" and we get to see them so often. Under the "masterful" direction of the incredibly talented Justin Miller, this team of Barbershoppers exemplifies what is possible as a singer with our art form. I personally know many of the MOH and yes, many of them wear gold medals from Quartet competition, but most are ordinary guys like us. Justin, and the entire MOH music team, inspires every singer to become the best they can be, and they have again become gold medal winners, (for the 9th time in MOH history). True winners don't mind hard work. They are drawn to it. They are driven to see just how far they can go, and we observers need to honor and acknowledge how hard they work, and the effort and time devoted in order to give us such world-class vocal performances.

To mention one person who was a part of this victory. **Logan Patrick Miernicke**, who directs the **San Luis Obispo** Chorus, drove every week from San Luis Obispo to Santa Fe Springs to sing and compete with the MOH. His dedication was personal, in the sense that he wanted to see if he could be a gold medal winner, but also he did it to become a better singer, performer and

musician. What he learned and gained from that quest and adventure, he will share with his SLO brothers to help them get more from their Barbershop experience.

Logan has a personal performance story that bears telling. Logan is a big man, and the MOH costumer forgot to get suspenders for him. You know...stuff happens. In the first big move on the uptune, his pants dropped to his ankles...and Logan performed the remainder of the song and accepted the thunderous applause with a huge knowing smile, and thankful he wasn't in the front row. The title of that song was *"It's Too Darned Hot"* and I guess you'll admit, Logan was "cool."

Mentioned elsewhere in this Westunes you'll read the details that **Kelly Shepard** is moving to Australia and **Mike McGee** (gold medal Baritone of **Main Street**) will take over as Musical Director for the **Rincon Beach, Pacific Sound Chorus**. Kelly gave Rincon a great five years and we all wish him and his family well in the "land down under."

Pacific Sound Chorus has a great show upcoming in Santa Barbara. The title is "Harmony Celebration" and features a championship cast of performers. **Pacific Sound** is the reigning SW Division Chorus Champ, **Carpe Diem** is the 2017 Sweet Adelines Small Chorus International Champion, and **Main Street**, the new 2017 International Quartet Champ, is the headliner.... The date is Saturday, Sept. 17, with shows at 1 PM and 7 PM and a killer, free afterglow at a local pizza parlor. Quartets are invited to come and perform on the afterglow. Come spend the day, visit and support your SW Division Chapter shows.

Bakersfield Chapter is again looking for a chorus director. Who do you know that has arm-waving skills and wants to help an enthusiastic bunch of guys sing better and attract more singers? Contact **Rich Owen**, FWD Treasurer and Chapter President with your candidates.

Speaking of Bakersfield, I hope to see all of you October 19-22, at the FWD Convention in conveniently located, Bakersfield, CA. We are such a large district that it is tough to find "the" location that best accommodates us all, but Bakersfield comes pretty close. I actually took a class from her while at International in Las Vegas this year, and found it to be so compelling that when I saw that she was teaching a weeklong class at HU, I simply had to take it. And when I got home and went to my first quartet rehearsal, I didn't tell the guys anything, I simply sang in the new "way" and they All literally Exclaimed: what have you done with your voice!! It's wonderful!!! Keep doing it!!! Lots of comments like that are all I need to wholeheartedly endorse Bel Canto and Debra Lynn!!

Lots of other courses and even more impactful, the shows and the opportunities to perform on stage in front of seven hundred pretty high-level Barbershoppers who simply compel you to perform well!!

I simply cannot say enough good things about Harmony University. And if you have been to HU a few years ago, and think you know what it's all about, you don't. Donny Rose, the Dean of HU, has transformed the experience and made it fresh and compelling each and every year. All I can say is GO; you won't regret it.



"Hall of Fame Words of Wisdom"

By the end of 2017, I will have interviewed four Hall of Fame recipients.

I think what they have to say about what they like about Barbershop singing and what improvements could be made is important.

Two questions I asked each of them was "What changes have you noticed in the Barbershop organization and singing?" and "What changes would you suggest?" Most of the Hall of Famers had been active in Barbershop singing for over 50 years.

Brittan shared: "The chapters and offices are more complex, more responsibilities are involved. We sing better because of learning tracks and technical advances." Changes that he suggested were "increasing the use of chapter coaches, learning tracks and presenting annual shows for greater public awareness of Barbershop singing. Chorus members should rehearse on risers. Encourage chapter members to attend training e.g. Harmony University, Inter-chapter events foster more communication between chapters."

Barger added: "The music has changed to attract younger men. Changes have occurred in the International Board of the Barbershop Harmony Society."

Salz said: "I'm an advocate for chapters instead of identifying the chapter by the chorus name. I want to return to the old Barbershop logo. District administration should have a long-range planning committee."
