The announced strategy and vision for our Society is "Everyone in Harmony". This has been in place for a while and now everyone means everyone. execution of the change is going to take a little time. As of now women can join the Society. The membership process for the Districts and Chapters will be announced by the end of the year.

It is important to note that the makeup of your Chapter will be determined by the members of your Chapter. That decision is part of your Chapter bylaws. The actions by the Society are intended to add opportunity not subtract options. If you want to remain a male Chapter you can. If you want to add women to your Chapter you can. If you want to

have more than one Chorus in your Chapter you can. The choice is yours. The Board and Staff of the Society have made it clear that the fellowship and brotherhood of an all-male chapter is special and not in jeopardy.



Far Western District gives the gift of song

We have a lot to be proud of in the Far Western District: International Champions, outstanding Chapters and the best Barbershoppers in the World. One measure of all Barbershoppers is their heart. None are bigger than those in the Far West. The contributions given to support and expand vocal music have been incredible. We sponsor youth camps and workshops all over the west. We invite other groups to sing on our shows. We reach out to educators to help with their programs. We give generously of our time and money.



The Harmony Foundation is one way to share and the Far Western District leads the way in donations. Here is a three year average:

- Total # of FWD Donors: 504 (out of 2,063) current members)
- Total Annual Giving from FWD Donors: \$646,142.00 per year

The Road to Orlando and Beyond

The Orlando Convention Swan Song

All championship choruses are expected to prepare a swan song set for the next International contest to be performed between the end of the chorus contest and the announcement of the new chorus medalists. For 2018, the outgoing champion Masters of Harmony turned to emeritus member Dr. Rob Campbell, who had arranged the chorus's 2012 swan song set. For this set, Rob looked to the songs of Stephen Schwartz, winner of three Grammys and three Academy Awards. He selected six songs designed to entertain an audience that had already listened to dozens of chorus songs throughout the day. The medley included the spiritual uplift of "Day by Day," the delightful whimsy of "It's All for the Best," the soulful search for meaning in "Corner of the Sky," the interconnectedness of life in "Colors of the Wind," "Popular," a song that showcases the vocal and comedic talents of The Newfangled Four, and a moving tribute to those who have enriched our lives in "For Good." Enhanced by Erin Howden's choreography and Tony De Rosa's vocal coaching, Dr. Campbell's brilliant arrangements give Director Justin Miller an especially powerful musical package

to present to the audience as the Masters of Harmony end their memorable championship year. (Note: For a detailed description of Masters of Harmony activities in Orlando, read Maurice Freleaux's article "Another Swan Song Triumph for the Record" on the Masters of Harmony website.

The Masters of Harmony Spring Show - "Harmony Tribute Tour"

On May 12, the Masters introduced the spring show audience at Cal State Long Beach's Carpenter Theater to their new show opener "You'll Never Go Wrong With a Song." This high-energy song is designed to wow audience members from the get-go, and it did just that. Soon thereafter, the audience was introduced to the aforementioned Stephen Schwartz Medley, and the audience once again roared its approval.

Other songs in the program included the Gold Medal package from Las Vegas - "Too Darn Hot/ Fever" and "I Have a Love/One Hand, One Heart," the ever-popular Simon and Garfunkel Montage, and the listed show closer, Circle of Life. Although the Masters rarely do encores, they broke with tradition and sent out long-time audience favorite Les Weiser to reprise his rendition of Professor Harold Hill singing "Ya Got Trouble," a soliloguy that warns the good River City folks about the evils inherent in their local pool hall.

Adding visual appeal to several show numbers were interpretive dance movements performed by eight sprightly young women of To The Pointe, a dance production team founded by Lindsey Dixon. The two guest quartets were 2017 International Top Ten Quartet The Newfangled Four (Joey Buss, Jackson Niebrugge, Jake Tickner, Ryan Wisniewski) and 2017 Sweet Adelines International Silver Medalist Quartet ClassRing (Mary Duncan, Heather Krones, Hailey Parks, Michaela Johnson). After intermission, the two groups formed an octet and delighted the audience with "Is There Anybody Here from My Home Town," a song styling reminiscent of the interplay between the Buffalo Bills and Shirley Jones in "Lida Rose/Will I Ever Tell You" from The Music Man.

The Masters of Harmony Honor the Memory of Brian Harmon

On May 6, 2018, Masters of Harmony member Brian Harmon lost a valiant battle against kidney disease. On May 19, about 50 past and present MOH members joined Brian Harmon's extended family in his Long Beach Cornerstone Church for a Celebration of Life Ceremony. Speakers noted how Brian's deep devotion to his family and his Christian faith guided him throughout his life. Speakers described how Brian's gentle spirit and understanding heart enriched the lives of those who encountered him. In his 20 years with the Masters, Brian won six gold medals and one silver. His final gold medal, that he won last year in Las Vegas, is noteworthy for several reasons. First, it took herculean efforts for him to even be on the risers. Though his need for periodic dialysis treatments sapped his endurance, he insisted on being granted no special performance favors . . . and none were

granted. Brian wanted to do things "the Masters way." Secondly, standing nearby on the risers was his son, Jeff. When father and son embraced after receiving their gold medals, there were many moist eyes in the awards ceremony room. Rest in peace, Brian. You will be missed by many people whose lives are better because they knew you.

The Double Match Challenge for the Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund for FWD Harmony Camps has been extended into 2018.

With the goal of providing an opportunity for all barbershop members to participate in the funding of Harmony Camps in the FWD in perpetuity, a major donor has agreed to continue the double match challenge in 2018. Your contribution in any amount up to \$400 will be double matched by this generous donor. For example a donation of \$100 will be matched with \$200, effectively yielding a \$300 donation to the Steinkamp Fund. You may make a onetime donation or donate on a monthly basis.

Lloyd Steinkamp was a true giant in the Far Western District and it was Lloyd who created the concept

of Harmony Camp. The first camp was in 1996 at Camp Wrightwood near San Bernardino. This was not only the first Harmony Camp in the FWD, but also in the nation.

Today the FWD Harmony Camp remains strong with 92 young men attending the 2017camp in Pollock Pines, CA. The purpose of the Lloyd Steinkamp Endowment Fund is to provide, in perpetuity, supplemental financial support for weekend long Harmony Camps within the Far Western District of the Barbershop Harmony Society. Initially all funds donated to the Endowment will be used to build the capital of the fund toward an initial goal of \$200,000. Once the fund balance reaches this goal, withdrawals may commence to help finance the FWD Harmony Camp, consistent with the policies of the Sacramento Region Community Foundation.



Keep Calm and Keep Singing – in Harmony.



Well, it's been a very busy Summer so far. July began with a bang and a week-long trip to Orlando. The Masters of Harmony was scheduled for quite a few performances as well as rehearsals. On top of that I had a meeting with Marty Monson, our CEO, regarding "Everyone in Harmony". That topic alone took up many hours of discussion and questions. As outgoing Chorus Champions, the Masters gave each competing Chorus a little gift and best wishes on their endeavor. My chapters were Fog City and The Heralds of Harmony. Both Choruses were very cordial in their acceptance of both.

I then had a week off to recuperate and get ready to go back to Nashville for the President's Council Meeting and later, the Leadership Summit. Again, and in greater detail, were questions regarding "Everyone in Harmony". Marty was there to answer all of our questions and take under consideration some of our concerns.

Your President, Craig Hughes and I split up the classes offered at the Summit so we could cover as many bases as we could. I was able to meet many officers from the other 16 Districts to discuss how they handled areas such as Membership, low attendance at Contests and finding qualified people to fill the rolls of the District and Chapter Boards.

One area that I needed to concentrate on was how Leadership Academies were run and how to bring more members to attend. This year we will shake things up a bit and bring in some of the Nashville folks to help bring in new and improved information. No longer will we hold Leadership Academies, but will offer Leadership Summits. Summits are meant to train members to be "Leaders" and have breakout sessions for certain offices. This way you won't hear the same thing you heard last year.

I have attended the Leadership Summit for two years now and have learned each time how to be a better leader, both for my Chapter and for the Far Western

District. So keep an eye out for more information to follow for the three Summits.

Our District Fall Convention and Contest are just around the corner. The House of Delegates will have much to discuss after your Board meets on Thursday. Presidents! And don't be embarrassed to sing Coney Island Baby, Hello Mary Lou or Chordbuster's March. Sing them well, and the audience thinks that's the greatest music they have ever heard.

A word of caution however. Those three songs have been "woodshedded" by all of us for all our barbershop lives. We all sing slightly different versions and in a chorus, that becomes muddy and unclean. Get the official music and the learning tracks (BTW, they are professionally done by Tim Waurick, and very inexpensive from the BHS) and get everyone singing the same notes and rhythms.

I need to mention that my chorus, Rincon Beach Chapter (Pacific Sound Chorus under the direction of Mike McGee) will be having their big show in Santa Barbara on Sept. 15th and we'd love to see you all in the audience. See the ad elsewhere in Westunes. In addition to our stars, Newfangled Four, we have a local quartet called The Acetones, who are composed of three brilliant PhD candidates from UCSB, and one old guy (Tom Cristiani, Chris Freeze, Tobias Brown Heft and Garth Ratliff). Good luck to you all, and thanks in advance for representing the Southeast Division. We'll be there to cheer you on!!! Make sure you are all in Fresno in October!



This summer has been zipping by at an alarming rate, leaving me virtually breathless! Having spoken to several of you, I'm hearing the same thing. Several of the Choruses in the Northeast Division are in search of a director. My personal theory when selecting a director comes from both personal experience and a basic understanding of human nature. Let me explain . . .

First, have your board draft a job description for what you are looking for in a director. The board may choose to select a committee to do the research for a job description, but make sure you know what you are wanting as a Chorus. You do not want to bring in a director who envisions the Chorus going completely in another direction. You can fracture your Chorus irreparably this way.

Second, as you well know the Barbershop style of singing is utterly unique. There is no other vocal art form like it, that I'm aware of. Thus, it behooves any Chorus search committee to do their homework. Look for a director who is steeped in Barbershop harmony. This means someone who is already established and known within the Barbershop family. Where do you look for such a person? Start with someone already in your Chorus. If they're singing Barbershop weekly, then they are committed to our musical style. Ask each of your guys to write up a brief bio which emphasizes their musical background and training, both vocal and otherwise. You may have someone who is quite capable of stepping into the directorship. If the Chorus does not have someone who is "home-grown," then look at other Choruses to see if there is a potential director among their members.

Third, only as a last resort should you go after

someone not involved in Barbershop. This person may be a local elementary school or high school music teacher, or even a junior college or even a university music instructor. Tread carefully! They may be willing, and have great credentials, but they may not want to stay focused on the Barbershop style. Sooner or later, this individual may shift the focus to more of a contemporary music style, shifting away from what makes Barbershop so special.

Ah, the love of Barbershop singing! That four-part harmony is so rich; and it thrills the soul! But, I guess I'm preaching to the choir. Even during a normal weeknight rehearsal when we're all expected to be in our best voice with all the notes and words comfortably memorized (cough!), we are frequently, if not delightedly surprised when we actually ring a few chords.

At our Golden Valley Chorus rehearsal, we start each session by singing "The Old Songs," followed by "My Wild Irish Rose." Why do we do this? Because by singing "The Old Songs" it reminds us of our roots in music which is then emphasized by the classic, "My Wild Irish Rose." Once we're well into Rose, a tenderness in tone and volume has settled in, so that by the time we sing the final phrase leading into the Lead post of "Rose," every other part gently, dare I say tenderly, merges into the final chord creating the sound we all strive for. When that chord rings at the end, it wouldn't be all that out of order to simply say good night, and everyone goes home. Of course, we don't do that, but on those rare occasions when it all comes together, well ... it's a beautiful thing.

Keep singing, gents!

Brent Anderson is the Southwest DVP. Brent has been very active in his Division Chapters and has assisted others outside his Division with revitalization and community performances. He too has a long





Chapter Show Clearance Procedures

Hey Guys. Here's a heads up on some of the details for clearing your chapter shows and keeping your performances "legal". It's easy, doesn't cost much money and needs to be done in a timely manner. The FWD SOP Section 9.2 gives all the requirements in a nutshell. Here it is.

- 1. No show clearances are to be granted on District convention weekends, or Divisional Leadership Academy (see Art. XII para 12.3) Harmony Jubilee, Harmony College West or Chorus Director Seminar weekends.
- 2. Show clearance will not be granted on the same date as a chapter's own division quartet or chorus contest.

As you begin your show planning process, be sure to check the FWD calendar and be sure the dates you are looking at do not conflict with any of the dates listed in paragraph "a" and "b" above. Here are the specific dates you need to avoid for the next year. Be proactive and get this clearance requirement done early in your show planning process.

Mark your calendars of dates you need to avoid:

- November 3, 2018--SE/SW Leadership Summit
- November 17, 2018 -- NE/NW Leadership Sum-
- January 12 2019 -- Arizona Leadership Summit
- March 21-14, 2019 Spring Prelims & NE/NW Division
- April 12-13, 2019 Arizona Division
- May 10-13, 2019 SE/SW Division
- October 10-13. 2019 FWD Fall Convention

Once you determine your show date, you need to file for a "BMI Show Clearance". The process is simple. For all the information and forms go to the district website: farwesterndistrict.org. Click on the Media Tab. Look for "Show Clearance Forms". Two documents are available:

- IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS for PREPARA-TION & MAILING (That's where you will find my mailing address), and
- Application for Show Clearance BMI & SESAC License Form.

Complete the form making sure you sign and date it. Enclose the check made out to BHS and mail two copies of the form and the check to me. I will process it within a few days of receipt. It's that simple.

One final note: Also on the "Important Information..." page is information about your chapter's responsibility to submit its annual ASCAP clearance document and fees if appropriate. That form goes directly to BHS in Nashville. That's about it.

Remember, let's keep our shows "legal".





Marketing wisely on a shoe-string budget

This is the third in a series of articles intended to help chapter marketing teams maximize their "bang for the buck", particularly when faced with a limited budget. Last time we looked at some no-cost ways to get the word out, a.k.a. the "free stuff". This time, let's take a look at what should be the backbone of your marketing and branding strategy: your website.

If you don't yet have a website, there is no better time than now to start. If you do have a website, read on, because there are some things to consider that may make it more effective. I'll try to make this as non-technical as possible, but that's not always easy to do, so if you have any trouble absorbing this, please send me an email and we can set up some time to talk on the phone.

First, let's make it clear that a Facebook page does not replace the need for a website for two simple reasons: 1) not everyone uses Facebook, so if you rely on it exclusively you are limiting yourself to a subset of your potential market; and 2) anything you post to your page has a very short lifespan in a typical user's timeline before it scrolls off into oblivion. For example, we have around 830 "Likes" on the Far Western District's Facebook page, and a typical post may reach 150-200, meaning it appears in their timeline; from that we typically have 10-20% engagement, i.e., clicks to read the post. Those are not terribly good odds, and so while Facebook is a good and free supplement, it should not be your only iron in the fire. A better approach is to use your Facebook page as a means of drawing people to your website where you can present the full pitch of "who, what, where, when, why, and how" in a clean and concise manner, where you have full control of how it is presented.

If the reason you don't have a website is because you think, "I'm not a programmer", or "I don't know HTML" then relax because nowadays there are tools that make it as easy as creating a Word document. With a little practice, you'll get the hang of it in no time, and you will be pleased with the results.

Domain name

When planning a website, the first thing to consider is your domain name, as this is your initial "branding" to get people to visit your site. A domain name is a unique name that identifies both you and your website. It is case insensitive; so don't worry about upper and lower case. A good candidate is the name of your chorus or quartet, followed by a suffix.

Common suffixes include ".com", ".org", and ".net". It really doesn't matter which suffix you choose, but I personally prefer ".org" since we are an organization, not a commercial business. Keep in mind that domain names are cheap, so you may want to consider getting all three as a way of securing your identity (more on that later).

Keep in mind that the domain name MUST be unique, so find out if that name is available. There are a number of tools to do this, and you can find them by searching for "domain name search tools". If you find that the name is already taken, then try adding hyphens (musicmakers.org -> music-makers.org) or appending "chorus" or "quartet" to the name (musicmakers.org -> musicmakerschorus.org) and search again.

Unfortunately there are some "scalpers" that will buy up domain names by the score and then try to sell them at a premium price. I've seen some popular names that are available for a "mere" \$20,000.00! A typical name is in the \$10-15 range, so forget that and keep searching.

Web hosting

Once you have identified your domain name, it's time to shop around for a web-hosting provider. There are hundreds to choose from, and besides price, here are some things to consider.

Storage

For most small and medium web sites, several gigabytes should be plenty of storage. Some hosts may offer "unlimited storage". Caveat emptor! Read the

fine print!

Bandwidth

Bandwidth is the amount of data that your host will let you and your visitors upload and download (cumulatively) in a given month. Some hosts offer "unlimited bandwidth"; again, read the fine print.

Subdomains

If you're just starting out, you'll likely begin with a single, public facing website. But maybe later on you'll want to add a "members only" site, or one to sell show tickets or merchandise. These are often done using what is known as a subdomain, which is actually a separate website that resides in a subfolder.

Database

Today's websites store their content in a database, usually MySQL, so make sure the web host offers that feature. You'll need a separate database for each subdomain, so also consider the number of databases they provide in the hosting plan.

Email

Do they offer email accounts or forwarding options? These are very useful for providing consistent email addresses for your group, particularly your chapter officers, e.g., president@mychapter.org.

Tech Support

Find out when, where, and how you can get support when you need it, and well as the response time you can expect. Stay away from hosts that only offer support through a web-based "ticketing" system; 24x7 phone support is the best option.

Site Backup

Stuff happens. Your web host should offer AUTO-MATED, daily backup of your website files and databases. If they do not, keep looking.

Website Security

Although less common, websites can get attacked by malicious activity, similar to a virus getting on to your computer. Your web host should offer both detection and correction as a service.

Building your website

Many hosts now offer "website builders" that profess to have your website up and running in a matter of minutes. While that may be somewhat true, I've looked at several offerings, and can advise that you'll wind up with a very basic website that you'll quickly find does not serve your needs going forward.

A better solution is to start from the beginning using something called a Content Management System (CMS). A CMS helps you to manage the creation and modification of your website and - best of all -- it allows multiple users to work together in collaboration. In other words, you provide the guys in your chapter with a tool that uses a template for a common look and feel, and they become responsible for the content. It's really a win-win, because your chapter leaders can easily create and edit their own articles, maintain the calendar, and much more without needing to come to you every time.

The three most popular CMS are WordPress, Joomla, and Drupal. All three are open source and free to use. WordPress is by far the most popular and is a good fit for most chapter or quartet websites; it's also considered to be the easiest to learn. Next up is Joomla, which is a little more complex in terms of setup, but offers greater flexibility while still being very easy for your users to manage content. Drupal is technically the most advanced, but also requires a good deal of technical expertise and programming skills; it's probably not a good choice unless you're a seasoned programmer.

Your web host should at the very least offer Word-Press and/or Joomla, and they should also offer a super-easy installer for your CMS of choice.

Securing your website with SSL

Nowadays we need to consider protecting our information as well as the visitors to our website. Although there is an additional cost involved, the solution to this is to protect your website using something called Secured Socket layer (SSL).

In layman's terms, when you have SSL, the stream of data that travels between the web server and the web browser on the visitor's computer is heavily encrypted (scrambled), making it virtually impossible for malicious programs to capture any information. A website secured with SSL has an address starting with "https"; an unsecured website starts with "http". If you are selling any products your website, it is ESSENTIAL to have SSL enabled. It's also a strongly advisable to use SSL anywhere you allow people to log in, such as your "members only" site.

For sites that are public facing, with no log-in capability, having SSL is still optional; however, be advised that in July 2018, Google rolled out an update to its "Chrome" browser – which currently has 62% market share, followed by Internet Explorer with only 12% -which will display a big, new **Not Secure** warning next to your domain name in the address bar if it is not secured with HTTPS. Moreover, back in 2014 Google confirmed that their search engine – which currently holds 91% market share, followed by Bing with 3% -- scores a higher search engine ranking for websites having HTTPS than those who do not.

If this sounds like Google is driving the technology, you're absolutely correct. But it seems like every other day you read about some web site getting hacked, or personal information getting compromised, and so they are absolutely correct in moving this forward. The Internet is an amazing resource in terms of marketing, and it allows us to do some great things at a fraction of the cost, but we need to also make sure it is a secure and safe place for our members and our visitors.

Wrapping things up

We've covered a lot of territory this time, and if your head is spinning I again apologize if this was too technical. So let me close this installment by repeating that I am here as a resource to help you, and encourage you to contact me if you would like further assistance.
