The Music Man: A "Nostalgic" look at the River City School Board

River City School Board (Nostalgia): Bill Adank, Don Richardson, Bob McColl, Tim Quinn

Most barbershoppers aspire to sing in a production of Meredith Willson's The Music Man. What could be better than to follow in the 1950 International Champion Buffalo Bills' footsteps? As the bickering school board members the Bills gave one of the most persuasive introductions to barbershop singing ever. And what barbershopper could turn down the opportunity to emulate them?

As someone who has sung in two different productions of *The Music Man*, I believe every barbershopper ought to jump at a chance to participate if he has the opportunity. Nostalgia, the quartet I've sung in since 1975, has had that opportunity twice, and both times it was rewarding and satisfying. The first came in 1985 when the Musical Theatre of Arizona announced plans for the production to be presented in January, 1986

in both Gammage Center at A.S.U. and the Sundome Center for the Performing Arts in Sun City West. Russ Tamblyn played Harold Hill, and Sarah Tattersall was Marian Paroo. As a quartet, we learned the quartet songs before the audition, so we didn't have to use music. Members were Bill Adank, Don Richardson, Tim Quinn, and Bob McColl.

The next production was in the North Scottsdale United Methodist Church in November, 2014. Members were Dick Gray, Don Richardson, Greg Lewis, and Scott Holcomb. We didn't have Russ Tamblyn, but the production was just as rewarding.

Should you ever get the opportunity, learn the songs, and sing your best. Maybe you can get to be Ewart Dunlap, too.



The Best Mixed Quartet You've Never Heard

A retrospective review by Grady Kerr – Barbershop Harmony Society historian - March 2019

Hey gang, I just had the pleasure of rediscovering an incredible vocal group who (IMHO) never got the recognition they truly deserved. They call themselves **READY, WILLING AND MABEL**. They are a mixed vocal jazz quartet (two of each) from Southern California, born out of the **South Bay Coastliners**.\

They are NOT your grand-father's barbershop quartet. They were MIXED before mixed was cool. While they can ROCK Barbershop, they specialize in tight vocal jazz; a rarity among Society born quartets.

These four singers are well-known among Barbershoppers; Caroline McLean (lead), Kate Walker (alto), Peter Neushul (tenor), Jim Campbell (bass) who replaced Robert Clark (bass) and sang with them early on after trying many others.

We all know Peter Neushul from 139th Street Quartet (multiple International medalist and 2014 Society Hall of Fame member). He is also the director of the **South Bay Coastliners** chorus.

Most know Jim Campbell from the Dapper Dans of Disneyland, The Perfect Gentlemen, and his professional movie and television appearances.

Caroline McLean (lead) is from Leeds, England. They first met at a 139th Street show in England. Her quartet, 42nd Street, won the Ladies Association of British

Barbershop Singers gold medals in 1987. She moved to the states in 1990. Caroline directs the L.A. South **Towns Show** Sweet Adeline Chorus.

Kate Walker (alto) is from New Zealand. She sang in club bands in New Zealand and Australia before moving to the U.S.

RW&M probably sang with 25 others before the felt they got the "sound" they were looking for. They admit the group didn't "click" until Kate joined.

With these two welcomed immigrants, they first officially formed in 2004 in LA.

They've performed on various chapter shows in the area often backed by their own big band called The Rockin' Moroccans. They also perform with a small combo of drums, stand-up bass and piano.

RW&M used to sponsor a monthly a cappella get together at The "Chord Club" in Redondo Beach starting in 2005 and continued for the next 10 or so years. Any group, regardless of style, was encouraged to come & perform. It was very popular and very encouraging to many other groups and showed RW&M's generosity and commitment to promoting a cappella.

They've performed for celebrities including George W. Bush at the opening of the Reagan Library and Barack Obama.

With the other three filling in all the chords, Caroline is so perfect and so easy to listen to. It's hard not to hear Manhattan Transfer's Janis Siegel when Caroline sings.

So, if you like ManTran, Singers Unlimited, or The Real Group, you'll L.O.V.E. RW&M.

One of the marks of a trend-setting group is song selection and fine arrangers. RW&M have had LOTS of fine arrangers. The long list includes: Ruby Rhea (tenor, Shalimars 1965 SAI Queens); Chuck Brooks (lead, The Colonials, 1960 3rd place); Jim Campbell, Will Hamblet, and Danny Fong.

RW&M has produced two exceptional CDs.

A Cocktail for the Ears (2005) (Robert Clark on bass) This Can't Be Love / Almost Like Being In Love, Corcovado, They All Laughed, Where Is Love?*, Here's That Rainy Day, Spring Will Be A Little Late This Year*, What Are You Doing The Rest Of Your Life*, I Will, For All We Know*, Through The Years*, Wanting Memories, Puttin' On The Ritz

*a cappella

A standout of this project is "Here's That Rainy Day". It's been done by others but with a subtle bass and percussion and hearing Caroline's sultry voice on this famous Berke / Van Huesen classic, makes this version my new favorite.

"Through The Years" is the popular Gene Puerling (Hi Lo's) arrangement we all know and love. They do it justice, too. You'll want to harmonize along ... but DON'T ... you'll just mess it up. ☺

"I Will" is an obscure Lennon/McCartney tune and favorite by many of us Fab Four Fans. RW&M pay homage with this great arrangement.

"Puttin' On The Ritz" was saved for last. Robert Clark sings bass on this one. The back-up drums and standup bass really add to this fun tune. Possibly the best version I've ever heard.

Each member vamps during "Fascinating Rhythm/ Steppin' Out With My Baby" showing how disgustingly talented all four singers really are.

"The Shadow of Your Smile" is smooth. Once again, the use of their backup combo is like Goldilocks' porridge. ... not too hot, and not too cold ... just right.

There are so many favorites on this CD it's hard to pick.

"My Funny Valentine" is, as you might expect from RW&M, perfect. This song is headset worthy. I turn it up and get lost inside these chords; a spectacular Chuck Brooks arrangement.

Brace yourself for "Rhythm Is Our Business". BAM! A full band is used on this track. A great fit and a salute to the style and the era RW&M recreate. Vocal arrangement is by Will Hamblet. I wanted more of this.

"Busy Line" (the title track) is certainly a highlight. A Chuck Brooks arrangement with Jim singing the bass melody. It's been RW&M-ized. A fun and an entertaining "go to" song for their live shows.

Their third recording project is still in the works and soon to be made available via iTunes in the very near future.

Ready, Willing & Mabel are STILL available for chapter shows. Simply said ... BOOK THEM!

Again, congratulations to all of our competing Southeast Quartets!



Again, I want to make sure that you know that I truly love this division. I have been a member of the South-




I know you will all welcome Scott and utilize his talents to help you, your Chapter and your Chorus become even more effective in the area of Music and Performance.

Quartet Activity at The Chapter Level?

One Chapter in our District has taken the FWD-created Harmony Platoon concept and applied it at the Chapter level, with some excellent results. And they call it: "How the Platoon System Improved Our Chorus".

Rincon Beach was looking for a way to increase the pace of new music learning . . . especially during a period when their Director had moved out of state for business reasons. The Music Team had noticed that when members sign up for a Platoon Quartet event at Conventions they were more diligent about learning the music on their own than with new Chorus songs. If Chorus members were to do that it would leave more Chorus rehearsal time for putting artistry and storytelling into the music.

And the Music Team figured as well, that singing in a Quartet at Platoon requires a singer to be self reliant and able to hold his part 100% of the time, and not lean on others in his section. That could lead to a stronger Chorus. Besides, what a FUN activity the Platoon always seems to be.

So, why not hold a Chapter Level Platoon Contest with some new songs the Chorus wants to add? And so they did.

Learning tracks for three songs the Pacific Sound Chorus wanted to learn were provided members for them to work on at home. After three months of work on their own, everyone met for a Sunday Afternoon Party and Platoon Contests. There were a half dozen randomly assigned Quartets competing in a couple of Contests. They apparently had lots of FUN doing it, cause the party lasted for four hours. Congrats to round 2 and overall champs: Platoonic Friends.

According to Rincon Beach, "One of the best parts of the experiment was the following Monday when we rehearsed one of the new songs for the very first time as a Chorus and IMMEDIATELY went into artistry, dynamics, fixing minor rhythmic challenges (as opposed

to introducing new rhythms and fighting with them)... A HUGE success!"

If your Chapter is interested in trying a similar Quartet program, I'm sure Rincon Beach would be glad to share more details of their experience with you.

The Platoon program also continued at the FWD Spring Convention in Stockton and another Platoon champ was crowned: Joey's Birds

This Quartet provides a great example of the variety resulting from Platoon's random selection process. Tenor Glenn Davis's competing Quartet the next day qualified for FWD District competition next Fall with the second highest NW Division Quartet score. Lead Adam Kaufman's Quartet competed the following month in the AZ Division contest. Bari Joey Berube has been a member only since last October, while Bass John Jones has been a member for 44 years (and having previously been the FWD Events Chair John had to miss Platoon because of Board Meetings till fairly recently).



MARKETING ON A SHOESTRING BUDGET

This is the sixth in a series of articles intended to help chapter marketing teams maximize their "bang for the buck", particularly when faced with a limited budget. Last time we introduced the Psychology of Color. This time I want to turn attention to developing effective marketing materials by broadening our knowledge on the use of color.



CHAPTER 6: Introduction to Color Theory


With colors you can set a mood, attract attention, or make a statement. You can use color to energize, or to cool down. By selecting the right color scheme, you can create an ambiance of elegance, warmth or tranquility, or you can convey an image of playful youthfulness. Color can be your most powerful design element if you learn to use it effectively.

Colors affect us in numerous ways, both mentally and physically. A strong red color has been shown to raise the blood pressure, while a blue color has a calming effect. Being able to use colors consciously and harmoniously can help you create spectacular results.

The Color Wheel


The color wheel or color circle is the basic tool for combining colors. The first circular color diagram was designed by Sir Isaac Newton in 1666.

The color wheel is designed so that virtually any colors you pick from it will look good together. Over **40** Westunes • Summer 2019 • farwesterndistrict.org




the years, many variations of the basic design have been made, but the most common version is a wheel of 12 colors based on the RYB (or artistic) color model.


Traditionally, there are a number of color combinations that are considered especially pleasing. These are called color harmonies or color chords and they consist of two or more colors with a fixed relation in the color wheel.




Primary, Secondary and Tertiary ColorsIn the RYB (or subtractive) color model, the primary

colors are red, yellow and blue. The three secondary colors (green, orange and purple) are created by mixing two primary colors. Another six tertiary colors are created by mixing primary and secondary colors.








Warm and cool colors

The color circle can be divided into warm and cool colors. Warm colors are vivid and energetic, and tend to advance in space. Cool colors give an impression of calm, and create a soothing impression. White, black and gray are considered to be neutral.

Tints, Shades, and Tones

If a color is made lighter by adding white, the result is called a tint. If black is added, the darker version is called a shade. And if gray is added, the result is a different tone.




Shades add black to a pure hue.

Basic color chords based on the color wheel




Complementary color scheme

Complimentary colors are any two colors that are opposite each other on the color wheel. For example, blue and orange, or red and green. The high contrast of Westunes • Summer 2019 • farwesterndistrict.org **41**

complementary colors creates a vibrant look especially when used at full saturation. This color scheme must be managed well so it is not jarring.

Complementary color schemes are tricky to use in large doses, but work well when you want something to stand out. Alternately, you can use tints and shades here; a lighter tint of blue contrasted against a darker orange, for example.

Complementary colors are really bad for text.




Analogous color scheme

Analogous color schemes use three colors that are next to each other on the color wheel. They usually match well and create serene and comfortable designs. For example, orange, yellow-orange, and yellow.

Analogous color schemes are often found in nature and are harmonious and pleasing to the eye.

Make sure you have enough contrast when choosing an analogous color scheme. Choose one color to dominate, a second to support. The third color is used (along with black, white or gray) as an accent.

It's best to avoid hues, as they can be jarring; instead, focus on using tints of analogous colors. Also avoid combining warm and cool colors in this theme.



Triadic color scheme


A triadic color scheme uses three colors that are evenly spaced around the color wheel. For example, red, yellow, and blue.

Triadic color schemes tend to be guite vibrant, even if you use pale or unsaturated versions of your hues.

To use a triadic harmony successfully, the colors should be carefully balanced - let one color dominate and use the two others for accent.

Split-Complementary color scheme


The split-complementary color scheme uses three



colors and is a variation of the complementary color scheme. In addition to the base color, it uses the two colors adjacent to its complement. For example, blue, yellow-orange, and red-orange.

This color scheme has the same strong visual contrast as the complementary color scheme, but has less tension.

The split-complimentary color scheme is often a good choice for beginners, because it is difficult to mess up. That's because you get contrasting colors, but they aren't as diametrically opposite as complimentary colors.



Tetradic (rectangle) color scheme

The tetradic or rectangle color scheme uses four colors arranged into two complementary pairs. For example, blue and orange is paired with yellow and violet.


This rich color scheme offers plenty of possibilities for variation, but is also the hardest to balance.

Tetradic color schemes works best if you let one color be dominant. Avoid using pure colors in equal amounts.

You should also pay attention to the balance between warm and cool colors in your design.

Square color scheme

The square color scheme is similar to the rectangle, but with all four colors spaced evenly around the color circle. For example, red, blue, green, and yellow.



Square color schemes work best if you let one color be dominant. Again, avoid using pure colors in equal amounts.

You should also pay attention to the balance between warm and cool colors in your design.

Properly Using Color Theory

Use contrasts to reduce eyestrain and allow readers to focus their attention on specific items. Vibrancy can dictate the emotional response users have to your design.

For example, choosing brighter colors can lead users to feel more energetic, which can evoke better responses and reactions in advertising.

But for a website that is information-intensive, you may find that a darker color theme will make it easier for readers to process all your data.



A Masters foursome named Doubletime (Foster Howlett, Mark Travis, Les Weiser and Singing Valentines Coordinator Phil Wolf) traveled from morning to night to entertain the surprised beneficiaries of someone's loving thoughts. MOH VP of Public Relations Larry Icenogle filled in as Tenor with the Orange Empire Quartet Preferred Blend to also deliver valentines. Some of the places the Quartets visited included city maintenance yards, office buildings, community colleges and convalescent homes. In a break from past experience, half of the recipients were men. Phil gives credit to the Orange Empire Chorus, especially to Sheila Lowerre, Tom Nichols, and Jay Campbell, for their help in keeping this unique holiday fun and fundraising activity alive.
